The Parkland Preservation Fund, the nonprofit organization which has supported the battle to "save the Watching Reservation and nearby towns in Union County from dissection by proposed Interstate 78," this week announced that its long-fought fundraising campaign has been boosted by a matching grant of \$1,000 by the Watching Nature Club.

"According to a spokesman for the group, money received before Sunday, up to \$1,000 total, will be matched dollar-for-dollar by the Watching Nature Club. Money received after this date cannot be applied to this grant, but is also important to reach campaign goals," a spokesman said.

"It is important that everyone who is concerned for our vanishing open space resource invests in the future of the watching by making a contribution," said Jonathan Roth, a group member. "Now is an especially good time to send in a donation, because of the matching fund," a spokesman said.

In the past, funds have been used by the Parkland Preservation Fund to help pay the costs of an attorney hired separately by both the organization and the town of Springfield. The fund also commissioned a traffic study which diagnosed the present plans for the highway link as inadequate.

Springfield at library talks

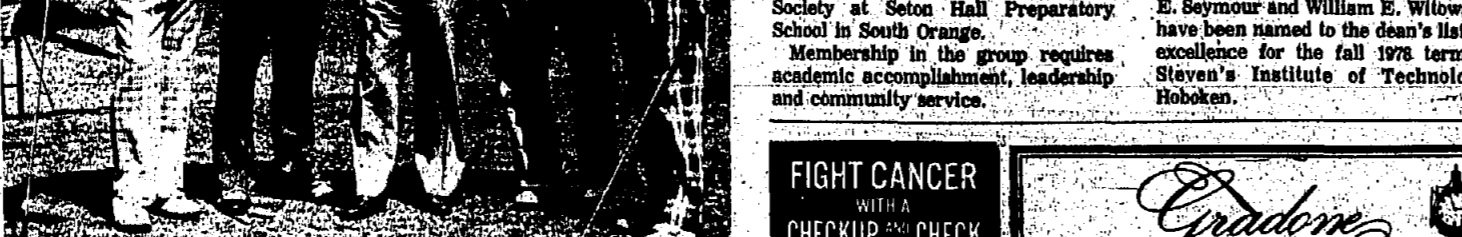

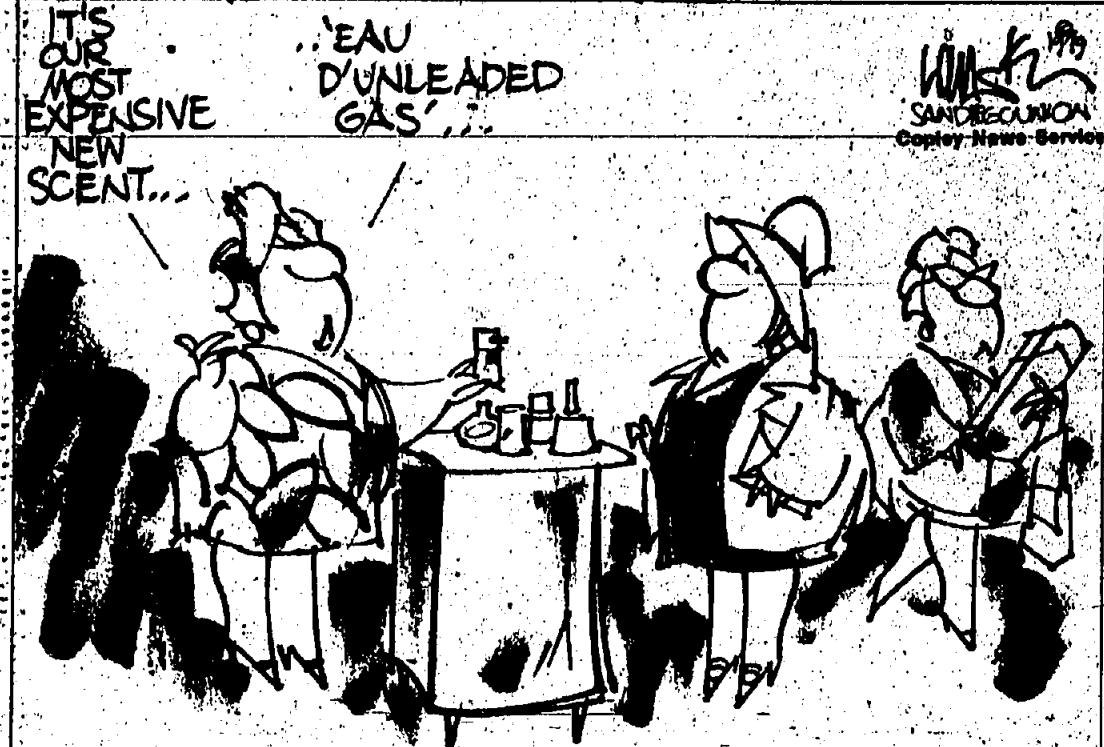

Death and Dying: Challenge and Change

Editor's note: This is the 12th in a series of 15 articles exploring "Death and Dying: Challenge and Change." In this article, Robert Veatch of the Institute of Society, Ethics, and the Life Sciences examines some of the ethical issues related to death and dying.

Eighty-year-old Granger Evans was in respiratory crisis when pneumonia. Cancer had engulfed his body; doctors believed it would eventually take his life.

Technology has given us new choices. Fifty years ago, if you would have died of pneumonia, there was no treatment. Ten years ago he would have been treated with "antibiotics."

THE DUTY TO PROLONG LIFE... The treatment of Karen Ann Quinlan—the comatose young woman whose parents wanted her kept on life support—has become controversial.

DEFINING DEATH... Our new ability to prolong dying raises another question: When is a patient dead? The answer is not as simple as it once was.

