Pupils march in opposition to final exams

 About 70 of the 310 seniors at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School marched on Monday morning in a protest aimed primarily at final examinations, which are scheduled June 14 through 20. Kinch and Tompkins negotiated conditional amnesty from school suspension for students who went inside by 10:15. Student leader Frank White, who had been arrested, thanked the police before the whole crowd marched indoors.

Author's letters opened

The Springfield Public Library lists the following titles among the recently received books:

A MASTER CRAFTSMAN
"Selected Letters of Conrad Aiken" edited by Joseph Kilborn

Post novelist, short story writer, critical essayist, Aiken was never a prominent public figure. He was too reluctant to make public appearances or to reveal his private life—twice he left the U.S. to avoid accepting public honors. Yet he married three times, had many close friends and enjoyed good conversation.

His letters, of which he had written thousands, were varied—warm, ribald, passionate or glib, gossipy, depressing, helpful, bitter, gossipy, ribald, passionate or glib. These 246 selected examples cover more than 75 years (1898-1973). They range from the domestic to the professional, disclosing important events in his life, accounts of his far-flung residences, his literary and social relationships and the literary scene at home and in England.

Born in Savannah in 1898, he was the son of a doctor who took his own life and his wife's when Conrad was eleven. Adopted by an uncle and separated from his siblings, his early life was lonely and uneventful. But at Harvard, he met his early friend Tom Eliot, also interested in poetry. Conrad traveled constantly, from New Bedford, to Cape Cod, to England, to New York and ultimately to Savannah, where he died in 1973. He worked assiduously at his craft, corresponded with family and friends faithfully and then to survive in it.

Tom tells of his thrilling adventures with the wild dogs in the Pine Barrens (first alone, then with Rick), and of the sad departure of Rick and Stalking Wolf from his life. But two years later, at 18, he ventured forth alone, from New Jersey to the West—the Grand Tetons, the Badlands, Grand Canyon—to master his craft. One of his most gratifying experiences, he writes, was in 1977, was helping to track down, and save, a mentally retarded man.

PRIME TIME Hypertension and age

It is an ironic coincidence that our country's commemorative calendar is so crowded that the celebration of Older Americans Month must share the month of May with National Hypertension Month.

Carrying the coinherence a step further is the fact that there are now approximately 23 million Americans over the age of 65, and approximately 23 million Americans who suffer from hypertension, which by the medical name for what is commonly referred to as high blood pressure.

Not all of the 23 million Americans over 65 have high blood pressure, although a fair percentage of them do, and not all people who suffer from hypertension are over 65 although many obviously are.

Where the irony comes in is in the realization that many of the people who have high blood pressure are well under age 65. In fact, the incidence of hypertension is quite natural. During exertion or excitement—or when you're sick or in pain—your blood pressure tends to rise, but falls when you're relaxed or asleep. Between these two extremes is your normal level. Should that level be constantly high, then there is reason for concern—and for doing something about correcting your situation.

One thing hypertension is not, notes the BU report, is "a condition brought about by being 'hypertensive' or tense. Hypertension is not nervous tension; there is no established relationship between hypertension and being strained or 'upright,' conversely, a relaxed, easygoing manner is no guarantee against high blood pressure.... The incidence of hypertension, though, in 1979, does correlate with particular occupations or lifestyles. You don't have to be an executive or operate on a hospital schedule to get it."

If you're interested in learning more about hypertension, information is available from the High Blood Pressure Information Center, 150-49 Hill, Bethesda, MD, 20814; from the American Heart Association, 44 East 23rd Street, New York City 10010; and on the shelves of your local library or bookstore.

Above all, be sure to have your blood pressure tested. It may be the best way to celebrate Older Americans Month, and to make sure that you'll be able to celebrate many more.
