

Teacher union urges skills test reviews

Frank Totten, president of the New Jersey Education Association (NJEA), has called on the state Board of Education to undertake a "complete review" of the state's Minimum Basic Skills Testing program (MBS), citing recently discovered errors in the administration of the test.

"These errors by National Evaluation Systems (NES) may have cost school districts thousands of dollars and caused improper classification of those districts. They may have caused emotional trauma to thousands of children. And these errors may only be the tip of the iceberg—an iceberg that costs the state three-quarters of a million dollars a year."

Totten, president of the 113,000-member organization of teachers and other school employees, made his comments to a subcommittee of the Education Committee headed by Education Commissioner Fred Burke's report to the November meeting of the State Board of Education on 1979-80 MBS results. His charges followed recent stories in state newspapers questioning the manner of bidding by which National Evaluation Systems was awarded the state contract as well as discrepancies in the testing company's scoring methods. The NJEA leadership asked the board to review the selection procedures or testing agencies, and to review all State mandates which use the statewide test to make decisions about allocation of funds and other

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Test seen breakthrough in depression diagnosis

A laboratory test to help diagnose a major type of depression was announced by a group of Summit psychiatrists and psychopharmacologists at Tuesday's annual meeting of the Society for Neuroscience in Cincinnati.

The national organization of leading scientists and researchers was told that the procedure, called the TRH test, was used in diagnosing 134 depressed patients and found reliable in identifying those with major, unipolar depression, which often responds to antidepressant medication.

Dr. Carter Postash, senior researcher on the project, said the problem for doctors has been in identifying, in advance, those patients who could benefit from medication and those who do better just with counseling and therapy.

"Often the symptoms of these two kinds of depressed patients look alike, even to a trained clinician. The TRH

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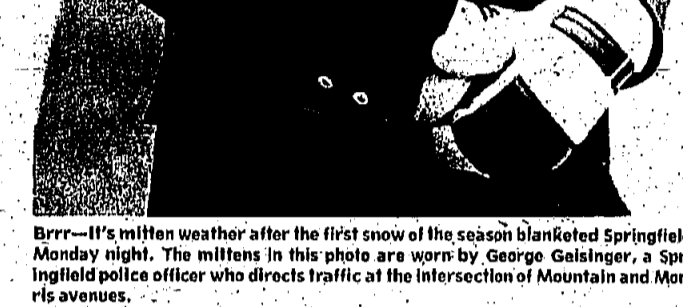

Cieri, Kaish clarify campaign donations

Democratic Township Committee members William Cieri and Stanley Kaish issued a statement this week to clarify an article that appeared in the Nov. 13 issue of the Springfield Leader.

In the Nov. 13 article Cieri and Kaish were reported as having "received" \$2,320 each from the Springfield Property Owners Association "for use by candidates for or against public questions," as listed in campaign contribution reports Oct. 20.

Cieri and Kaish said neither they nor the Democratic Party received any money from the Springfield Property Owners Association.

In clarifying their position Cieri and Kaish said, "The Oct. 9 report of the Springfield Property Owners Association, dated Disbursements, listed \$1,640 disbursed to James Anthony Associates, 428 Chestnut St. Newark, for public relations services and to prepare and distribute campaign material. These were the only disbursements listed."

Administration offices in the Union County Regional High Schools District will be computerized within two years, as the result of the Regional Board of Education approving a \$189,292 bid Tuesday night for the equipment, installation and repair services.

Harold Barigo, board secretary, said bids for an administrative computer system had been mailed to eight computer companies and advertised in newspapers. Only one formal bid was received, although written quotations had been received, previously and reviewed by the board's computer committee. The bid was awarded to Computer Solutions, Inc. of East Orange.

The board also accepted the donation of \$2,600 in computer equipment from Automated Pharmaceutical Company, Fairfield, N.J., on behalf of Springfield residents.

Board talks of 'major surgery' on town's elementary schools

The Springfield Board of Education Monday night discussed suggestions for "major surgery" on the town's elementary schools.

The discussion centered on the school district's reorganization plan, which would close two elementary schools and build a new one to serve the remaining students.

Gregory Clarke, board president, summed up the discussion by saying, "This is a very old building. To go as far as to keep applying Band-Aids is not good in the long run. We need to get our act together and begin to face the fact that the report doesn't fully address the question of replacing and a poor ventilation system."

