

I'm referring to the amount of weekday fire protection they receive between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. The number of firefighters responding to a fire is limited to the three or four paid members on duty and the average, five or six volunteers.

Fire Chief (Robert) Day once tried to remedy the manpower situation by inviting women who are home during the day to join the volunteer division of the Fire Department.

However, the volunteers responded by creating a physical criterion test that prospective members must pass to become a permanent member of the volunteer department. These standards were meant in part to keep "physically inferior" people out of the department.

But while I was a member of the volunteers, I was subjected to continuous harassment from the regular firefighters and the volunteer division.







The State We're In

BY DAVID F. MOORE

There is a growing need for man and water everywhere to become better acquainted with the environmental perils which are being identified all around us. This is especially true in New Jersey, which with its high concentration of people and industries is probably worse off than most other states.

Let's stick to the question of the water we drink. Lots has been said about present and future water supply problems, but the quality of our water is becoming a matter of grave concern. Two things bring this to mind: One is an announcement by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) of completion of the second half of a well-testing program covering the entire state. Testing was for some 30 dangerous substances, including various pesticides, chemicals and heavy metals like mercury, cadmium or lead.

All these substances are considered toxic, and many are recognized as carcinogens, or cancer-causing agents. The unpleasant news from DEP is that, although practically all wells met existing federal quality guidelines, practically all showed a trace of at least one or more of the 30 listed substances. When a well becomes tainted, there is small likelihood that it will improve, and quite a chance it will get worse.

The other thing is the federal Safe Drinking Water Act, and regulations being acted by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to enforce it. The act sets national goals for water quality, but achieving them is strictly up to the local water company and the state. Depending on the problems, improvements can vary widely in costs—which can vary widely in water users.

I doubt if you'll disagree when I say that some important monetary decisions—in which costs will be weighed against probable health risks—are coming into view. Even if you won't also involve decisions, they will just be moving the lives of you and your loved ones.

As the person at the receiving end of all these unpleasant circumstances, you should be ready and willing to help government make intelligent decisions about your own future. Even if you are willing, chances are you are not ready to make the entire question of local water quality decisions—many of which will be made by the DEP—on your own.

What to do? Pay more attention to the news that comes out in the way of news about pollution, and to arguments about the relative merits of spending money to control pollution.

Send in your comments, and try to analyze the "angle" which probably motivates those who argue against local environmental controls.

There's always an angle in these things, and it usually is involved with the politics of greed.

Above all, pay attention to what EPA and DEP are saying. Both are conscientious, honest agencies which take seriously their responsibilities to the public for which they work. This is especially true now, because many of the decisions that are to be made by public officials are not technical ones, but they must assess public feeling on how much risk folks want to take.

So don't just sit back and leave it all up to DEP. Show up at public meetings where possible, write letters, and ask questions.

Assemblyman seeks review of state rules

Assemblyman Donald T. DiFrancesco (R-22) this week called for immediate senate action on a measure designed to eliminate needless government regulations and cut bureaucratic waste.

The bill to create a joint legislative oversight committee would review proposed government regulations passed in the Assembly by a vote of 8-11, now awaits Senate action.

DiFrancesco, the bill's co-sponsor, said "the function of legislative oversight is to ensure that the intent of each law is carried out by the executive branch in the most efficient way possible."

"Sometimes bureaucratic regulations designed to meet legislative goals create more paperwork and add more cost than necessary," DiFrancesco added. "A system of review by the lawmakers who wrote the legislation can catch mistakes and administrative rules before they are put into effect."

DiFrancesco pointed out that cutting government costs will aid in the fight against inflation and ailed President Carter's anti-inflation message stressed legislative oversight as a means of reducing government costs.

"It is estimated that the total cost of federal regulation is over \$100 million this year alone," said DiFrancesco. "State rules are also costly, and must be promulgated with an eye toward efficiency."
