

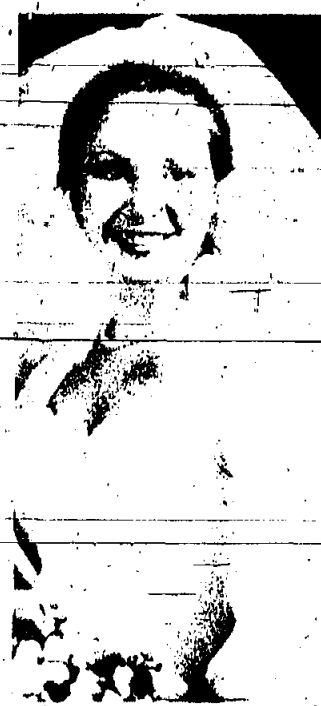


MRS. MICHAEL PINCUS

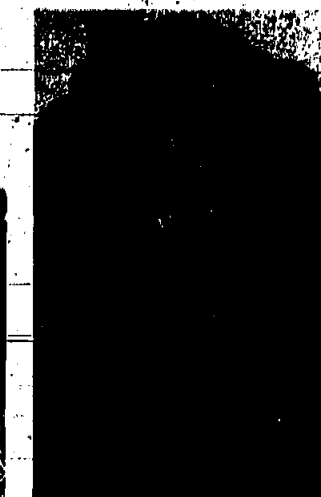

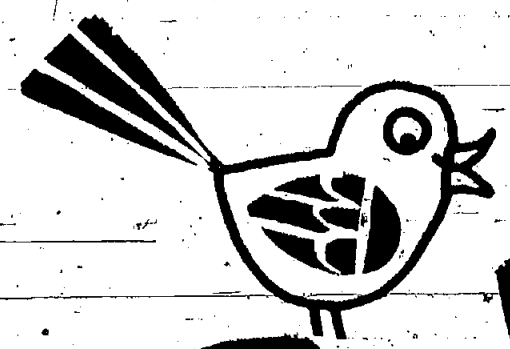

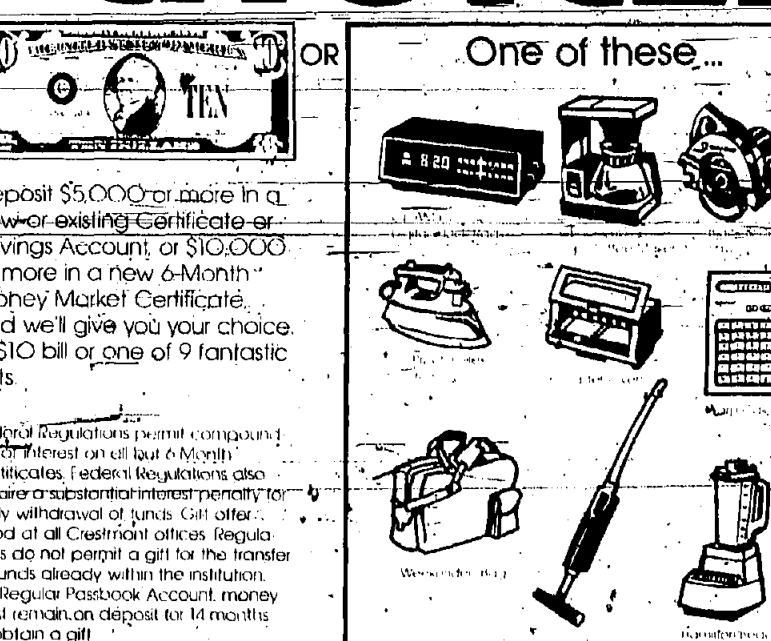
