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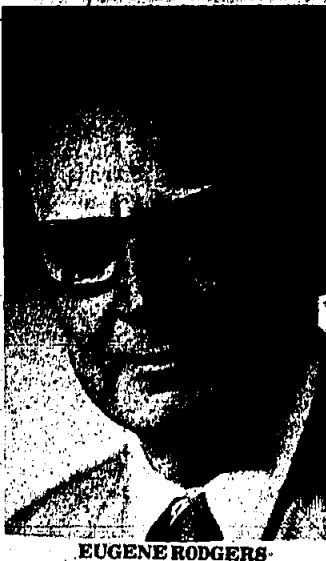

Proctor calls grants system a poor process

Rick Proctor, candidate for the Democratic nomination for state Assembly in the 22nd District, which includes Berkeley Heights, Chatham, Clark, Fenwick, Kenilworth, Mountainside, Plainfield, Rahway, Scotch Plains and Springfield this week labeled the current system of state grants to municipalities an inefficient jumble of paperwork.

"Because of the ill-conceived grant system, municipalities are forced to provide narrow based services and make questionable purchases to receive their full share of state aid," Proctor said. "In effect, taxpayers are paying twice for one service. By broadening the specifications for state aid, Trenton could save at least \$40,000,000 a year."

Proctor also assailed a grant program recently set up by the State Department of Energy designed to give out \$50 million over three years. "The program pays for three energy audits when only one would be sufficient and provides no funding for the capital improvements necessary to save fuel," he said. "The DOE is basically doing no more than filling 129,000 file cabinets full of paper. Instead, the money could be used to purchase 100,000 solar panels."

Proctor, the director of health in Scotch Plains, said he entered the Democratic primary for State Assembly because he believes that his seven years of experience in dealing with the state government give him a good perspective on how to make Trenton more efficient.

Proposition 13, wherein the voters in California took the tax collector by the throat and redirected that state's fiscal course, has attracted a lot of attention and spawned adherents all over the place, including New Jersey.

While it's hard to compare New Jersey apples and California oranges, as it were, it's even harder not to try. Especially in my case, because I've been wondering about Proposition 13's impact on open space preservation in California.

My curiosity is aroused even more because of the current excitement over New Jersey's bold move to preserve the precious values of the Pinelands so that future generations in this state we're in won't be environmentally short-changed in terms of quality water supplies, agricultural lands and open space needs.

As this is written, incidentally, the New Jersey Senate is heading for a vote on the Pinelands Protection Act (S. 3081), with the vote slated to occur before this appears in print. The word is that the bill sponsored by Sen. Joseph P. Merloni of Mercer County and Charles B. Yates of Burlington County, should survive a senate vote. But it needs support in the assembly.

This bill would establish the laws to carry out Pinelands protection. Its adoption would be in tune with the precepts of federal legislation last year which authorized the Pinelands National Reserve, and it would provide the permanent framework to supersede temporary Pinelands controls directed

by Gov. Brendan T. Byrne last February.

I've questioned justification for the strong objections to Pinelands controls being orchestrated by various builders and developers. I questioned whether there is a real likelihood of continued public demand for housing in the Pinelands, but I didn't mean to imply that there is not an urgent need for permanent Pinelands protection; there is. Just a few buildings in the wrong places can spoil a lot of space for all time.

My doubts about continuing demands for Pinelands housing are based on two factors: the impending shut-down of F.L. Dix, with thousands of houses made empty because of personnel transfers and disappearance of support jobs, and the growing petroleum crisis, which is going to make anybody think twice about putting down roots in open space locations, since it will be needed for employment.

New Jersey has a similar law, called the cap law. Its impacts thus far have not been felt in land-use terms—yet—but that's just because we haven't recognized the impact sprawl has on local tax bases. We should be examining the cap law's potential open space consequences, since it could provide another deterrent to Pinelands development.

Meanwhile, I'm urging everyone I know to contact their delegates to the assembly to urge support for S. 3081. If they don't know who their 2nd assemblyman are, I tell them to check with their municipal clerk.

—Appointed Donna Woods as a guidance teacher in the Park Youngsters Devoe Early Education program, to give the staff time for advance planning of a kindergarten project, starting next fall.

The Springfield board received a special state grant for a pilot program in integrating hearing-handicapped children into a regular kindergarten class.

—Tentatively approved payment of another \$14,500 for supplies and service toward rehabilitation of the heating system at Florence Gaudinier School. Dr. Fred Baruchin, school superintendent, predicted that the final total will run roughly \$55,000, well below the \$80,000 bid which the board rejected after formal bidding on the work.

The board proceeded with placement work on an emergency basis after hearing breakdowns and the failure to give bids within budgeted estimates. But each of the two contractors, E. Baumann, the engineering firm which the board blamed on its estimating problems, offered to lower fees from the total bid amount to a percentage of revised costs. The board approved a \$3,475 partial payment to the engineering firm. The \$14,500 for supplies and service was ordered pending engineers' approval of the work.

County offers variety of ways to enjoy summer without travel

Recreational programs and services offered by the Union County Department of Parks and Recreation were listed this week by the agency which said there is no need to curtail vacation plans because of the energy crunch.

Union County offers a wide variety of activities including golf, tennis and boating—within minutes of home, according to Jack Stopp, superintendent of recreation.

