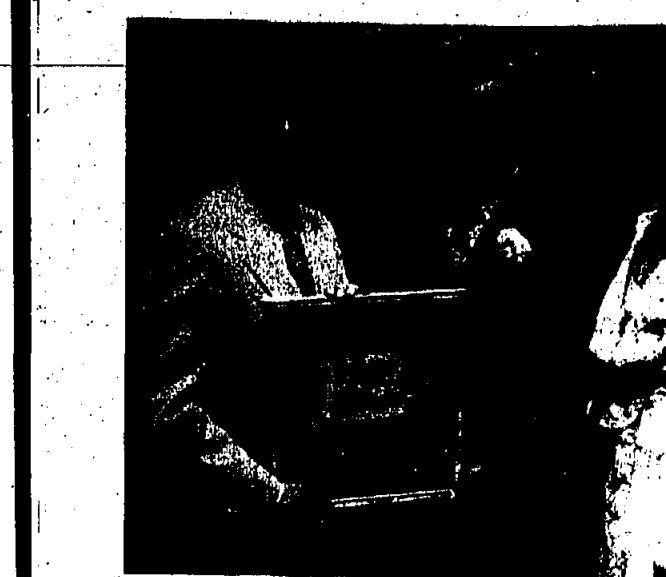

Area artist displays paintings in Summit

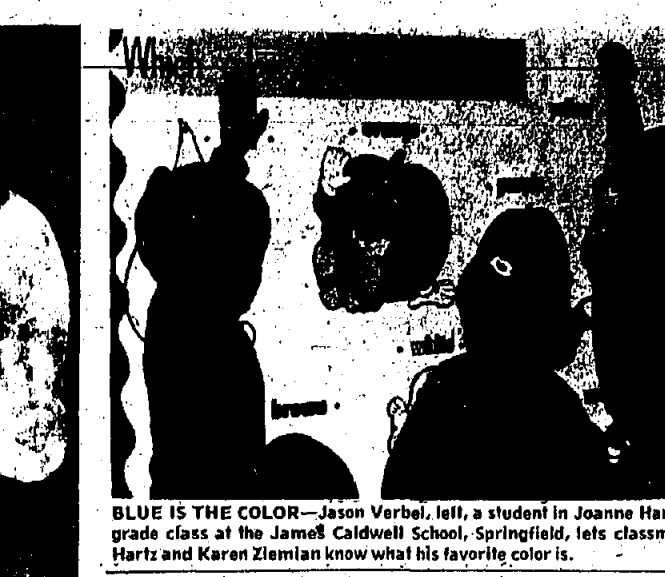

Summer jobs for youths offered by Union County

Youths age 14 through 21 who are looking for summer jobs may be eligible for work under the Summer Youth Employment Program, which is operated in Union County by the county Department of Human Resources.

There are two programs available: one for youths no longer attending school, and the other for youths who will be returning to school in the fall. The program for youngsters who are no longer in school provides a 40-hour work week at the rate of \$4 per hour but no more than 22. Also, the total family income must be within certain limitations, unless the applicant is physically or mentally handicapped. All of the jobs will be with public, non-profit agencies.

The county Department of Human Resources, Division of Youth Services, will process applicants who live in Union, Clark, Springfield, Winfield Park, Hillside and Kenilworth. Residents in other communities in Union County will be processed by local agencies in their community.

Persons interested in the Summer Youth Employment Program should inquire at the Union County Service Bureau office at 635 East St. George Ave. in Roselle or call 245-3400 and ask for Al Bowden or Gaynell Hendricks. Applicants will have to show proof of their residence, family income and possession of a Social Security Card to be enrolled in the program.

