



Welchek attempts to disprove census

Springfield Mayor Robert Welchek took steps Monday to disprove preliminary population figures from the U.S. Census Bureau that show the township's population declining by almost 2,000 people.

Welchek called a drop in voter registration and school enrollment insignificant.

"The same number of people live here today as just getting older," he said.

To calculate previous population counts, the census bureau has sent people out ringing doorbells and counting heads, he said. In 1980, he did not see any headcounters canvassing houses, he said.

"Many people probably did not fill out the census questionnaire, he said. Additional census questionnaires are in the front hall of the Municipal Building for those who have not sent one in, but no one has picked one up yet, Dunbar reported.

The Union County office of the Census Bureau also is retracing its work by checking on housing units throughout the county that were reported vacant, and homes which did not return a questionnaire.

A total of 109 new homes in Springfield is in the process of being built.

Welchek said a drop in voter registration and school enrollment is significant.

"The amount of housing has increased, so logically the number of people who reside in the town have increased," he said.

"There is low or no rate of vacancies in apartments and no empty houses," he added.

"The number of vacant houses can be determined because each residence must have a certificate of occupancy and not to separate units, according to the building inspector's office."

Arthur Buehler, township clerk, acknowledged the "letter" had been received by the township building inspector, although he said Aug. 19 the township had not yet received the census figures.

After seeing the figures, Welchek said Monday, "The population is greater than calculated by the census."

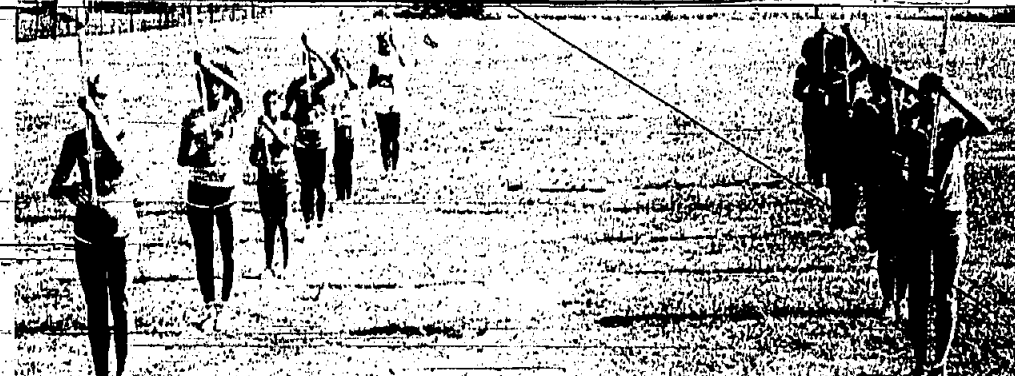
He attributed the 12 percent population drop in the census numbers to a "major error" by the census bureau.

"School enrollment has dropped by 700 since 1970. Census figures indicate a drop in township population of 1,889. If those 700 children have grown up and moved away, that still would not offset the growth in population which must have resulted from new housing," he said.

He saw a letter mailed from the census bureau late last week which showed the township population dropping from 15,740 to 13,851, he said.

Dayton course changes mark opening of schools

A new writing course will be offered in the Jonathan Dayton Regional high school curriculum this year, said educators; parents and students realize that a generation of students brought up on television have less developed reading and writing skills than in the past, he added.

Several courses, including Writing Skills and World Literature, Points of View in the Short Story, Literature of War, English Study Skills and Advanced Speech are being dropped from the 1980-81 curriculum because of declining enrollment, according to Dr. Donald Marchetti, superintendent of schools.

Other courses to be dropped include Innovative Poetry, Investigation of Matter and Energy, Investigation of Forces and the Universe, and Plant Biology, he said.

Those subjects are "streamlined" in special classes, he said.

Jonathan Dayton will offer a creative writing course every year now as an elective course, instead of an alternate year, he said.

Other English courses will continue to be offered on an alternate basis to open classes from 8:15 to 10:30 a.m. and from 12:25 to 2:10 p.m.

Students in grades one through eight also will attend half a day of school Wednesday. Kindergarten will attend abbreviated morning and afternoon classes from 8:15 to 10:30 a.m. and from 12:25 to 2:10 p.m.