The report Clarke referred to was recently submitted by Dr. Fred Baruchin, superintendent. It outlines reorganization goals for the 1981-82 school year and recommends that none of the four Springfield elementary schools be closed next year to cope with continued enrollment declines.

Clarke recommended that the board check into the cost of hiring a consulting service to study the community's needs and population changes. In drawing a master plan for the district, he said, the board should consider the cost of hiring a consulting service to study the community's needs and population changes.

Apartment conversions threaten security of some tenants unable to afford change

There are tenants in their building who already have decided to buy condominiums, either as an investment or for their homes.

But for many others in 40 percent of Springfield's apartment units that are being converted to condominiums or cooperative housing, they still haven't decided whether to uproot their lives or to scrape their money together for a down payment.

"I can't see moving to a standard apartment. I can't see going to a cooperative or a condominium. Francis set to retire as library's director

When John F. Kennedy told Americans, "Ask not what your country can do for you—ask what you can do for your country," Helen Francis took the words to heart.

Recently married and living in Marlinton, Francis said Kennedy's speech inspired her to apply for an assistant director's position at the Springfield Public Library. At that time (1962) the library was crowded in the Searls Bailey Center. Francis got the job and soon became director of the new Springfield Public Library, which she helped plan.

"Now, after 18 years of service in Springfield, Francis is retiring in January. During a recent interview she recalled Kennedy's words and how they still affect her life.

"A library should be a center for all kinds of information and people who work there should be sensitive to the needs of everyone in the community," she said.

She still wants the library to buy an old station wagon, load it with books and take them to areas of the town that are sparsely represented at the library.

Francis said she decided to retire after the Springfield Township Committee cut \$53,000 from the library's budget in April. She blamed the state spending law for the "lack of funds" now available to the library.

Since then seven staff positions have been cut, hours have been reduced and programs have become so limited, Francis said, "there isn't even enough money to host receptions for artists who exhibit work here."

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Rent issue, Route 78 resurface at meeting

At its first post-election meeting last Wednesday, the Springfield Township Committee faced the recurring problems of interpreting the rent control ordinance and completion of Route 78 through the Watchung Reservation.

But it also voted new programs including a \$250,000 community development grant application. The grant will partially fund an elevator in the municipal building and a park on land between Marion Avenue and the Parkway River in the far northeast corner of Springfield.

In the grant application \$50,000 would finance building the elevator, and \$100,000 would be allocated for the park.

Mixed with the business of running the town also were post-election congratulations.

The Democratic committee member Stanley Kaish pointed out that Springfield's tax assessor, Tom McCullum, had been elected President of the Union County Tax Assessors' Association.

Kaish then congratulated Democratic committee member William Cieri and himself on their reelection to the Township Committee. He also thanked all the people who worked on the campaign.

Democratic Mayor Robert Welbeck then congratulated Cieri and Kaish.

"We're all subject to the voice of the public and the public has spoken," Welbeck said.

In the same congratulatory mood, when it came down to discussing a rent control issue, Welbeck said he hoped the committee's final decision would "please King Solomon."

The decision is if the intention of a 1972 rent control ordinance means a landlord must forfeit his annual allowed rental increase if he doesn't raise his rents during any one year.

In a case brought before the Township Committee, Howard Hales, Springfield tenant, asked for the interpretation of the law.

Hales claimed his landlord, Phillip Stalle, should roll back his present rent of \$201 to \$274 per month.

Under a 2.5 annual maximum rental increase Hales claimed Stalle had raised the rent a total of \$125 per month, from Jan. 1, 1975 to Aug. 31, 1979, but the increases had been sporadic and not in line with the rent control ordinance.

Welbeck pointed out that "this is not a court of law. We don't have authority

New book reveals the profile process

By ROSE P. SIMON "Cooking Nouvelle Cuisine to America," by Michele Urzator and David Lieberman. Profiles have "to do with entering into someone else's temperament, which is a fictional process." Gilliat, novelist, film critic for the New Yorker and Observer for many years, brings her fictional talents to her profiles. After spending some weeks in convivial companionship with her subjects (whom she loves and admires) she is able to discern what lies beneath their conversation and behavior. She quotes Luis Bunuel, a most extraordinary film-maker. "Cinema is a marvelous weapon when it is handled by a free spirit. Of all the means of expression, it is the one that is most like the human imagination." Other profiles include John Ford, Alfred Hitchcock, Satyajit Ray. Woody Allen - "brilliant, courteous - is a favorite actor-director." No place but America would be so receptive to his fascinated and benign view of modern civilization and phenomenal oddities. Another portrait is that of Rossellini whose "new kind of film-making sees the history of art and thought more concerned with problems than with personalities." Three oxides: Vladimir Nabokov (textile from language), Federico Fellini (textile from the metropolis), and Walter Werner Fassbinder (textile from history) are given special consideration.

