### County businessmen optimistic about 1981

Union County businessmen expect to hold their own throughout 1981, according to a state-wide business outlook survey conducted by the New Jersey Business and Industry Association.

More than 300 county firms were among 2,447 statewide companies estimating their 1981 employment, profits, prices and problems.

Here is a profile of what local businessmen told the pollsters: Sales: Sixty-three percent of the county firms polled estimate increased sales for 1981, with one in four projecting hikes of more than 10 percent.

Employment: Almost six out of 10 firms polled expect to maintain a work force at 1980 levels. About one in four companies expect to add additional employees; 22 companies polled expect the work force to expand by more than 10 percent.

Wages and Prices: Both wages and prices will rise for 1981. The majority of pollsters estimate wage hikes within six to 10 percent range; 81 of the 319 legal firms expect the new year's payroll to rise more than 10 percent above last year.

All I did was mention that I had lost 11 pounds and suddenly I find myself under heavy attack. However, this is where my built-in advantages are. My theory (again, actually, I deserve every letter and perhaps quackery) is that an overweight person often is two kinds of people: a slave to hunger and a slave to laziness. You wouldn't believe the tasteless. I say being one kind of slave is now I am barraged with pleas from people who say, "I'll believe! Please don't get hungry, and they should try to stop feeling that way because it's miserable. They should eat something. But then if they compound that by eating something that is highly fattening, they become that other kind of 'perfect diet.' In fact, I do not consider a diet at all. I think of a diet as something temporary. Something you go on when you get fat. That's not the idea of my plan. My diet is for me, a way I can live the rest of my life. Second, this is my plan: It works for I want a dessert, I eat one. As rich as I can. I have no idea whether it will work or not. I just try it. Third, I in no way recommend it to hamburgers, steaks, prime rib or pot any body else. That's up to you and your roasts. But I have a world-of-other things to eat. If I want some protein, I have chicken for anybody else. I'll discuss milk, etc., etc., etc. Other things I eat include baked potatoes, spaghetti with butter instead of meat sauce, milk, cheese (especially cheddar) and well, just about anything in the world except red meat. Somehow, the ban on red meat starts a chain reaction in me that works. But, oh, yes, did I say I think the body requires animal fat? Well, when that happens to me—and it has, for I dropped a couple of pounds more than I desired, I find the other way I have my own solution to the problem, too. I just go eat a great big T-bone steak.

Fourth, I have a couple of built-in advantages which make it work for me, or so I feel—eggs, beans, lentils—except you may not have these. I'll discuss milk, etc., etc., etc. Other things I eat include baked potatoes, spaghetti with butter instead of meat sauce, milk, cheese (especially cheddar) and well, just about anything in the world except red meat. Somehow, the ban on red meat starts a chain reaction in me that works. But, oh, yes, did I say I think the body requires animal fat? And here are my two theories about my plan, which any nutritionist may feel free to call cockeyed. One, I believe the human body needs a certain amount of animal fat. 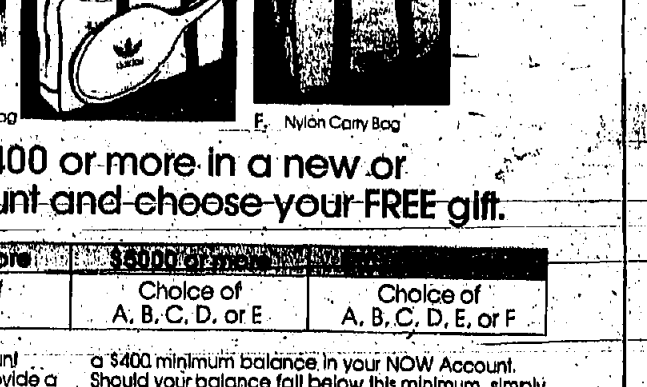

### Group discusses support for arrested protesters

Support for three New Jersey women arrested with other members of a women's group coalition staging a sit-in protest at the Pentagon was discussed at last month's meeting of the Union-Essex Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

The sit-in was part of a march in November in which many participants were arrested. The report given at the league's steering committee meeting focused on the experiences of Kathleen Kennedy, Kathleen McCreary and Susan Aronoff, who reaffirmed their belief that they had committed no crime by blocking the road.

The league asked for contributions for bail money for the three women to be sent to Women's Prison Aid, 2111 Florida Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. A full report from the arrested women is planned for the next membership meeting.

Also discussed at the meeting were plans to hold the escalating arms race. The league is urging all members to contact President-elect Ronald Reagan with a plea to continue the SALT negotiations, and reaffirms his campaign statement that he is "not a warmonger."

### Energy 'whiz' to talk at Newark Museum

As part of Newark Museum's "Soft Energy Expo," consultant physical Amory B. Lovins will present an "energy update" at the museum tomorrow.

Lovins, a British representative of Friends of the Earth, is active in energy policy in 15 countries. An international physicist speaks seven months each year, traveling in the United States and abroad "cross-pollinating" the energy grapevine," he calls it. He refers to "transmit the seed" for alternative technology tips or to gain access to influential realms of government and finance.

"Soft energy" describes the use of resources which, unlike petroleum, are renewable—the sun, the winds and recycled aluminum, or garbage. Soft energy also involves major changes in our use of energy, with a view to avoiding shortages of gasoline and heating oil.