Registration for children in grades one through eight who moved to Springfield during the summer is being held today from 8 a.m. to noon and Tuesday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the James Caldwell, Thelma Sandmeyer, Edward Walton and Florence Gaudineer schools.

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Witness-victim project credited for bringing change in attitude

Part of restoring faith in the criminal justice system involves getting victims of and witnesses to crimes to testify in court. The Union County prosecutor's office has been trying to do just that with its year-old project, the Victim-Witness Assistance Program.

"The biggest thing has been the change in attitude toward the criminal justice system by people who were previously reluctant to get involved," said Peter Campbell, a retired police officer and counselor in the program.

While explaining to clients the role of a victim or witness in the legal process, Campbell and follow-up staff members also offer what is probably needed most in times of distress over a crime—emotional support.

"We make many home visits and phone calls to victims and witnesses as well as trying to make them feel comfortable when they are at the court house," said Counselor Georgeanne Doerr, noting that "special" waiting lounges are provided to make witnesses or victims feel more comfortable if a defendant is out on bail and in or near the courtroom.

Efforts are made to encourage employers to pay the worker for time spent going to court to testify, Campbell said.

Although no figures are available on the number of convictions resulting from the program, Campbell pointed out that more than 400 of the 1,200 victims and witnesses contacted during the past year testified to seek remedy in the courts.

"There has definitely been an impact on the number of cases adjudicated," he said.

A \$35,000 State Law Enforcement Planning Agency (SLEPA) grant will run out in September, according to Henry Jaeger, assistant prosecutor, but it is hoped that an extension of the grant can be obtained to pay for the program's counselors until the county budget is voted on next year.

"Hopefully the county will see the results of the program as an indicator of the law service being rendered to victims and witnesses," Jaeger said.

Campbell spoke about a woman from Elizabeth whose husband was killed in an armed robbery. She needed a job but was too distraught to go out and look for one herself. The counselors set up inquiries to help her find a job, he said.

"We thought we were being responsive to the demands and requests of people in the neighborhood," said Robert Welchek, mayor.

Prizes such as toys, games, puzzles and stuffed animals will be given to game winners. All prizes and festival games are donated by local stores and neighborhood mothers.

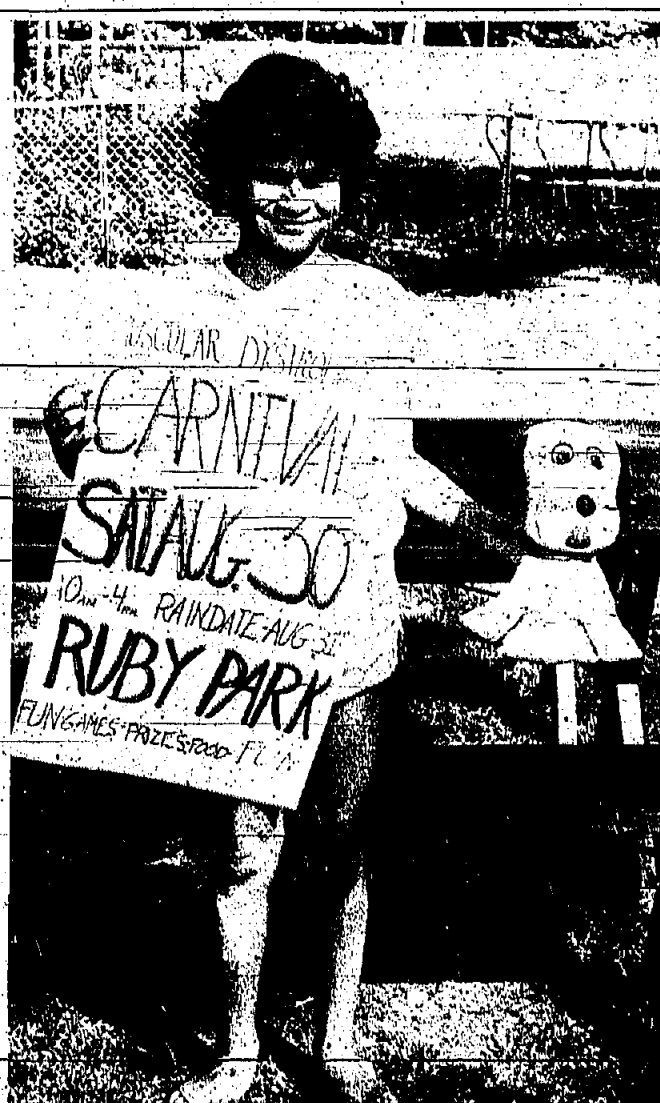
Festival workers, most of whom have worked on all four festivals, are fourth through 10th graders. Suzanne's mother Yvonne guessed.