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Rinaldo to make decision by end of year on running for governorship or senate

Congressman Matthew Rinaldo of Union, who frequently has been mentioned as a possible candidate for governor or the U.S. Senate, is expected to decide by the end of this year whether to seek one of those offices. The 12th District Republican is looking to the future in the wake of an election last week in which he easily outstripped every other candidate in Union County. Now back in Washington for the post-election session of Congress, he is planning to meet with his advisers within the next few weeks to discuss the options open to him. As a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor or senator, he would be running in a crowded field. With Gov. Brendan Byrne finishing his second term next year and banned constitutionally from running again, large numbers of hopefuls in both parties have their eyes on Morven, the gubernatorial mansion. Among the three Republican candidates for Union County Board of Freeholders, whose victories gave them 73 percent of the board last year, the top vote-getter was Mayor Virginia McKenney of Roselle Park with 96,085. Frank Lohr of Summit received 55,866 and Peter Okrasinski of Union took the third spot with 55,273 votes. Official figures for the defeated Democratic candidates for freeholder were Joan Allen of Cranford, 86,563; Dexter Martin of Elizabeth, 83,153; and Harman Schreiber of Elizabeth, 81,960. Sheriff Ralph Froelich of Elizabeth, the only Democrat to emerge victorious in the election, received 10,597 votes.

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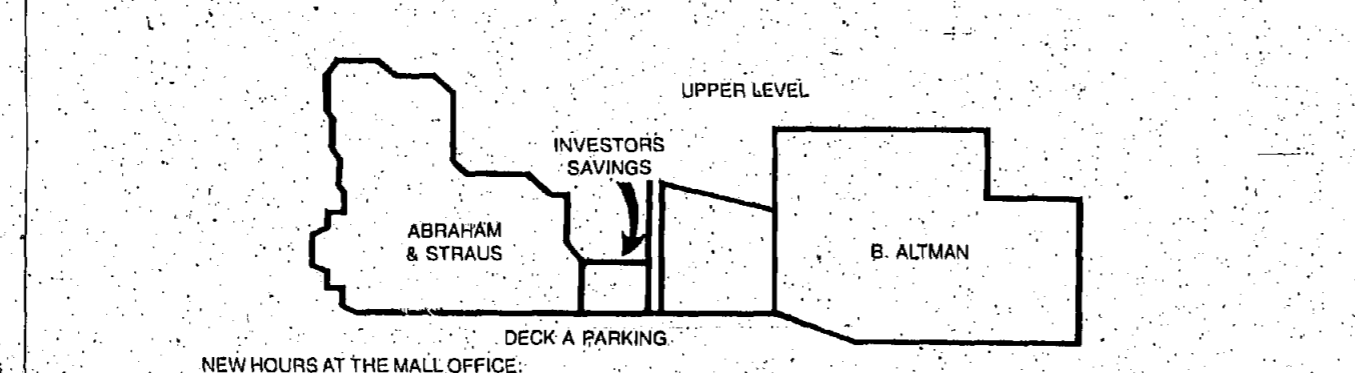

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The State We're In

North Jersey Conservation Foundation

"Catch 22" has entered our language to describe a situation in which two diametrically-opposed laws, rules or regulations are in force at the same time. You've got to obey both even if it is impossible.

Take sewage sludge as one unappetizing example. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) says you've got to quit dumping it in the ocean by 1981. EPA says you've got to clean up our air. EPA says you've got to quit polluting our surface and ground waters. I wholeheartedly endorse all those wise edicts.

But with sewage sludge, if you don't dump it in the ocean any longer, what do you do with it? You can incinerate it, but you'll probably pollute the air. You can landfill it or store it on the surface of the ground, except for later polluting surface or ground waters or both. That's an example of a Catch 22 situation.

