9 'strategies' studied for solid waste

(FIRST OF TWO ARTICLES)
By ADA BELINER
Nine different "strategies" for disposing of solid wastes are being studied by an advisory committee in Union County. But any decision is months away and putting that decision into effect—whatever it may be—lies years in the future.

Wednesday of each month, received the "strategies" last week from Michael DiStasio, executive director of the Waste Management Association of Union County. The proposals were presented for general information, not as recommendations, DiStasio emphasized. They are:

—Hacksack Meadows plan, at Kearny, North Arlington or possibly other sites in the meadowlands.
—Transfer to out-of-county sites, and resource recovery.
—Combustion Equipment Associates facility, Newark. This would involve refuse-derived fuel (RDF), with some front-end recovery, according to the report.

—Middlesex County plan, location undetermined. This involves landfill and resource recovery.
—Port Authority of New York and New Jersey proposal, at Jersey City or Newark. Mass burning or RDF would produce steam to generate electricity, with some front-end recovery.
—Union County refuse processing facility, location undetermined. This calls for combustion for steam or electric production, with front-end recovery where cost-effective. Transfer stations could be used to reduce haulage costs.

Merck Company proposal, at Rahway-Linden. RDF would provide steam, with ferrous recovery.
—Port Authority proposal, at Elizabeth. Mass burning or RDF would produce steam for generating electricity.
—Hess Corp. proposal, at Clark, Elizabeth or Linden. RDF would involve mass burning for steam.

—Union County refuse processing facility, location undetermined. This calls for combustion for steam or electric production, with front-end recovery where cost-effective. Transfer stations could be used to reduce haulage costs.



The advisory committee is reviewing the options for the Board of Freeholders, which must come up with a long-range plan in the next few months. But the board, whose original deadline for adopting a plan was April 6, has taken advantage of a state offer of additional time and asked the Department of Environmental Protection for an extension to June 11.

Special election may be canceled

State Senators John Gregorio and Anthony Russo, Union County Democrats, yesterday announced they will introduce a resolution to cancel the special election March 13 for the State Senate seat from District 22.

If the Gregorio-Russo resolution passes, the seat will be filled in the November general election. Republican Peter McDonough resigned the seat with almost three years of his term remaining.

The State Senate voted a week ago to schedule the special election.

Incumbents seek return to K-8 seats

The senior members of the Springfield Board of Education, Laura Rosenbaum and Gregory Clarke, last week said they will seek re-election in April—despite doubts about whether a board member has much power to control the destiny of the community school system.

The third incumbent, Barbara Adler, had already announced she would seek re-election to a full, three-year term after being appointed three months ago to succeed Glenn Slurry, who resigned. The nine-person board governs local schools from kindergarten through eighth grade (K-8).

Neither Rosenbaum, the board president, nor Clarke, the policy chairman, issued any formal announcement of a reelection campaign, but responded to newspaper questions about potential candidacies.

"It was a hard decision," said Clarke about his reelection bid. "One really wants to represent the community—that's not the problem. But one can't help wondering whether the state is leaving the local board member much real power to accomplish community goals."

Mancino hits Rajoppi, spouse, 'lib-only' base

Kenilworth Mayor Livio Mancino declared this week that he will run for the Democratic nomination for the New Jersey Senate against Joanne Rajoppi, wife of the county's Democratic party chairman.

"Harry Pappas gave his wife a pro-Dem seat; the Senate seat; only he forgot to ask the Democrats first," Mancino charged. "The nomination can't be removed between husband and wife like a Master Charge card."

He noted that Pappas ran unsuccessfully for the Democratic nomination in the last campaign. Mancino claimed "a handful of Democrats" on the screening committee was "pressured by Pappas" to favor Rajoppi, who is married to Pappas.

The Kenilworth mayor claimed Pappas' wife is a "one-issue candidate" whose major legislative goal is to promote the women's liberation movement in New Jersey.

Mancino blamed Pappas for the defeat of the Union County Democratic ticket in the last election. Pappas' defeat, he charged, was due to "back-room pressure and threats of political reprisals."

School board plans series on activities, news

The Board of Education next week will begin a series of feature articles in the Springfield Leader entitled "Your School Board and You." A board spokesman said the series will run weekly through April 5 and every two weeks throughout the rest of the school year.

Regional board back at Dayton

The Union County Regional High School District's central administrative staff moved into offices at the Jonathan Dayton campus in Springfield during the weekend.

"It's good to be home again—back in a school where we see students in the hallways," said Dr. Donald Merachnik, regional superintendent.

The central administrative staff of the four-campus system had moved out of Dayton in the early 1970s, when the office space was needed for classrooms. The central staff reappropriated seven classrooms in the wake of declining enrollment.

Administrators said the seven-classroom remodeling project, costing about \$116,000, is expected to pay for itself within three years. Rent had been about \$39,000 for privately-owned offices elsewhere in Springfield.