'Queen Bees' of U.S. history studied

The Springfield Public Library lists the following titles among the recently received books:

THE QUEEN BEES, by Stephen Longstreet. Selecting from a cross-section of American women who, in some way, altered either our social, political, legal, or cultural patterns, the author presents brief sketches of some prominent and lesser known "Queen Bees," dating from the mid-1900s.

The first of these was Lucy Stone, born on a New-England farm. After hard work at home and teaching—it took her nine years to save enough money for Oberlin—she was the first woman from Massachusetts to get a diploma. She lectured on women's rights, joined national women's organizations, influencing members to continue the fight. Married late in life, she retained her maiden name.

Gertie Vanderbill, Whitney—a dedicated artist—was responsible first for setting up an exhibition studio for artists in Greenwich Village, and later for establishing the Whitney Museum. The first woman physician to serve in the U.S. Army was Dr. Mary Edwards Walker (1832-1919). She was awarded the Medal of Honor in 1865. First working as an unpaid nurse, then as a doctor during the Civil War, she tended the wounded men from both sides at Bull Run and Gettysburg.

Other women mentioned are: Estie de Wolfe (decorator), Edith Wharton (novelist), Jane Addams (anti-poverty, progressive worker), Susan B. Anthony (feminist), Betty Green (financier), Agnes deMille (dancer), and Eva Le Gallienne (actress).

REPRESSION IN THE USSR "Institute of Poles," by Victor Nekipelov.

The Serbky Institute is the diagnostic center of Soviet Forensic Psychiatry in Moscow. It is controlled by the Ministry of Internal Affairs, which also controls the regular police and the labor camps. Most of the well-known dissidents were sent there for "evaluation." This author—pharmacist and writer who spent two months there in 1974, gives us an account of its procedures.

Nekipelov—the dissident poet who dealt with controversial issues—befriended Nyaga (allegedly possessing Samizdat Literature), and when he refused to testify against him, was "arrested" and "sentenced" to two years in a labor camp. After his release he worked for human rights, renounced his citizenship and applied for emigration (his exit visas were rejected).

The author differentiates between true criminals and political dissidents. Many of the former pretend to be dissidents, hoping to enjoy the questionable "freedom" of the mental institutions. The latter are subjected to inadequate or false psychiatric diagnoses (they are considered "mad"). Nekipelov describes the shameful use of drugs—major tranquilizers, anti-depressants, truth drugs—to discipline and subdue. He reports on an assortment of typical fellow inmates and their attempts to outwit doctors; his psychiatric hearings, abuses by the staff, and reprisals by the government against informers. He was arrested again in 1978.

WHEN LOVE VANISHES "Daddy of a Divorced Mother," by Marilyn Murray Williston.

Courageously and good-naturedly she comments on divorce events: sharing her own TV and athletic programs, noting her divorce anniversary, dating, celebrating holidays, and learning to be the man-of-the-house.

County responding to parks vandalism

Increased vandalism in parks throughout Union County has prompted the county to respond by installing of sturdy rest room facilities, increasing patrols and urging the public to get involved in helping the parks.

Public Works Director Peter Lembo said that vandals were pulling chandeliers out of the windows and restaurants at Kawamech Park in Union while breaking windows and painting graffiti on the walls.

"They're still going after Kawamech like they want to tear the whole thing down," said William Anderson, maintenance director.

During the July 4th weekend, vandals began punching holes in the walls of the picnic shelter at Warner's Park in Roselle and were using fireworks to blow up toilets in many county parks, Anderson said.

"However, we're finally seeing some light at the end of the road as far as curbing the vandalism problem," Anderson noted last week.

Lembo and Anderson both said they are pushing for the use of sturdy materials for rest rooms and toilets similar to the ones used in the county jail. The program would replace all the porcelain fixtures in park restrooms.

