Sandy Wills and Carol Nelschert haven't forgotten the American hostages in Iran. 3000 members from Joseph 603, Jody Wills and Janis Nelschert help Sandy Wills wrap two trees with the nine-foot ribbons.

The idea comes from a popular song about a soldier who asks his sweetheart to remember him by tying a yellow ribbon "round the old oak tree."

In Springfield, oak trees, maple and elm and cedar trees, have been wrapped with yellow ribbons. When there's not a tree on the block, a telephone pole will do.

"We hope to touch on the first and last tree on every street," Wills said.

The women said they're finding a united feeling among people who see the ribbons.

"I don't think you'll find a person on the street who's not in agreement with what we're doing," Nelschert said. "I'd like to see a day when the hostages are released and everybody rips off those ribbons."

Now, the ribbons are free and are available at the Springfield town clerk's office.

Kids do the teaching with fire prevention

While Springfield Firefighter William Grac may not mention the Chicago Fire when he visits the township's schools beginning Monday, he is sure to spark fire prevention awareness.

Armed with brochures, slides and even a fire extinguisher Grac will be a one-man traveling show for kindergarten through fifth graders.

"It's mainly to stress family escape planning," he said. "We hope the kids will then go home and get their parents to sit down and draw plans of rooms, showing each person a fire escape route."

Grac thinks fire prevention messages to children often have an impact on parents.

"You tell adults about safety and most of the time they're too busy to listen," Grac said. "But if a child asks his parents about safety usually they'll listen."

Board to draft resolution to set 6.5 rent hike limit

Claiming the township's rent leveling ordinance is "ambiguous," the Springfield Rent Leveling Board Thursday voted 4-2 in favor of drawing up a resolution that says a landlord can't raise a tenant's rent more than 6.5 percent in a 12-month period.

The resolution could affect 1,400 apartment units in Springfield.

The decision came after a Summit Hill Apartments tenant, Charles Berman, told board members that under the July 1980 ordinance, his monthly base rent of \$216 was increased 4 percent on Sept. 1. Yesterday he was to receive an additional 6.5 percent hike.

The 6.5 percent increase was calculated from the Sept. 1 base rent, not the \$216 monthly rent Berman agreed to pay Oct. 1, 1979, when he signed his annual lease.

Board members Joe Walsh, Julian Stone, Michael Herlinger and Chairman Paul Fertinger voted to draft the resolution.

Board members Bernard Kirschenbaum and John Bridgeman voted against the motion and board member Milton Zisman abstained.

Board member Shirley Cohen was absent.

Berman said 40 percent of the Summit Hill leases expire after Sept. 1. These tenants also will see the 6.5 percent rental increase.

"I think that's discrimination," he told the seven-member board.

Shepard Gurin, attorney for Summit Realty, argued the rent increases were "in complete accordance with legisla-

tion under the adjustment of rent Sept. 1." This means Berman could be charged the 10.5 percent rent increase, he said.

"It is clear with review of the ordinance that the tenant's complaint is denied and dismissed," Gurin announced.

While the July 1980 ordinance allowed landlords to increase rent 6.5 percent, it also granted decision-making powers to the Rent Leveling Board. Prior to this the board could only advise the Township Committee.

Berman's complaint was the first major case in which the board had to decide interpretation of the rent leveling ordinance.

But members were divided in their views of exactly when a landlord could raise a tenant's rent.

Part of the confusion among members arose from an Aug. 25, 1980, letter from the township's attorney, Edward Fanning, to the Rent Leveling Board's attorney, Elliot Fabricant.

In the letter Fanning stated that under the July 1980 ordinance, a landlord is entitled to an initial increase of 4 percent for the remainder of the present lease. When this lease expires, the landlord could charge a 6.5 percent annual increase.

Fanning cited an example of how this increase would be implemented. A tenant whose lease expires Jan. 1, 1981, received a 4 percent increase Sept. 1. In January, when the lease was up for renewal, the landlord then could charge a 6.5 percent increase.

The 4 percent hike was calculated from a 2.5 percent increase the tenant paid beginning Jan. 1, 1980.

Confusion among board members arose when Fanning cited 1981 as the example year, not 1980.

"The interpretation I got from the letter is that the increase is only on a year to a 6.5 percent increase until 1981," Walsh said.

Bridgeman replied that the Jan. 1, 1981, date was stated as an example, "an unfortunate example."

Landlord's accountant testifies in Troy Village hardship case

A landlord's accountant was the first witness to testify that Thursday before the Springfield Rent Leveling Board in a hardship complaint filed by Troy Village Ltd.

Questioned by Troy Village Ltd.'s attorney Herbert Hausman, union public accountant Sidney Rothman told the board he examined the apartment complex's financial records from Oct. 1, 1979, to Apr. 30, 1980. He estimated costs for the first seven months.

In opening statements Hausman had told the board Troy Village Ltd., whose principal owner is David Margolis, is asking to raise rents 20 to 22 percent for a gross rental increase of \$300,000.

The 20 to 22 percent hike excluded a 6.5 percent annual rent increase granted to landlords under a rent leveling ordinance the Township Committee passed last summer.

Part of the reason for a rental increase, Hausman said, is because Troy Village Ltd. purchased the property Oct. 1, 1979, before the tax-assessed price. The purchase price was \$6.5 million.

To prove the hardship increase, Hausman asked Rothman to break down expenditures.