Dem screeners back Rajoppi for Senate

Former Springfield Mayor Joanne Rajoppi, vice-chairperson of the Union County Board of Freeholders, was selected by Democratic screeners last week to run for the unexpired State Senate term vacated by Peter McDonough in District 22.

At a special meeting of the Political Action Committee of the Regular Democratic Organization of Union County, held in Rahway, the Board of Trustees tapped Rajoppi to carry the Democratic banner in the 1978 election.

Rajoppi, who has a B.A. degree cum laude from Case Western Reserve University in Ohio, served as director of the High Summer School for Journalism, staff writer for the Newark Evening News and as a freelance writer. She is the editor of the New Jersey Carpenters Funds publications.

In 1975 Rajoppi served as vice president of the Springfield Board of Education before her election to the Springfield Township Committee. In 1977 she was elected Springfield's first woman mayor.

Fire company beginning drive

The Springfield Volunteer Fire Department will hold its annual fund drive on Sunday.

Firemen will go door to door to all houses and apartments in town, selling tickets to their fund-raising dance which will be held Saturday night, Feb. 17. The price of the tickets will be \$1 per person.

In the past, the volunteers have used the Springfield fire truck as a mobile fund-raising device. Recent purchases have included warning lights and sirens for the fire trucks, and the "waves-of-life" rescue tool which has been used to rescue many people trapped in cars since the purchase almost two years ago.

Princeton defeats Cornell in Ivy battle for first

With almost half the regulation season over, undefeated Princeton is in sole possession of first place in the Ivy League. Cornell and Brown are tied with 3-1 records; Columbia and Harvard share third with 2-2. Princeton and Cornell could not be tied by the previously undefeated squad in a battle for first place Saturday as Princeton took a 14-12 quarter lead. The final tally was 41-40 and controlled the backboards at each end, converting offensive rebounds into points and defensive ones into fast-break assists. Arc finished with 19 rebounds, six assists and a team high 29 points. Steve Swartz implemented Arc's game with a 14-point performance. Bill Marstein finished the four games very effectively against Cornell press and scored six points. Ken Dietz and Pat Durkin added two points apiece. Paul Gensore, Jack Zilli and Ron Kravitz slipped on defense.

David Gold had the majority of Cornell rebounds with 13 points. Mike Graziano had four steals and nine points. Matt Kuperstein and Eric Zars played superb defense and notched six points each. Eric Matlock had two points. Mark Silve and Jon Silverman supplied Cornell.

Harvard took its second victory of the season and handed Yale its third defeat in an exciting overtime decision, 33-30. Harvard led a first-period 14-10 edge but Yale led 22-21 at halftime. Princeton took the lead in the third quarter. Harvard turned the contest around in the fourth quarter as the result of a hounding press, the sharpshooting of guard Danny Spots and the fouling out of Yale's David Kadish. John Baber sank two fouls and Harvey led by four with less than a minute to go. Yale's Richard Hinkley got a pass inside and cut the edge to two. He got the ball back and, with eight seconds showing on the clock, hit a turn-around jumper from 20 feet to send the teams into overtime, knotted at 36.

Harvard got six points from Pete Pelton, Baber and Spots to win. Kyle Hodgins played well in each quarter for Cornell with 18 points and 21 rebounds. Spots added 17 points.

Weiss talks to teachers on new law

New state law allows for greater flexibility in the way tenured teachers are evaluated. The law also allows the Springfield Teachers' Association (STA) a recent meeting.

Mrs. Weiss, superintendent of schools, said the new law should help meet the individual needs of communities.

She also reported on discussions of teacher evaluation that took place at a special session held during the New Jersey Education Association convention last November in Atlantic City.

The local meeting was called to update members on developments in teacher evaluation and to express concern to the Teachers' Association, the school board, school administrators and parents, according to a spokesman for the STA.

Spill research funds on hand

The state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has announced the availability of approximately \$300,000 for oil and chemical spill research and the development of improved spill prevention and removal techniques.

DEP is seeking research proposals from academic, private and government sectors to explore a wide range of technical, engineering and biological spill research. Funds for the project come from the interest accrued on the New Jersey Spill Compensation Fund, implemented by the Byrne Administration in April 1977.

Dr. Glenn Paulson, DEP's Assistant Commissioner for Science and Research, said "DEP is encouraging research on the effects of spills of oil and hazardous substances on the marine environment, especially on the prevention of spills, as well as the development of better cleanup and removal operations when they occur."

The deadline for receiving proposals is March 1. Proposals for up to \$25,000 state funding will be accepted; projects with multiple sponsors and participants also are welcome. Final notification of accepted proposals will be made about May 1.

FDU to display African works

A collection of African ebony sculptures from the Makonde tribes of Tanzania will be on display in Friendship Library at the Florham-Madison Campus of Fairleigh Dickinson University on Sunday, Feb. 4, through Friday, March 2.