EPA, and to a lesser degree state agencies like New Jersey's Department of Environmental Protection, have contributed to this seemingly hopeless standoff through their creditable efforts to protect our environment. What they've actually done is force society to look grudgingly at the one obvious solution to the sewage sludge problem which still remains: make the stuff "pure," without the usual burden of toxics and heavy metals which now make it unsafe to burn, dump or bury.

Remember the traditional scene of the Oriental peasant hauling something in two large containers suspended from a shoulder pole as he trudges for the rice paddies? What he's got in those things is the carefully-saved excreta of his friends and neighbors—and he's using it to fertilize the rice fields with it. That makes more rice for people to eat so they can make more fertilizer for more rice, etc.

I recite this litany here merely to emphasize the clear, uncomplicated logic of a natural system. It's a system into which our species meshed nicely with all others until we got so smart that we began poisoning ourselves and everything else.

Theoretically we should be able to take sewage sludge from any treatment plant and put it where it belongs, back in the soil, so we can quit using up dwindling fossil-fuel supplies through the manufacture of artificial fertilizers. That's just one of the many reasons why the theory must become reality.

As things are now, a typical sewage treatment plant is bombarded by all the ground, surface and later polluting surface or ground waters or both. That's an example of a Catch 22 situation.

Not only don't we dare to put that stuff on or in the ground, where it will pollute the soil, we cannot risk letting it grow into the cells of grains and vegetables lest we absorb dosage through the food we eat, including milk and meat.

So why not pass the right laws, and enforce them fully, to guarantee that any industrial operation has to prevent its sewage to remove the pollutants before they can enter the municipal sewage collector system? The only reason why not this far is the expense of power plant operations and political pressures mustered by business interests and neighbors—and he's using it to fertilize the rice fields with it. 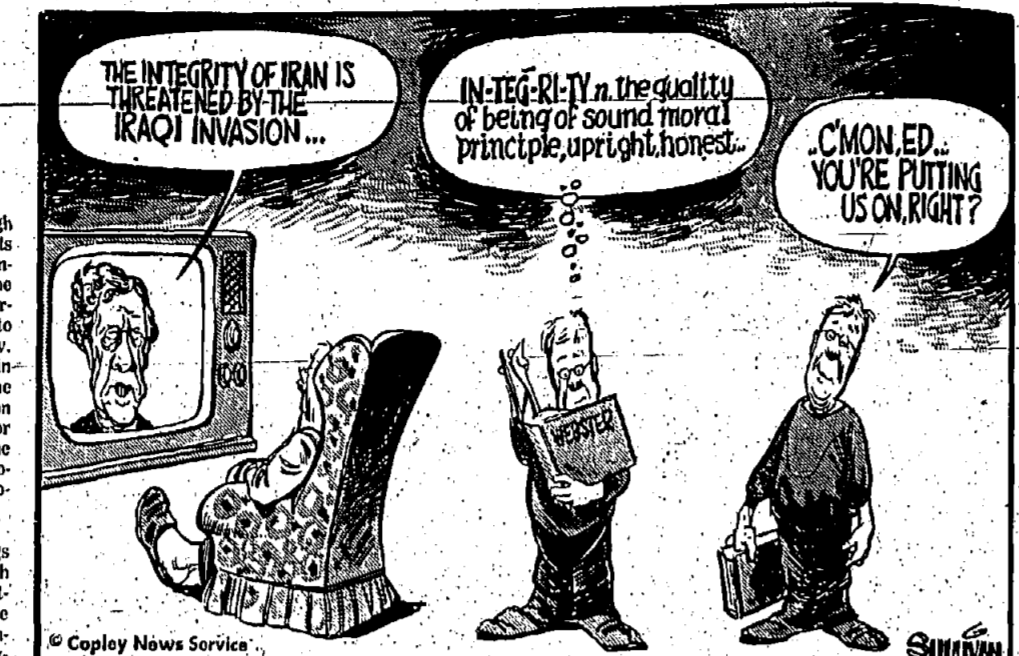

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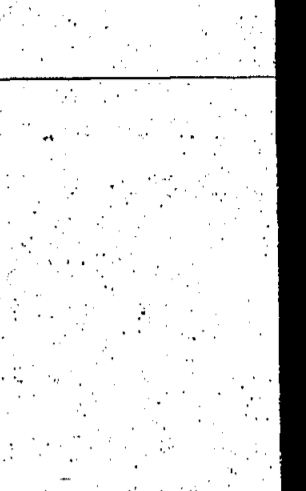

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SEI lawyers ask to be relieved of Route 22 shopping mall case

The lawyers for the corporation which has been seeking permission to build a shopping mall on Route 22 in Union have filed a petition in U.S. District Court in Newark asking to be relieved of the case.

