Growing Older

EARLY RETIREMENT
 Some observers continue to claim that the United States can't afford to persist with a trend toward early retirement. During hearings of the Senate Special Committee on Aging recently, administration officials pointed out that the trend could become especially significant when the post-World War II baby boom eventually blossoms into a senior citizen boom.
 Early retirement poses problems—particularly with its ensuing Social Security costs and loss of skilled workers. Thirty years ago, it was pointed out to the Senate Committee, nearly half of all America's men over 65 were employed or seeking work. By comparison, today among people 65 and over, only one man in five and one woman in 12 are in the work force.
 One reason for the "early retirement" trend is that more and more Americans are financially able to retire early. Social Security benefits have been expanded—with full pensions paid at age 65—and some retiring at 60 with reduced benefits. In addition, nearly half of all the workers in the private sector of the economy are covered by pension plans—many with retirement at ages 60, 65, and even 50.

For the Birds UC marks 50 years with a written history

As we drove around the curve from the Garden State Parkway to the New Jersey Turnpike, six crows were perched on six consecutive light poles, peering down on the busy traffic like gargoyles atop a medieval cathedral. They'd learned that cars often kill unwary birds and animals, and they were seemingly waiting to swoop down and make a meal of the carrier.

My earliest recollection of a crow goes back to my eighth birthday when my parents gave me "The Burgess Bird Book for Children." For 45 nights thereafter, my mother read me one of these stories just before she turned out my light. Blacky the Crow figured prominently in two, one revealing his mean side and the other his good, edifying the argument that still rages around the habits of these big black birds. When Welcome and Mrs. Robin lost their eggs to an unknown predator, Blacky was one of the suspects. Later Blacky saved a warning to Peter Rabbit when he spotted Ruddy the Fox in Old Pasture looking for dinner.

More recently, when I talked to a local garden club about birds, the husband of the hostess said, "The only bird I know is a crow." Many reiterate his remark. Crows are probably more deeply ingrained in our folklore than any other member of the avian population.

At the track on our way from the clubhouse to the winner's circle, we can stop by the bar and have a shot of Old Crow, or over our winnings at the 12 window, perhaps eat crow if the horse we bragged about was scratched and describe the loser as crowball. If there's a discussion about the next race we may pick a crow or argue about a possible winner that's crow black in color. Out in the country, a farmhouse deep in the woods at the top of the gabled roof and the saddle horse in the pasture may have learned to crow hop, a jump made by a horse with stiff legs and arched back.

"The farmer may have hired a crow keeper, a fellow to scare crows away from his crops, or he may use a scarecrow. Should we walk across the pasture, perhaps a mile or so from the house as the crow flies, we may find crows' feet or crow's foot violets. The farmer's wife may have crow's feet at the corner of her eyes from squinting into the sun, or if she wears her eye clothes, crow's feet may refer to the eyeholes at the end of a seam. Perhaps leaning against the back of the chair because one end is bent shaped, those who farm the soil which are school of fish from the crow's nest. Crows have a questionable record when it comes to their relationship with humans. They're voracious feeders and readily adapt their taste to the changing seasons and available food supply. They eat enormous numbers of harmful insects. However, they do love corn on the cob and often eat their fill, destroying a portion of the crop.

Crows appear their blackest against the fallen snow just as blue jays look their bluest and cardinals their reddest. Next time you walk outdoors, look up. Should you spot three crows, it means great good luck.

A 50 year history of Union College, Cranford, will be written to commemorate the College's golden anniversary in 1988. It was announced by Dr. Saul Orkin, college president.

Commissioned as historian is Prof. Donald Raichle of Short Hills, professor of history at Kean College of New Jersey. Union, Raichle recently completed a history of Kean College.

Union College was founded in 1928 as Union County Junior College as a WPA Project. With an initial enrollment of 243 students, it first opened its doors in 1933 at Abraham Clark High School in Roselle.

The college, with its Urban Educational Centers in Elizabeth and Plainfield and its community projects throughout Union County, today has a total enrollment of approximately 12,000 students. These include 5,000 full- and part-time students working toward degrees.

In cooperation with Union County Technical Institute, Scotch Plains, Union College under contract with the Union County Coordinating Agency for Higher Education provides public community college services for Union County in lieu of a county campus.

In addition to its Cranford campus and the Urban Centers, Union College operates a CETA-funded Learning Resource Center in the Eastern Union County YMCA in Elizabeth, conducts a program at the Elizabethport Learning Center and will soon open a Skills Training Center at 10 Butler street, Elizabeth. Courses and other programs are also offered at high schools, hospitals, senior citizen projects and other locations throughout Union County.

New quarters for county unit

The Union County Department of Human Resources, which had been renting quarters at 208 Commerce st., Elizabeth, has just moved into the new Union County administration building on Elizabethtown Plaza at Railway Avenue.

The new \$4.5 million dollar facility, built exclusively with federal money, is expected to save the county thousands of dollars in rents, a county spokesman said.

Occupying the entire fourth floor of the new facility will be the administrative offices of the Human Resources' divisions of employment and training, aging, fiscal management, planning, youth services, the nutrition program, the mental health board, management information systems and the office of veterans' interest.

29 children in shelters, waiting for foster parents

Some 29 children are being housed in shelters while waiting for foster homes in Essex and Union Counties, according to Rose Zeller, supervisor of the Division of Youth and Family Services' Adoption Resource Center in the Metropolitan Region.

Of the children waiting, 20 are white, two are black and seven are Hispanic. Zeller said that because there is a scarcity of white children available for adoption, many people have the misconception that the same scarcity applies to white children needing foster care.

"There are hundreds of families willing to adopt white children, yet children of all races and ages, who need foster homes as desperately as others need permanent ones, are sitting in shelters because of the lack of foster families," she added. "The mutual need of parents to parent and children to have parents is going unmet because of an under-estimation of the rewards of foster parenting."

Foster parents are needed for children of all ages and races. Zeller said, but especially for teenagers in Union and Essex Counties. The Division of Youth and Family Services pay a monthly stipend to cover the cost of room and board and clothing for the child. All medical costs related to the child are also covered under Medicaid.