"We've recommended to the Board of County Commissioners to reconstruct the park system and the benefits of the stainless steel facilities," Lembo said while noting the park's budget has to wait until the county budget is voted upon in January.

Anderson said he has expanded the staff of the 110-man park maintenance team to include Saturday and Sunday in an effort to curb day-time vandalism.

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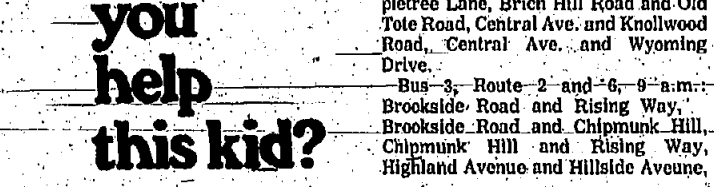

The way the federal government functions remains something of a mystery to many Americans. This is unfortunate, for the federal government affects everyone's life. The way it functions, the availability of employment and business opportunities all depend in one way or another on government.

More than ever it is important that Americans understand how their government works. That is why I make a point of talking as often as possible with groups visiting Washington from the 12th Congressional District, and why I do everything I can to arrange educational tours for them in the Capitol and at federal agencies.

I frequently speak about federal activities with church groups and civic organizations in Union County and operate an informal program that gives students and senior citizens an opportunity to work in Washington. The aim is to help New Jersey residents become more aware of how government functions and how they can have input into what goes on in Washington.

Despite all the information services available, it remains clear that there is a gap in public awareness of the federal responsibilities, particularly in the law-making process.

To help close this gap, I am providing a 15-minute sound filmstrip which details the federal legislative process and explains how a citizen can be effective in influencing it.

Titled "The Federal Legislative Process How a Bill Becomes Law," the color filmstrip offers information on major aspects of the legislative process as well as on the budgeting and appropriations process. It also suggests ways in which citizens can effectively make their views known to Congress.

A copy of the educational filmstrip is being sent to every high school in the 12th Congressional District, which includes all of Union County except

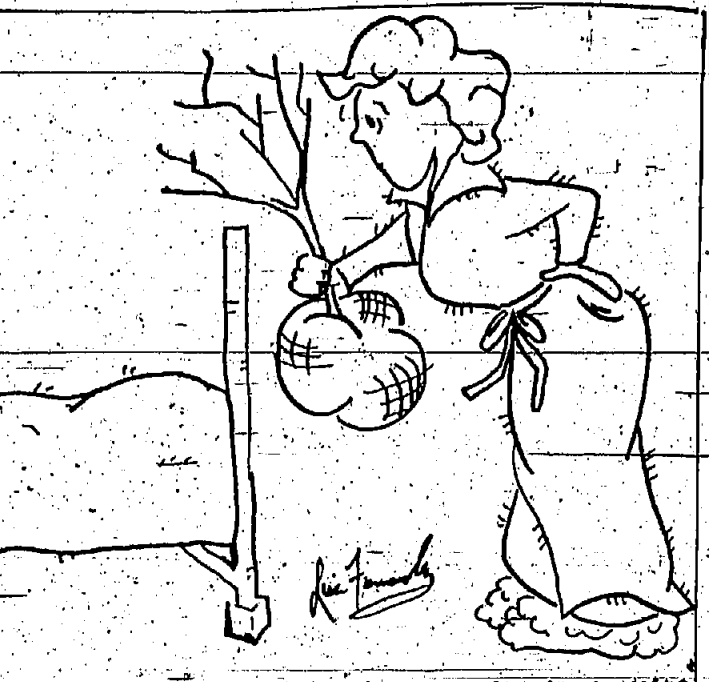

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Schools in jeopardy, prof says

The road to the current public school crime wave was paved with well-intentioned laws and policies, says Rutgers University sociologist Jackson Toby.

According to the state university professor, the compulsory education law, the advocacy of children's rights, the lenient courts and the growth of large impersonal schools have worked together to undermine the authority of teachers and principals. That erosion of authority created conditions ripe for anarchy and lawlessness, Toby said.

A hasty repeal of such laws and policies isn't the answer, he cautioned. But you can't find remedies to combat the lawlessness unless you first understand the complexities of the problem," he said.

"One consequence of keeping students in school much longer than we did 25 years ago, is that some students—who don't want to be in school, who hate school and who are not learning—feel that they are prisoners, and they become very serious misbehavior problems," he said.