Robert Greenbaum of Greenbaum, Greenbaum, Rowe and Smith of Newark, the law firm which has been representing SEI Union Properties Inc., declined to give the reason for the action. "The petition will have to speak for itself," he said.

Michael Miller of New York, a general partner in SEI, said the firm has decided to retain a "major" New York law firm, whose name he said he could not yet release. But he added that SEI will continue to press the case.

The motion by the Newark firm is scheduled to be heard before District Court Judge Vincent Binno on Monday.

SEI turned to the federal court after losing cases before the Union Township Board of Adjustment and Superior Court Judge Milton Feller in Elizabeth.

Its proposal calls for construction of the mall at the site of the Union Drive-In Theater and the state motor vehicle inspection station on eastbound Route 22.

The plan dates back about two and a half years, though rumors about a possible shopping center on the highway had cropped up periodically for years before that.

It was March 1978, however, before

SEI took its first concrete step. Bypassing the Union Board of Adjustment, it filed suit in Superior Court in an attempt to overturn the section of the Union Township zoning code which forbids shopping malls in industrial zones.

Acting on that suit, Feller ruled that the corporation must exhaust its administrative resources before attacking the ordinance; that meant that SEI would first have to apply for a variance from the Board of Adjustment.

The firm filed for the variance in November 1978, presenting plans that called for an enclosed mall of 250,000 square feet, with space for several major tenants, 50 to 70 small shops, twin cinemas, a bank, an office building and parking for 1,100 vehicles. But the hearing on the variance was postponed for months, at the request of SEI, while lawyers studied the township ordinance.

In the meantime, opposition to the mall continued to grow. In Union, homeowners and merchants organized a committee called PURE (Preserve Union's Residential Environment), while in neighboring Springfield and Kentwood, municipal officials went on record as strongly opposed to the project.

The Board of Adjustment hearing finally got under way in April 1979. It continued into May and June, with an array of witnesses from both sides testifying on traffic conditions, buffers between the mall and nearby homes and other purposes for which the land could be used.


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Shoulder pads will be noticed in fall, winter

Shoulder pads are going to be noticed in fall and winter. Whether we like it or not, they are definitely in.

Setting in shoulder pads is not as easy as it sounds. To really see what you are doing, you need the garment wrong side out. If you turn the garment wrong side out, the shoulder pad is going to curve the wrong way.

If you have a dress form hidden away in the attic, now is the time to dig it out. You can slip the garment onto the form, then slip shoulder pads in place. Adjust pads until they fit correctly, with the long straight edge extending beyond the sleeve seam at shoulder about one-half inch. This "fills in" the top of the sleeve and gives your garment a professional "hang."

No dress form? Then your knee serves just as well. Place garment shoulder right side up over your knee. Slip shoulder pad in place. Adjust. Pin. Turn garment so it makes curve of fit. Using a double strand of thread, hand sew long straight edge of pad to seam. This will hold pad in place. Sew shoulder seam. Allow seam to bottom layer of pad (do not stitch through pad). Check pad to get seam allowances near neckline.

If you do not want the added height created by shoulder pads, use shoulder pads, but still want the professional smoothness and hang, select "shoulder shapes." These are very thin pads that add little height.

For figures with one shoulder higher than the other, the low shoulder can be raised with extra padding.

Patterns not allowing for shoulder pads may fit too tightly underarms if pads are added. Check the back of the pattern envelope under Notions to determine whether or not it calls for pads.

In shortening pleated skirts overturn waist

According to pleated skirts are currently a big fashion item and generally look well on most figures. The problem with many pleated skirts is the length. If the skirt is too short, little can be done to lengthen it. However, if the skirt is too long, one trick is to turn over the waistband to gain the desired shortness. If this does not do the job, then the skirt will have to be shortened either from the waist or from the bottom.

If a hem is already turned up at the bottom, then the best method is to increase the width of the bottom hem. With this method, each pleat will have to be pressed in a reverse direction.

Although time consuming, setting in each pleat can be easier if a mixture of equal parts of vinegar and water are put in the steam iron and the edge of each pleat pressed with the vinegar and water spray.