The ebonyes are owned by Benjamin Drey, assistant professor of anthropology and director of the department of social sciences at the Fairleigh Dickinson Florham-Madison Campus.

The exhibit will feature three types of figures: those portraying the everyday occupations of the tribesmen, the spiritual spirits, and abstract forms that are "aesthetically pleasing," Drey said.

The nature of the fire determines whether all the appropriate support or if the volunteers are to stand by in case help is needed or another alarm comes in. For the Birds

By Farris Swackhammer

Try filling a container, its opening about the size of your head, with sunflower seed. Push your head in, sealed and sealed. You will see the seed. Now pull your head out, rotate the seed in your teeth, removing the hull and withdrawing the seed. No harm, mind you. Sounds complicated, well, what's the point? House finches do it every morning on the feeder outside our kitchen window.

Watching finches do this always fascinates me. Many years ago my Dad and I used to watch them. We would sit on the porch and watch them. We would see them flying in the sky and then down to the feeder. We would see them pecking at the seed and then pulling it out. We would see them eating it and then spitting out the hull. We would see them doing this over and over again. We would see them doing this every day.

As I watch house finches outside our window, I am struck by differences in their plumage. Some have an all red head, while others seem to have red and white. Their side-burns turn grayish brown. Some have a prominent rump, others have an almost brown eye.

Over weeks when I am home all day, I fill the feeder at least twice and often three times a day. A one pound can hold just the right amount of seed for four periods. I try to keep the seed fresh. I try to keep the seed dry. I try to keep the seed clean. I try to keep the seed safe. I try to keep the seed healthy. I try to keep the seed happy.

Chickadees generally put away about a seventh of their own weight in fat each day. They use this fat to keep warm. They use it to keep their feathers dry. They use it to keep their feet warm. Watching our backyard feeder has had to fascinating discoveries. One winter we had a blue jay that didn't have a tail. The lack didn't seem to hinder his coming and going, however.

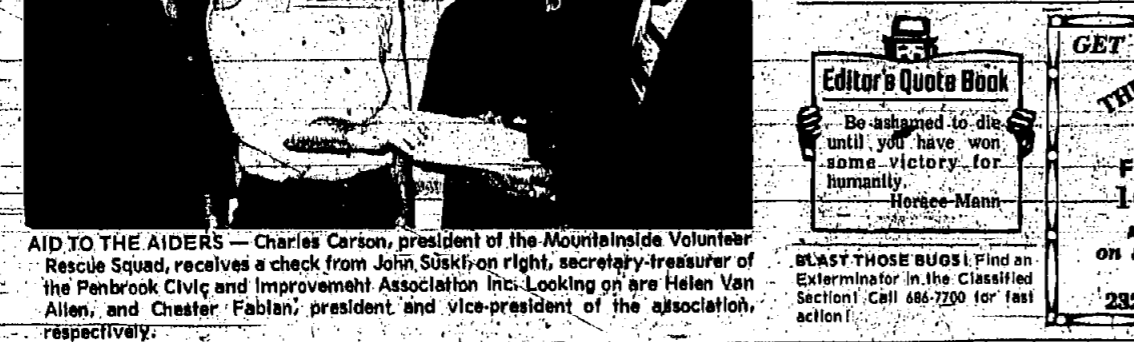

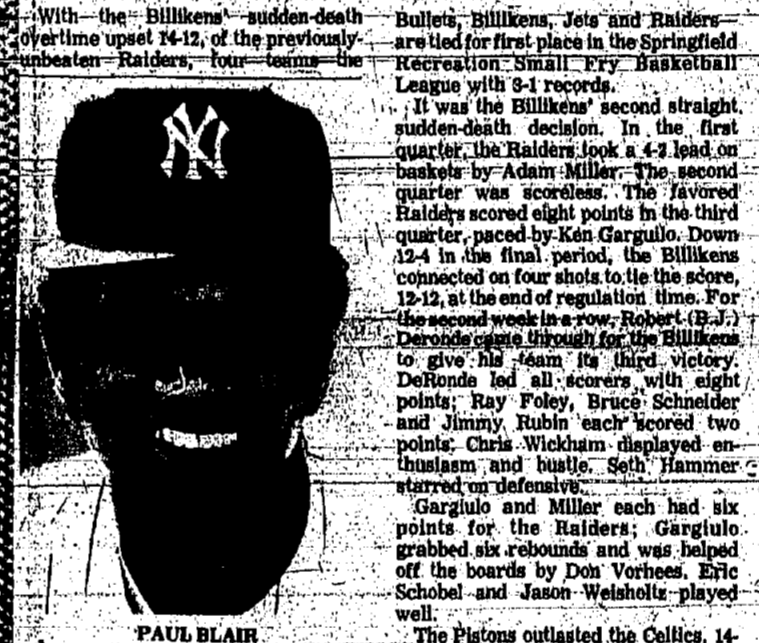