Toby recently has turned his attention to the highly publicized yet little examined social phenomenon of school crime. Early this year, the sociologist published a research paper in "The Public Interest," a quarterly journal on national affairs. The paper, "Crime in American Public Schools," analyzed the causes of school crime, based on the findings of the National Institute of Education's groundbreaking study, "Violent Schools—Safe Schools."

The study concluded that schools on a nationwide scale were plagued with an increase in misbehavior that was far more serious than juvenile mischief. Many of the inner city schools were becoming holding tanks for youthful and violent offenders, the report said. A minority of students was responsible and most law-breaking occurred in junior high schools. More than 600 schools—urban, suburban and rural—were surveyed.

The scope of the crimes ranged from marijuana smoking to petty thievery to shootings and knifings, the study disclosed. And teachers were frequent targets of verbal and physical assaults, it added. Perhaps as a result, a substantial proportion of teachers said they were afraid to intervene in student disputes.

The report was only a beginning, Toby concluded.

"The report described the current situation rather than attempting to explain how a less-than-ordinary school environment developed," he said.

"The report did not consider social parental participation, work programs transferred to alternative schools as well

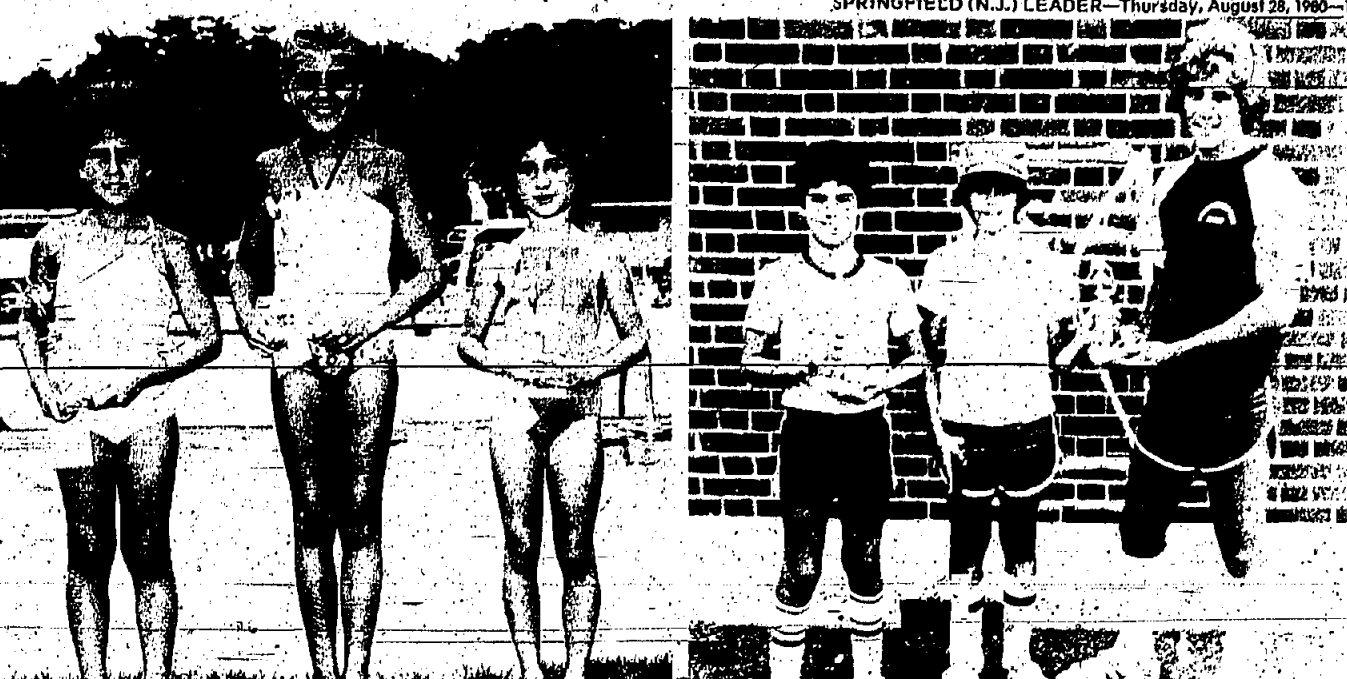