If the hem at the bottom of an accordion pleated skirt is a narrow rolled type hem, the best method of shortening is either cutting off that rolled hem and hemming the skirt according to the previous directions; or shortening it from the waist.

To shorten such a skirt from the waist can mean resetting the zipper and the waistband lower onto the skirt. Or if the skirt has an elastic waistband, then making a new elastic casing can solve the problem.

Keeping cold out of homes

Keeping the cold out and the warmth in can be an interesting challenge to the total family with winter approaching. It is suggested that each person compile a list of what can be done to help keep the cold out and the warmth in. This list could be posted on the refrigerator door and each person invited to add to the list.

To start the family thinking about saving heat, this "do" list can include the following:

- Cover inside of unopened windows with clear plastic.
- Apply weather stripping on outside doors.
- Make draft dodgers for closed doors, operable windows and garage door.
- Devise a heat deflector for all radiators to send heat into the room.
- Use "pull" draperies at night time. However, if radiators are by the windows, do not pull draperies unless a heat deflector is used.
- Hang quilts or coverings over open stairways to stop up drafts.
- Seal unneeded keyholes.
- Use open containers of vinegar to clear air instead of exhaust fan.
- Keep doors to unneeded rooms closed; make a habit of closing doors when leaving a room.
- Use tape to cover unused electric outlets or insert pre-cut insulation for outlets.
- Following the "do" list will make the family members comfortable living with 65 degrees F. heat setting and saving money.

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How to benefit from special food additives

Did you know that some food additives are good for you? If you are suspicious of food additives, you might be surprised to learn of benefits from one complex carbohydrate commonly added to different foods. Pectin is found naturally in apples, oranges and grapefruit. It's also made commercially by thickening processed foods such as jellies, jams and marmalades. Meat commercial pectin is extracted from citrus peels, although some is made from apple pomace.

According to Sheldon Reiser, chief of the Carbohydrates Nutrition Laboratory, Human Nutrition Center, U.S. Department of Agriculture, chemically, pectin is not only a polysaccharide having 10 or more types of sugars linked together, but also a non-fiber "hypoholsteremic" action; that is, it lowers cholesterol levels in the blood.

In several studies with mice, cholesterol levels were reduced in the blood of males after they ate from six to 10 percent of their diet from pectin. In contrast, cholesterol was not lowered when males ate the equivalent amount of cellulose or wheat flour. The cholesterol-lowering effect of pectin may be that pectin absorbs more bile salts in the gastrointestinal tract than does cellulose.

When you think of additives, remember that some are still good for you. If you are concerned about the chemical additives in foods, the Food and Drug Administration has placed limits on the amounts of additives that can be used.

Nonfat dry milk makes a nutritious good companion for those who like to be next to nature. It packs light, requires very little storage space and has all the nonfat nutrients of fresh fluid milk. There is no waste in using nonfat dry milk. Just measure and mix what you need, then resal the package for the next milk break. While useful as a beverage, it also can be used in any recipe that calls for milk in camping favorites such as pancakes, scrambled eggs and French toast.

Instant nonfat dry milk can be used in different ways; but, did you know it even lets you prepare your own butter-milk? Here's how: First, lightly the desired amount of nonfat dry milk that you need. Do not chill; then, stir in enough cup commercial or homemade buttermilk. Let stand at room temperature eight hours, or until thickened. Add a pinch of salt if you desire and stir until smooth. Refrigerate until ready to use.

Packaged instant nonfat dry milk should be kept in a cool, dry place without refrigeration. If kept carefully sealed it should last six months.

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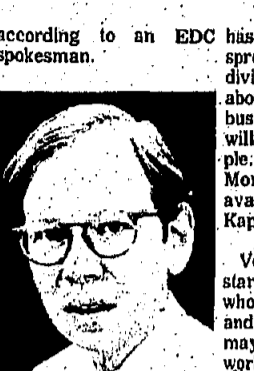

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Israel Bonds to offer 'fluctuating' interest

Expanded bonuses and educational aid are available to people who join or reenlist in the New Jersey National Guard.

A maximum of \$1,000 in school aid may be granted for each year. The maximum amount granted for a six-year enlistment is \$4,000. In the past, the maximum amount was \$2,000.

All active members of the Army National Guard and the U.S. Army Reserve will not receive this benefit until the completion of their service.
