Check home safety

Cold weather is just around the corner and, with its impending arrival, it's time to start thinking about putting heating systems in proper condition to guard against "the silent 'killer"-carbon monoxide poisoning.

As we observe Fire Prevention Week this week, it is an ideal time to get the family together, work out a step-by-step clean-up plan and hold a home fire drill. The family pow-wow on fire safety should detail plans for a quick exit in a fire

. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for

blocking of stairways and halls by fire. Make it a rule to close-bedroom doors at night. These closed doors will hold back flame and smoke, allowing vital extra time for escape. When escape routes are determined from upper floors, plan to use porch and garage roofs, ladders or even trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily so that even a child can open them—and see that windows are low and large enough to climb through. Along with emergency escape routes, it is absolutely essential that smoke detectors are installed in the home. Install as many of these as you deem practical for the size of your home.

While planning every facet of safety should a fire break out, pick an outside assembly point, well away from the house, where everyone in the family will meet. Emphasize the rule: "Once Out, Stay Out!"

The horrible suffering and waste of lives and property can be avoided if one keeps his home as fire safe as possible and free from faulty and defective heating and electrical units. Make Fire Prevention Week a year-round observance for you and your-loved ones!
