Leading researcher to address seminar

Safety council against change in helmet law

Deaths and injuries in motorcycle accidents are expected to increase significantly if the legislature weakens or repeals the motorcycle helmet use law, says the New Jersey State Safety Council. The council, concerned by the disastrous experience in other states that repealed the helmet use law, has sent telegrams to legislators questioning the wisdom of repealing a law which in the first year after its enactment was a factor in reducing motorcycle fatalities by 25 percent and head injuries by 40 percent.

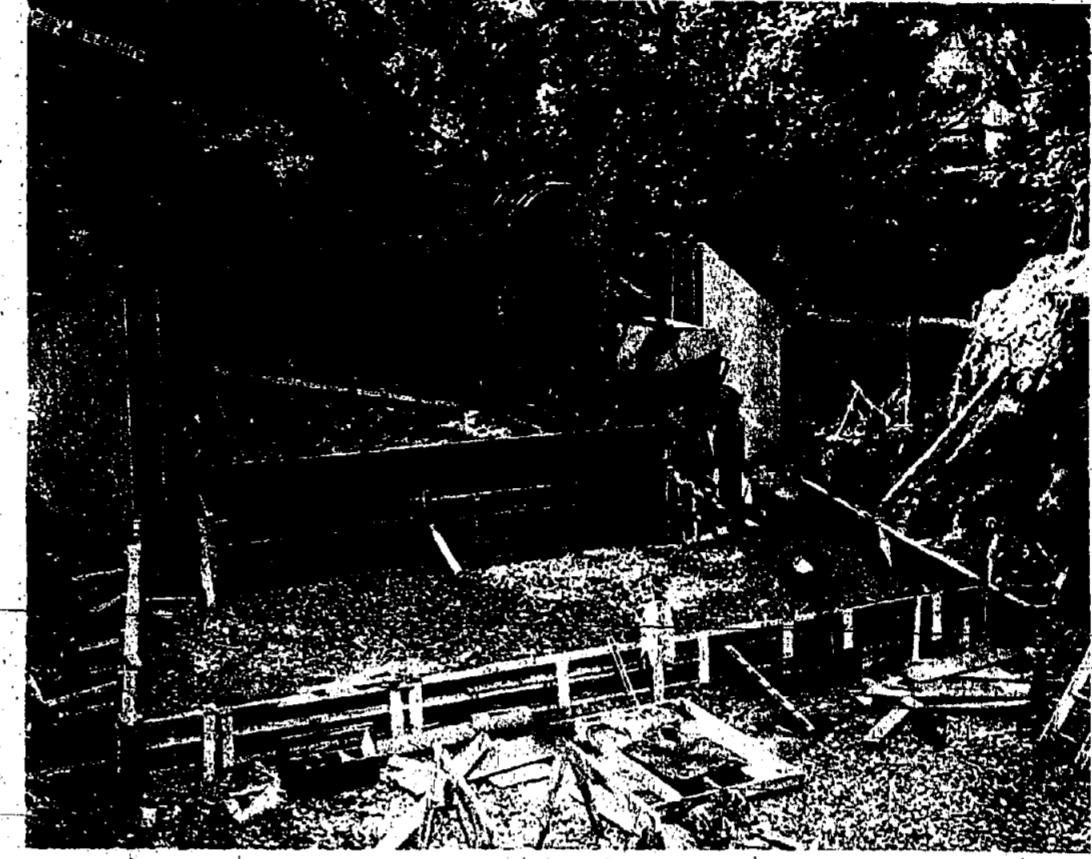

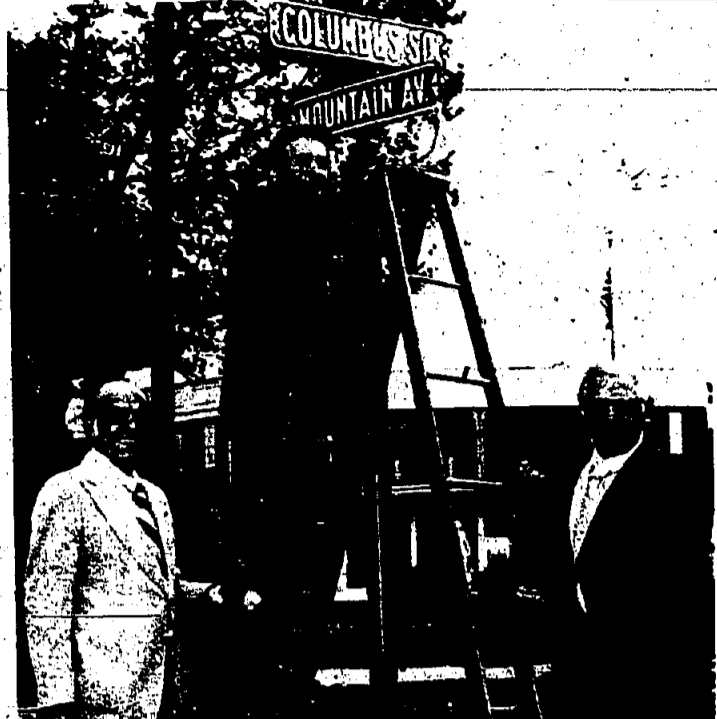

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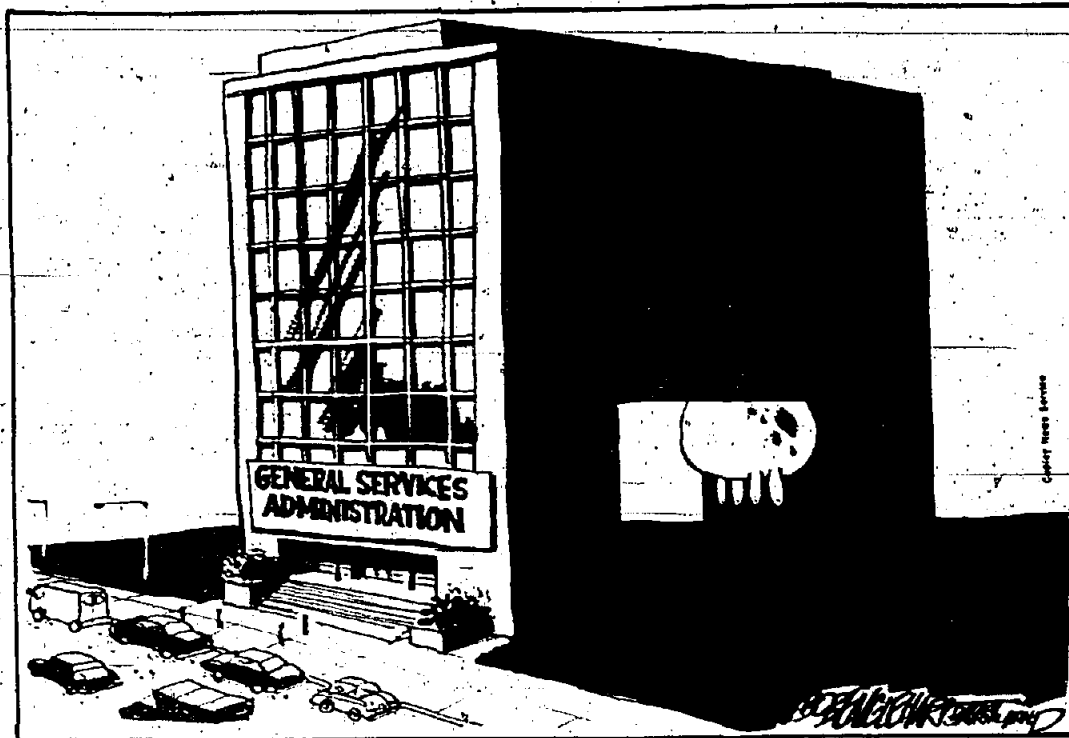
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LIBRARY From prying to Proust

By ROSE F. SIMON The Springfield Public Library lists the following titles among the recently received books. REVELATION THROUGH LETTERS "The People's Letters" by Mina Curtiss. "Early in her life the writer-former English professor at Smith College—had been fascinated by reading other people's letters. This was due to an uncontrollable curiosity of which she duly warned her relatives and friends. In fact, her first publication was based on letters previously sent to her husband. This was followed by "Letters Home," written by soldiers.

As a writer for National Geographic magazine, Ward spent four months in Cuba, interviewing many people, then returned to supplement his material for another seven months. He asserts that despite the rapid changes, the informal government, the volatility of Castro, there have been "stabilizing consistencies." That small nation (population almost 10 million) has been moving steadily toward Socialism and Communism. The author refutes the claim made by American ex-Cubans that the experiment is a failure. Though it may be in serious economic trouble, it is because the government has chosen to live beyond its means. It desires to industrialize and construct its New Society in a very short time. But sugar, nickel, fishing, and Soviet aid have kept Cuba on a comparatively even keel since 1959.