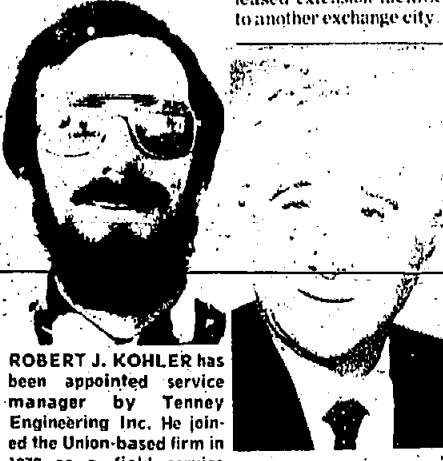
Island Beach bus shuttle begins weekend service

Selective Service begins to train potential boards

Selective Service has begun a program to recruit and train civilian volunteers for possible future service on local boards throughout the nation as part of the Congressional-approved and funded total revitalization of Selective Service. The boards themselves would not be established unless Congress directed a return to the draft. However, pre-selection and training of board members in peacetime will be beneficial in several ways: It will assure that people selected will be representative of the communities they serve. It will give Selective Service time, in the relative calm of peacetime, to train the board members in Selective Service policies and procedures. This will assure uniform treatment, should the draft ever be resumed, of individuals requesting postponements, deferments and exemption.

While most New Jerseyans feel safe in their own neighborhoods, 2 in 5 think crime has increased in the last year. In addition, one Jersey household in five has been hit by crime in the last six months. These are some of the findings of the latest Eagleton Poll. The Rutgers-based poll, conducted in May, asked 501 New Jerseyans 18 years and older about crime and neighborhood safety. State residents agreed that they feel safe in their neighborhoods. Only 6 percent reported feeling "not at all safe" during the day, although 13 percent felt this way about the safety of their neighborhood at night. While the number of state residents who feel "very safe" during the day was 61 percent, fewer, 42 percent, said their neighborhood was very safe at night. Two groups of state residents who felt less secure were those 50 years and older and females. Fifty-two percent of those 50 years and older and 54 percent of the females said their neighborhoods were very safe during the day. However, these groups were much more fearful at night. Twenty percent of those 50 years and older and 19 percent of females reported their neighborhoods were not at all safe in the evening. While half of those interviewed said there had been no change in the rate of crime in their neighborhood, far more of the remaining half said crime had gone up rather than down over the last year. Forty-one percent felt there was now more crime while only 4 percent felt that crime had decreased. Most state residents reported that no one in their household had been a victim in the past 6 months. In households that had first-hand experience with crime, more state residents were victims of property damage or thefts than physical assaults. • 14 percent had property vandalized • 12 percent had money or property stolen • 12 percent had a car stolen or broken into • 7 percent had their homes broken into • 2 percent had been assaulted or mugged • Five percent of the 116 victimized households reported a handgun had been used in the crime. In addition, the poll found that one New Jersey household in four had a firearm. Five percent of these households had a handgun, 9 percent had a handgun plus another type of firearm and 10 percent had a firearm that is not a handgun. South Jerseyans were more likely to have a firearm than those living in other parts of the state. While 17 percent of north and 29 percent of central Jersey households reported they had a firearm, 23 percent of those in south Jersey have some type of gun. The data presented in this release are based on a randomly selected sample of 501 New Jersey residents 18 years and older. All interviews were conducted by telephone between May 6 and May 11. Sampling error for the entire sample is plus or minus 5 percent at a confidence interval of 95 percent. The error for smaller sub-groups is larger, depending on the number of respondents in the sub-group. The theoretical margin of error does not take into account possible additional error from various practical difficulties involved in taking any survey of public opinion.

Consumer price index rose .6 percent in April

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) for New York-Northeastern New Jersey rose .6 percent in April, according to Samuel N. Ehrenhalt, regional commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Ehrenhalt attributed the bulk of the increase to higher prices for electricity, natural gas, restaurant meals, transportation and medical care. Seasonally adjusted, the area CPI rose 0.5 percent in April, following a 0.4 percent increase in March. Ehrenhalt pointed out that the increases for the last two months were about half the 1 percent average for the preceding four months. This easing, he noted, largely reflected declines in the home-ownership sector, resulting from lower home purchase prices, as well as smaller energy price increases. With the New York-Northeastern New Jersey CPI for all urban consumers at 253.4 in April 1981, \$25.34 was required to buy what \$10 could purchase in the 1967 base period. The purchasing power of the dollar was 29.2 cents. The April CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers was up 0.4 percent from March and 0.6 percent over the year.