Gallop Hill at 27-hole course including through Kenilworth and Union, is characterized by rolling hills and challenging lies. The oldest course, it has been ranked by Golf Digest as the "best low-hill and up-hill test."

Adjacent to the Ash Brook and Gallop Hill Golf Courses are nine-hole pitch and putt courses. Players enjoy a "quick round" in approximately 45 minutes.

Ash Brook Pitch and Putt is open daily from 9 a.m. to dark; Lighted Gallop Hill Pitch and Putt is open from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. Identification cards, purchased at the golf courses, are honored with discounts at these courses.

Cards providing discounts also are available at two Union County tennis facilities: Cedar Brook Park in Plainfield and Rahway River Park in Rahway. After purchasing the season cards, players may enjoy free tennis at these facilities during the week after Memorial Day weekend, when they will be supervised. Both parks are open daily from 9 a.m. to dark.

Young players and senior citizens may receive special rates at the 10 clay courts at Warman Park in Elizabeth and Rosalie. Warman's tennis courts are open from 9 a.m. to dark. Private lessons and the Junior Tennis Academy, similar to the 'golf academies, are held at these courts. Advanced registration is recommended.

Additional tennis facilities are located at Kewawees Park in Union and Union Park in Garwood. These hard-surfaced courts are open year-round at no cost to players.

The Watching Star stable site of lessons, horse shows and recreational riding, is tucked away in the Watching Reservation; 2,000 acres of natural ponds. Available on a hourly rental basis, you can ride English-style over 20 miles of bridle paths through the reservation. Riders are invited to bring the equestrian stable and to join the Watching Troop, an organized horseback riding program open to participants of all ages.

The stable, located on Glenside avenue, Summit, is open daily from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Applications are being accepted for the Summer Troop program which begins Monday, June 25. The stable is busy during the weekends. Sapp recommends advanced registration or visiting the stable on weekdays.

Boating enthusiasts can navigate across Echo Lake, located in Westfield and Mountainside, in a rowboat, canoe or a pedal boat Saturdays and Sundays from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. The lake at Warman Park offers rowing and pedal boating during the same hours.

During mid-June boating is available weekdays, except Mondays, with hour and half-hour rentals available.

Boat fees depend on the craft. Safety requirements stipulate that each person in a boat have a life preserver. A maximum of two can rent a canoe or a pedal boat, while a maximum of five can take out a rowboat.

Union County's trap, skeet, rifle and pistol facilities are open for competition on Wednesdays and Sundays from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Located in Lenape Park, Cranford, the rifle and pistol ranges are open weekdays evenings and on Wednesdays, while an expanded program for half-price rifle for senior citizens.

Bus line users asked to write DOT on needs

"Flow was only about 120 gpm at one of the two hydrants near Gov. Livingston and 400 gpm at the other, and both hydrants are supplied by the same line, without a loop into any other source. This cannot be said to be a satisfactory fire department, the report also pointed out.

At the Johnson campus in Clark, the test flow was 200 gpm. However, one of Clark's two fire stations is "directly adjacent to the school," the report noted.

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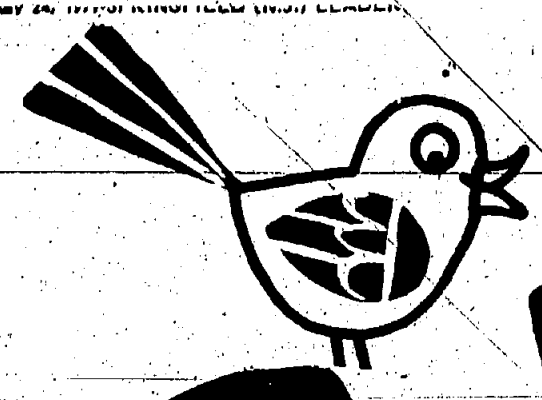

Good driving habits add mileage: AAA

For many motorists, good driving techniques can mean better fuel mileage and a longer car life. The AAA Automobile Club (AAA) advised this week.

"Studies conducted by one AAA club showed gasoline efficiency could be increased by as much as 46 percent if driving habits were improved over a typical stop-and-go commuter route," said Matthew J. Derham, club president.

Tips from the AAA include:

- Be the minute you fasten your safety belts and start on your engine.
- Avoid extended warm-ups when starting a cold engine. It may be necessary, on cold mornings, to depress the accelerator once to let the automatic choke, but any added pumping of the accelerator will only waste gas. Check the owner's manual for proper procedure.
- As soon as you are drivable, accelerate gently and drive slowly for a mile or so—your engine will warm up faster and you'll save fuel. If your car is equipped with a manual choke, push it part way in as soon as the engine is running, then push it all the way in as soon as the car is safely drivable.
- Avoid unnecessary idling—which can consume gas at the rate of a half gallon per hour—idling more than a minute will waste more gas than it takes to restart the engine.
- Don't rev the engine and then quickly shut it off. Thinking you're saving gas by re-start. Actually, you've dumped raw gasoline into the cylinder walls where it may wash away the protective oil film and increase engine wear when you restart. It also is a waste of fuel.
- Look well ahead to spot slowdowns and red lights. Pace yourself to reach them when they turn green, since a car uses more fuel when accelerating quickly from a complete stop. Keep a
