The budget falls within the state-mandated cap figure of approximately 6.47 percent, which applies only to those expenditures that affect local taxes. Board members emphasized to the half-dozen residents at the meeting that all figures are tentative and subject to the county superintendent's approval. The gross budget figure for next year would be \$3,856,138, constituting a 3.48

percent increase over the budget for the nt—school—year.—The—protecte current-expense budget is up 6.58 percent, while both capital outlay and debt service figures would be On the revenue side, state and federal

aid shows a 6.33 percent increase, and revenue from other sources that do not affect taxes, such as tuition, constitutes a-5.66-percent-rise As expected, the major increase in

projected expenses is fuel costs. Although the board will probably spend more than the \$45,000 budgeted for the Current year, the \$119,000 figure for fuel costs for 1980-81 is the biggest increase for the coming school year, according to Robert Yager, board secretary. Overexpenditures for fuel this year will be paid out of the free balance, or