As a former student of law, linguistics and physics at Harvard and Oxford Universities, Lovins served as a consultant to many environmental and energy-related bureaus, including the U.S. Energy Research and Development Administration, the U.S. Congress Office of Technology Assessment and the Science Council of Canada.

The "Soft Energy Expo" also has written numerous articles for professional publications concerned with energy/resource policy and other technical issues. In a 1978 article in "New Times" magazine, Lovins was referred to as "the whiz kid energy geologist."

Joining Lovins for tomorrow's program at the Newark Museum will be his wife and colleague, L. Hunter Lovins—a lawyer, sociologist, political scientist and forester.

Tours through the museum's "Soft Energy Expo" will begin at 3 p.m., preceding Mr. Lovins' presentation. The expo, a consumer-oriented exhibit

### Millionth call received by information center

N.J. TRANSIT's Rail Information Center, operated by Conrail in Newark, today took its one millionth telephone request for train schedule information.

The milestone call was made by Frank Russo of Hawthorne. Russo called the center to inquire about train service between Hawthorne and New York City.

The information center provides train schedules, fare information, and other travel facts over two toll-free numbers and one New York City phone line.

The volume of calls handled by the center has steadily increased since the center opened in November 1978. Jensen said, in 1979, the center handled 892,764 calls. The highest single-month calling volume was July 1980 when the center took more than 100,000 calls.

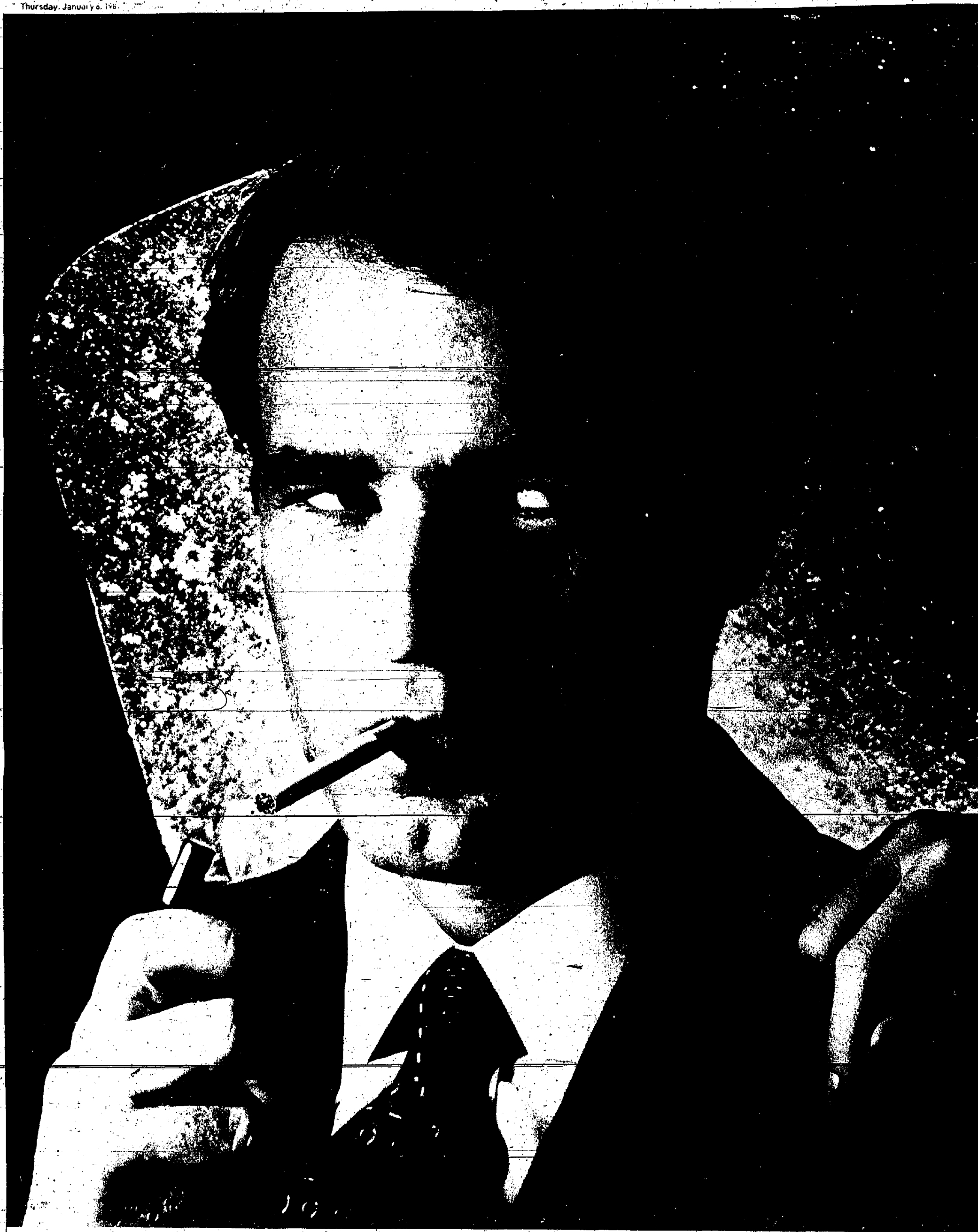