Among these expenses, Rothman told the board, Troy Village estimated \$72,000 for fuel, \$50,988 for utilities, \$38,300 for maintenance—less \$48,000 for a residential manager and \$25,494 for an equipment replacement reserve.

However, under cross examination by tenants' attorney Leonard Zucker, Rothman told the board his figures were taken from the general ledger. Troy Village management had instructed him to examine individual financial records.

Zucker told the board the tenants' accountant, Rubin Redfield, had found major differences between expenses Troy Village management claimed and those that were legitimate expenses.

Troy Village showed its financial records to the tenants' accountant after a preliminary hearing ruling by the Rent Control Board in August.

Zucker planned Troy Village had among other expenses, overestimated \$130,000 for fuel, \$3,000 for utilities, an unapproved insurance payment that included insurance for a Cadillac and a \$27,000 annual residential manager's fee.

The residential manager is Margolis.

Board adopts pact, teachers gain 8.5%

Springfield kindergarten through eighth-grade teachers will gain an 8.5 percent salary increase this year after the board of education ratified a two-year contract Tuesday night.

Dr. Fred Baruchin, superintendent of schools, said seven of the nine board members were present at the meeting. They approved the contract by a 3-1 vote with one abstention.

Gregory Clark, board president, voted against the contract. He had no comment about his vote after the meeting.

Board members Barbara Adler, Elizabeth Simpson, Myra Wasserman, Ellen Dehnen and Nancy Helley voted in favor of the contract. Baruchin said.

Board member Arnold Gerst abstained from voting.

The contract gives teachers an 8.5 percent salary increase for the 1980-81 school year and a 9 percent raise for 1981-82.

Under the new contract, beginning teachers with a bachelor's degree will earn \$11,500 this school year. A bachelor's degree teacher who has worked 18 years or more in the district earns \$24,250.

A provision for retirement by ab-

stracting sick leave also is included in the contract. This means a teacher who retires will be able to buy back unused sick leave at the rate of \$15 per day, up to \$2,000, Baruchin said.

Processing time for minority leave is shorter under the new contract. Teachers also received a \$30 increase for graduate school tuition reimbursement for approved courses, raising the annual reimbursement from \$450 to \$500.

Baruchin was a resource person for the teachers association and the board.

The Springfield Teachers Association ratified the contract by a majority vote last Monday.

Barbara Pollack, teachers association president, said she was "pleased in general" with the contract, especially provisions for retirement and maternity leave.

Police Department seeks traffic guards

The Springfield Police Department still needs extra school crossing guards to work about five hours per day. Guards earn \$4.17 per hour. Interested persons can apply at the police department.

Sunshine Law case is dismissed in court

A New Jersey Superior Court Judge dismissed a case last Friday a tenants group had brought against the Springfield Township Committee to have an amendment to the local rent control ordinance declared unconstitutional and void.

The group, which included the Springfield and Summit Hill tenants associations, Max Steinberg and Pearl Lieff, claimed the township committee discussed the amendment in a non-public meeting June 2, which was a violation of the Open Public Meetings Act of 1974.

Judge Milton Feller said he dismissed the case because a June 9 public meeting to discuss the amendment was held at a public meeting. However, Feller pointed out that notices for the meeting could have been more specific.

Feller said he ruled strictly on the Sunshine Law and not the rent control ordinance.

Simpson is installed as Legion Post head

Herbert Simpson, who earned the Bronze Star during World War II, was installed as Commander of the Springfield American Legion Post 228 during the State Legionnaire's Meeting, Sept. 6.

Simpson replaces Allan Scott as Post Commander.

Simpson served in the 100th Infantry Division from 1943 to 1945, including the Normandy Invasion. He earned the Bronze Star for gallantry in combat after he successfully brought ammunition to the front lines while under heavy fire during the Battle of Bitchon in Bitchon, France.

He was honorably discharged from the military with the rank of sergeant.

Simpson joined the American Legion four years ago and has been sergeant-at-arms and first vice commander.

He also has served on committees for the Springfield Bicentennial and the Battle of Springfield.

Republican trio calls for more jobs, industry

More jobs and more industry will be a top priority for the Union County Board of Freeholders if the Republicans win control in November. The three GOP candidates for the board met this week. In the statement, Frank Lehr of Summit, Virginia McKenney of Roselle Park and Peter Okrasinski of Union Township promised to establish a special task force with representatives from county departments. The task force would work with municipalities and local chambers of commerce to start a "massive sales effort" to attract industry, business and jobs to the county, they said. Lehr charged that the Democratic majority has "failed miserably to address itself to this essential need." McKenney called attracting industry to the county "the key...to fighting the high unemployment of the county" and Okrasinski said the county needs "jobs, jobs, and more jobs—not featherbedding political patronage jobs but productive jobs in the private sector." ■

Democrats call for retaining budget control

Jean-D. Allen, Doctor Martin and Herman Schreiber, Democratic candidates for Union County Board of Freeholders, this week called for a strong stand to reverse the trend away from freeholder accountability on budget matters. Allen, a Cranford resident, urged passage in seeking legislative action "to put control of the budget back in the hands of the county officials." Martin, of Elizabeth, charged that the result of a recent trend in county decision has been to place "growing portions of the budget...in the control of the county officials." Schreiber, also a resident of Elizabeth, added, "The key problem is that control of the budget should not be outside the control of elected officials. In essence, it is a question of accountability." ■
