The shift of people and wealth from the Northeast to the South is presenting major economic problems for New Jersey and 17 other states in the industrialized Northeast-Midwest region of the country.

Almost 90 percent of the nation's population growth between 1970 and 1977 was outside the Northeast-Midwest region, and the Census Bureau projects that the population of the South and West may grow at three times the rate of the Northeast-Midwest region between 1975 and 2000.

For every new non-agricultural job gained in Northeastern and Midwestern states between 1970 and 1977, the South and West gained three. In the same period, the Northeast-Midwest region lost nearly three-quarters of a million manufacturing jobs.

The remaining evidence of this economic shift away from Northeastern and Midwestern states has shown few signs of recovery. Programs of the federal government have inadvertently hastened the decline. Government tax and spending programs have triggered a massive flow of wealth from the region of the country to the fast-growing Sun-belt states in the South and West.

ACTION URGED: At the end of April, the state Assembly will consider a resolution to urge Congress to "transfer funding from only 60 cents in the federal budget for every dollar it sent to Washington in taxes."

For 1981, more than half of New Jersey's tax revenues—nearly \$7 billion—will go to the military. The Pretlagon program—a huge increase over this figure, with resultant cuts in almost all areas of human needs—opening.

Not all military and foreign experts agree that this expenditure is the corporate cost for our security. We warners and taxpayers must be aware that the companies spend large sums of money to lobby and press the Congress to assure that some military programs be retained.

At the same time, New Jersey's 42.7 percent gain in Defense Department income measured on a per capita basis was the second lowest in the Northeast-Midwest region and less than half the national average increase of 88.2 percent.

This unsettling trend of economic decline in New Jersey and the other older urbanized industrial states, which is mirrored by the "Sunbelt-oriented" representatives from New Jersey, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wisconsin.

Historically the smallest portion of the New Jersey General Fund Budget is for capital outlay or investment. The budget for fiscal year 1981-82 received, submitted by the governor is no exception. The two sections combined total \$1.1 billion.

Proposed spending for capital outlay in fiscal 1982 is \$5.5 million less than authorized in the present fiscal year. Debt service on the other hand is \$8.3 million more. The state is currently paying interest on 23 different bond authorizations with a total of \$1,670 million outstanding on July 1, 1981.

Prime Time Young and old agree on SS

By CYBRICKFIELD: The cartoon by Chan Lowe of the Oklahoma City Times shows a middle-aged worker sitting at his desk at home with a pile of papers and his pocket calculator in front of him.

Proposals to tax Social Security benefits in order to raise revenue for the system is opposed by the majority of respondents from both age groups (61 percent of those under 55 and 69 percent of those over 55). Also opposed is any further increase in the Social Security payroll tax (58 percent and 51 percent).

When asked to consider solutions to the long-term problems of Social Security, both young (81 percent) and old (79 percent) strongly endorsed the use of incentives to encourage older workers to stay on the job longer and delay drawing Social Security benefits.

At the same time, both age groups strongly support the use of general tax revenue to help supplement Social Security payroll taxes (70 percent of those under 55 and 65 percent of those over 55) preferred this option as well as financing of Medicare Part A (hospitalization) out of general tax revenues (70 percent and 62 percent, respectively, approved of this). 2 names for patchwork

As the name "strip patchwork" suggests, fabrics are pieced together in strips. The strips are then cut apart, rearranged, and sewn into new patterns.

The craft is also called "Seminole patchwork" because the Seminoles of Florida make elaborate use of the technique in their costumes. According to "Strip Patchwork" (Van Nostrand Reinhold Publishers), by Tami Dudley, the Seminoles first learned patchwork from early white settlers in the New World.

Even the most basic strip patchwork techniques can produce exciting results, as the book proves through beautiful examples of strip patchwork pillows, placemats, quilts, tote bags, and even T-shirts. Here are directions for placemats using easy strip patchwork techniques from Dudley's book:

MATERIALS: Two colors of plain, 45-inch-wide fabric for patchwork. One-half yard 45-inch-wide fabric to back two placemats, polyester batting, two yards of bias tape per placemat, scissors, ruler, pencil, sewing supplies, iron, yardstick or straight edge.