ETHICS... "Ethics" is a term so confusing it ought to be abandoned. It is the most debatable, ethical issue of death and dying.

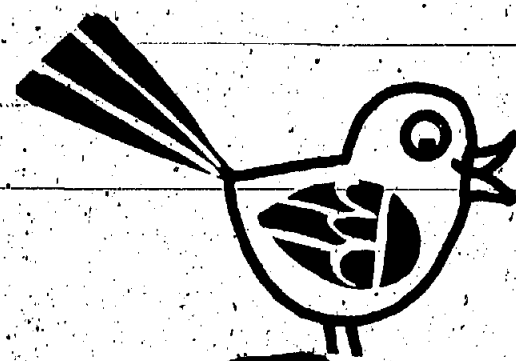

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Students cross lines to expand education

Sixty-five students from four educational institutions in New Jersey are crossing campus boundaries—not to protest or picket but to expand their academic horizons under a consortium arrangement.

The 65 are enrolled in 149 courses at the four institutions which comprise the Consortium of East Jersey, Union College, in Cranford, Union County Technical Institute in Scotch Plains, Seton Hall University in South Orange, and Kean College of New Jersey in Union.

The consortium was formed to explore ways in which they could cooperate with each other and offer maximum educational opportunities and services within the existing economic framework.

In effect, board members indicated, they are leaving the door open either to let the PTA handle it or to let a school directly charge students for most non-teaching expenses of a field trip.

The new option was unanimous support Monday night from eight board members. The ninth member had been attending by telephone, the press elsewhere and arrived after the field-trip policy discussion.

"We even cover families with a medical program that saves them a lot of money," said Dick. He said the medical program is extended through the first 90 days of employment.

Dick said the welfare board will disburse approximately \$2 million this year to county recipients. He estimated that nearly \$3 million a year is swindled. On an average, he said his office investigates about 2,000 alleged fraud cases each year.

Dick and his nine associates will be able to detect fraud more efficiently in July, when an automated system will be installed in the Elizabeth office, he said. He said the new system will computerize the names of all welfare recipients through Social Security numbers.

"The printouts from the federally automated record system will include each year in the number who was the most points won for the team during a full season."
