Attorney General John Degnan's interpretation of the law would cause hold \$50 million from 1981 budgets.

Degnan's interpretation of the law would force local governments to use a smaller revenue base from which the five percent cap could be added.

The opinion by Degnan would mean municipalities would be prohibited from using money obtained through land sales in the revenue portion of the budget.