STRIP PATCHWORK DIRECTIONS: To assure a straight edge, tear a narrow strip from the edge of fabric. Mark 3.5 inches from edge. Clip in from selvage for ease in tearing. Tear off the 3.5-inch strip. Press strip to remove puckering from edges. Using a stitch per inch, sew two contrasting strips together, one-quarter-inch seam. Press seam toward darker fabric. Pin down band, wrong side up, on ironing board to straighten seam. Place a yardstick or straight edge over seam to keep it straight. Cut band into 1.5-inch-wide strips.

PATTERN 1: Lay 17 1.5-inch-wide strips in a row. Reverse alternate strips to form a checkerboard pattern. Join strips together with one-quarter-inch seams.

PATTERN 2: Lay 17 1.5-inch-wide strips in a row, with darker fabric at the bottom. Slide alternate strips up an inch. Join strips together with one-quarter-inch seams. Trim excess fabric at upper and lower edges.

ASSEMBLING PLACEMATS: For each placemat, cut two plain bands two inches by 17 inches. Form a large rectangle by alternating plain and patchwork bands. Join bands with one-quarter-inch seams. Cut plain fabric and batting to same size as patchwork rectangle. With right sides outside, sandwich batting between patchwork and plain fabric rectangles. Baste a "cross" through all layers. Hand-stitch near patchwork seam lines.

FINISHING: Open out one edge of bias tape. With right sides together, pin tape to placemat, three-eighths-inch from edge. Stitch tape along fold line. Turn over edge. Hem-stitch or machine-stitch in place.

Dark walls produce intimate atmosphere

Q. We're moving into a very attractive new condominium and I'm anxious to repaint the off-white walls.

A. I have rather good furniture in light colors and I'd like to keep the color of the walls to contrast with the furniture. We have a very large window, my choice would be to buy new matching covers for door and window—even if the existing curtain is good. You need not buy expensive ones—instead look for ready-made that you could adapt at your windows.

Q. We have a very plain house that I am trying to give a Spanish flavor to. Our main problem is the living room where I am having the walls redone in a very heavy stucco finish.

A. We have removed the old carpet and put a glazed tile which is beautiful. But I don't know how to treat a set of three windows (the only ones in the room) across the front of our living room. The window is about two feet taller than the ones on each side of it, although they are the same width.

Q. We have a 3-by-5 foot window in our living room which we want to get curtains or something else for.

A. The window was hidden from view by a large hutch which we want to get rid of. The curtain for the sliding glass door is a two-tone gold print. Our rug is a medium green, the wall semi-gloss white, the couch is beige with blues, gold, brown and black and a chair is in dark brown leather.

Q. You could choose a window covering that is altogether different from the curtain for your sliding door. For example, you could choose wooden shutters.

A. You might consider having a carpenter build you a lambrequin to place over your windows. This wooden frame could be designed with an arched portion over the center window and straight lines over the two smaller windows.

Q. The lambrequin could be the frame from which you could hang wide window shutters. Paint the shutter the color for a more formal look or a dark stain for a more Moorish look.

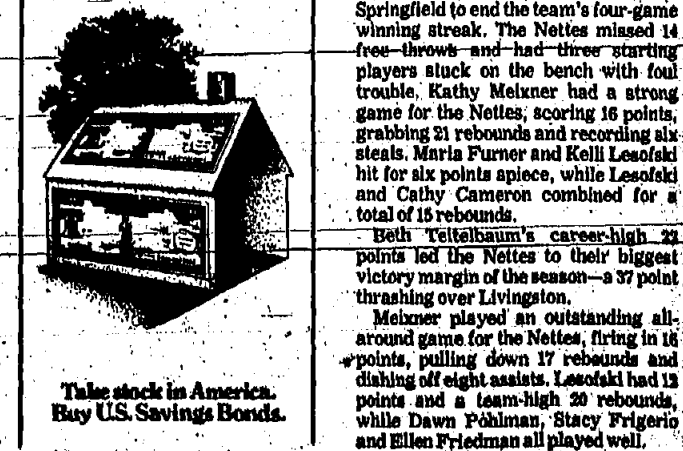
