### 6-month drop cited in job total for area

The New York-Northeastern New Jersey area job total has dropped 49,000 since the start of the national recession in January, according to Samuel M. Ehrenhalt, the Bureau of Labor Statistics' regional commissioner. The area's employment has been heavily concentrated in the manufacturing sector: down 43,000 to 1,340,000 in June, seasonally adjusted. There also were declines of 15,000 in contract construction and 11,000 in trade. These decreases were partially offset by increases in the services, government, finance, insurance and real estate sectors. The government rise was attributed to temporary hiring for the 1980 census.

### Market funds up

Holdings in money market funds by New Jersey residents jumped by 25 percent in the first six months of this year, an Investment Company Institute spokesman has announced. New Jersey residents now have more than \$5 billion invested, he said. For the United States as a whole, money market funds have risen from \$2.5 billion in the first six months of 1979. The extraordinary growth of money market funds has introduced an entirely new group of people to investing. These mutual funds "have a special appeal to those who want extra income to help offset inflation but have only relatively small amounts," David Silver, president of the institute, said.

### Recovery is starting

## Conservation requested as water supply dwindles

The Springfield Township Committee Fire Department and the Commonwealth Water Company have asked residents to conserve water during this driest summer in decades. Lawn watering, car washing and other non-critical water uses should be curtailed so that water is available for fire protection and sanitary needs during what is called the worst water crisis for Commonwealth in 17 years, company officials said. Springfield volunteer firefighters drove fire trucks through township streets Saturday making residents through a loudspeaker to conserve water. About 64,000 letters urging customers to cooperate with the company in conserving water were mailed last week. Water company employees worked through the weekend to prepare and mail the letters, company officials said. About one-third of Springfield's water comes from three reservoirs owned by Commonwealth Water Company. Located right off Kennedy Parkway in Short Hills and in Livingston. About one-third of the water supply comes from wells and one-third is purchased from Elizabethwater Water Company, according to a water com-

pany spokesman. Neither supply is in danger, the spokesman said. Commonwealth has been forced to pump twice as much reservoir water as usual to meet the increased demand, according to J. H. King, vice president. "Our customers must reduce their consumption by almost 10 million gallons a day if we are going to meet demand at the end of September. Our reservoir capacity is down 25 percent," King said. Several measures are recommended for home conservation including repairing leaky faucets and toilets, taking shorter showers and turning washing machines and dishwashers only when fully loaded, which also conserves fuel. If residents cooperate, Commonwealth will be able to meet the water demand, according to company officials. During future, dry spells, a \$2.3 million pipeline connecting the Commonwealth system with the Passaic Valley Water Commission will help lessen the impact, the engineers noted. The project will not be completed until December, they added. Company officials also advise residents not to let water run while cleaning vegetables, rinsing dishes, shaving or brushing teeth. They also suggest keeping a bottle of drinking water in the refrigerator instead of running tap water until it is cool. A small inconvenience on each person will make sure that no additional hardships will be placed on the com-

## Death of hitchhiker spurs police warning

David Wasserman, 19, who died from a fractured skull after he jumped from the back of a moving pickup truck while hitchhiking with his college roommate from Baltimore, to Middletown, Del. Wasserman hopped into the back of the pickup truck when the driver did not stop where they had asked to be left off. The two jumped from the moving vehicle. A hitchhiker does not know who he is riding with and a driver does not know who he is picking up. Det. Edward Wasserman and Jonathan Katz, 18, of Scarsdale, N.Y., had asked to be left off the truck when they thought they were being picked up for a red light. Katz told state police. It was traveling between 25 and 30 mph, according to the report. Katz leaped onto grass and suffered severe head and back injuries. He was taken by ambulance to Wilmington Medical Center and was listed in fair condition early this week. Wasserman jumped onto the asphalt highway, receiving a fractured skull. He was taken to the hospital by helicopter and died at 5 p.m. Saturday. The pickup truck continued driving. Springfield was on duty for the pickup truck. Wasserman is his father, Jules, and his mother, Myra; three older brothers, Eric, Evan and Hal, and his paternal grandmother, Tillie.

**Volunteer reserves aid crime prevention** The 22 men in the Springfield Police Reserves believe that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Every night, a uniformed volunteer patrol roams streets for four hours in a marked car, hoping his presence will act as a deterrent to crime. "We do not replace existing policemen. We're a supplement," said Deputy Chief Harry Vargas, a 13-year veteran. "It becomes somewhat of a habit," he added. "The majority of our work isn't that exciting, but when you get the call and you're going there, the adrenaline is flowing," he said. "You feel like you're doing something to help out the town," said Cal Ackerman, 25-year veteran. "It takes a special kind of dedication to be an officer. Liebekind said, pointing out that the police reserves are a supplement to the regular police force. "I love this organization, the ones who're doing for the town." "When I work, I'm just another man working. I don't try to tell the department what to do," said Vargas, referring to his rank as second-in-command. "I insist that they conduct themselves as policemen while on-duty. Ninety-six hours of duty annually is required."
