Juvenile delinquency not serious in India

Despite its poverty, committed to correctional institutions in India, researchers point out, is not serious problem in juvenile delinquency. Commitment is a last resort, preferable to leaving a child loose to roam the streets or be exploited in the streets. Even though correctional facilities are in Tamil Nadu alone, sanctioned by law budgets, (This state has a population of 41 million), the vast majority of young offenders are not incarcerated in a serious sense. Although a good deal of petty theft does occur, youngsters are most often charged with breaking non-drinking laws (Tamil Nadu is a dry state), sneaking rides on public transportation or vagrancy. According to Dr. Hartjen and Dr. Priyadarini, "Misbehavior... Children as victims of poverty, bad parents or unfortunate circumstances. Bus rules proposed for pupils

Regional board lists discipline guidelines. By CHARLES HORNER. Juvenile misbehaviors, late parking late sleepers, youthful chain-smokers, wisenheimerisms, cafeteria constabulary and hallway bullhorns, all are being warned. No less a power than the office of the superintendent of the Union County Regional High School has viewed these anti-social activities with disfavor, and has authorized the high schools to keep offenders indoors and working during the weekends. All student assignments must be reviewed by the teacher before the student leaves the classroom, and transportation to and from the penalty periods must be arranged by the student or his parents. Serious crimes such as drinking, drug use, possession of weapons or firearms, physical assault and occupation of school property will be punished with out-of-school suspension only.

Store's closing hours bring heated argument. By DANIEL P. JONES. An otherwise routine meeting of the Springfield Township Committee was punctuated by three heated debates between individual residents and committee members when the Tuesday night meeting was opened to public comment. Francis Crossell objected to Quik-Check, a convenience grocery store on Mountain Avenue, saying the store stayed open past the township's 9 p.m. closing time. Crossell, who lives around the corner from the store, objected vehemently also to the store opening at 6 a.m., insisting that a township ordinance lists opening time as 7 a.m. Crossell has objected to the store since it was first proposed some five years ago. Committee member Robert Wellechek said the store owners were given a summons for staying open after 9 and have complied with the township's closing time regulations. Crossell insisted that Wellechek assured him opening time would be 6 a.m. The resident asked, "what he called a 'damaging question' at Wellechek, shouting, 'Who are you covering up for?'" "That's a rotten lotta and I resent it," replied the committee member, while shouting. A copy of the ordinance was produced by Township Clerk Arthur Shuckman and opening and closing times were in fact 6 a.m. and 9 p.m. "Next before" the committee came when Zeller of the Springfield Environmental Committee, asking Mayor Stanley Kaish for a progress report on a county target shooting facility located in Lanape Park, which borders the southern portion of Springfield. Zeller cited an article in another newspaper, which read in part that all shooting facilities would be eliminated to complete a park flood-control system. He wanted to know why the committee has not taken a firm stand against construction of a new shooting facility in Lanape Park, the just northwest of the existing facility. Kaish commented that he cannot open Union County Park Department unless he offers an alternative.

Police urge fewer calls. Springfield police Captain Robert Tasse wants the public to know—if people jam the police switchboard with unnecessary calls, then they can't expect to be helped adequately during an emergency situation. "The switchboard accepts calls and 'stacks' them electronically," Tasse explained. "If there are 10 calls about whether or not school is in session and a call about a roof problem, the school calls come first, and the problem can't be handled until then." Tasse asked that calls about school closings and the like be directed to the proper numbers, and that non-essential calls be postponed during town emergencies.

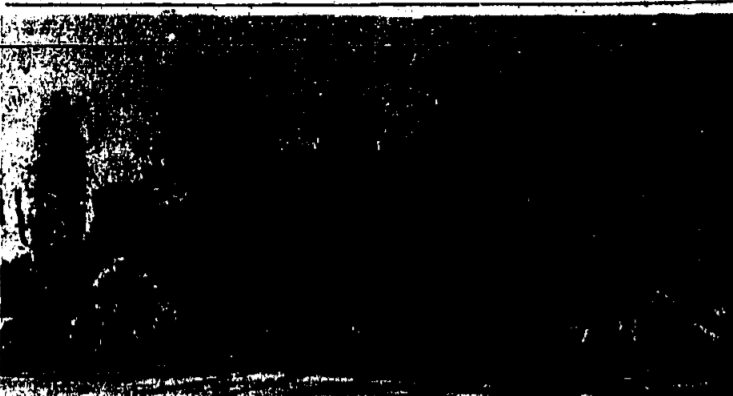

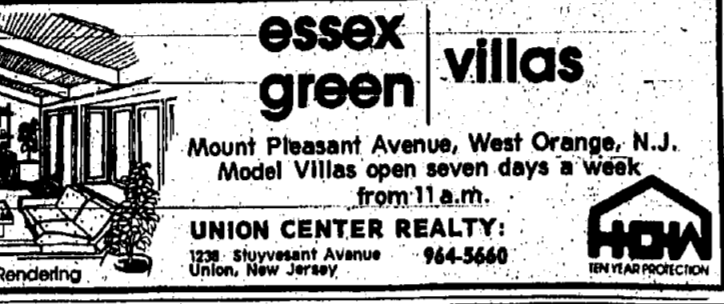