Taxation: Myths, realities

This is the fifth in a series of 15 articles exploring "Taxation: Myths and Realities." In this article economist Richard W. Mueggrage of Harvard University and Professor Mueggrage of Northeastern University discuss how taxes affect the economy and how the economy affects tax revenues. This series was written for Courses by Newspaper, a program developed by University Extension, University of California, San Diego, and is published by this newspaper in cooperation with Union College. By R.L. and P.R. MUEGRAVE. The immediate purpose of taxation is to collect revenue to finance public services. But like it or not, taxes profoundly affect economic conditions. Employment, inflation and economic growth are all affected by tax policy, and economic conditions will in turn affect the revenue that the government gets.

NEW USES New uses of tax policy may be needed to deal with the inflationary pressure of rising costs, such as an increase in sales or payroll taxes. Rising costs would contribute further to the pressures for higher prices and higher wages.

INFLATION This fiscal policy should look toward raising taxes under conditions of inflation and lowering them under conditions of unemployment. This general rule is simple enough, but there are qualifications.

ECONOMIC CONDITIONS Turning to the other side of the coin, we find that tax revenue collections are affected by changes in economic conditions. When the economy goes into a recession, household incomes and business profits fall, and, at least, grow less rapidly. This means that the

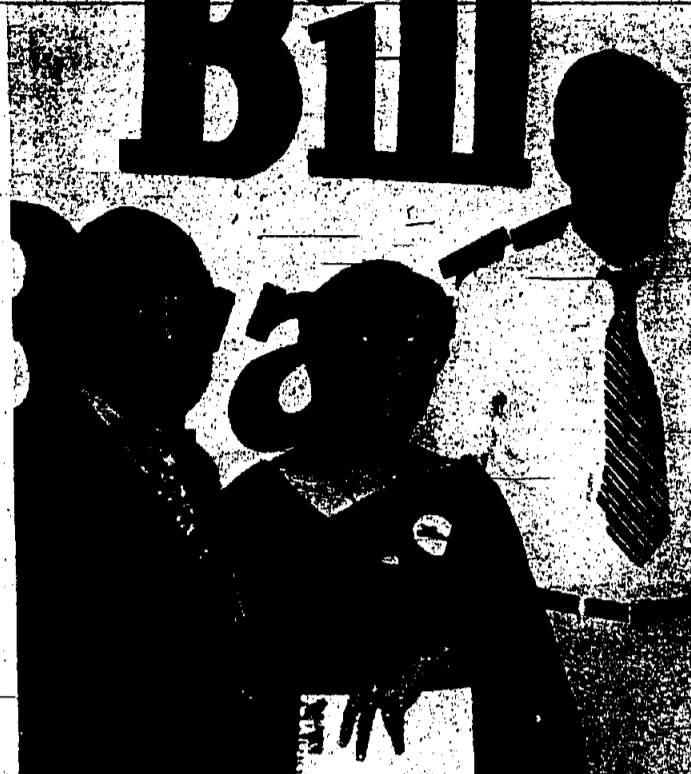

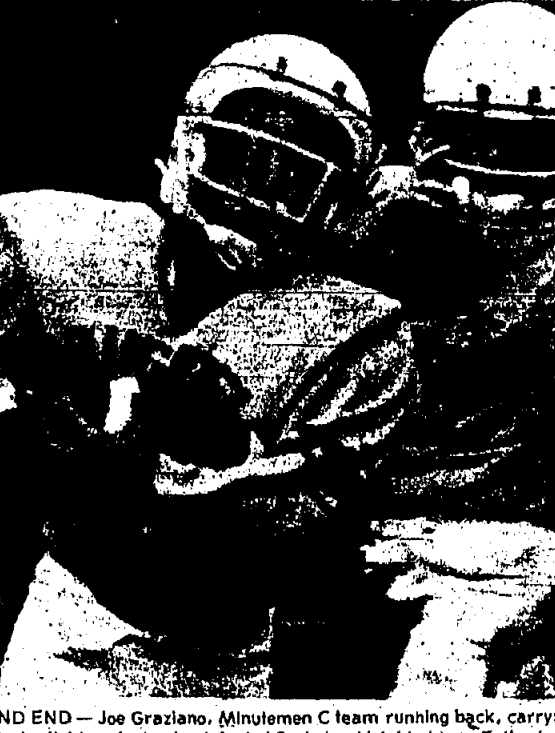
