A sad-happy adieu

The news came as a big surprise to everyone at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School: head football coach Angelo Senese was leaving the Bulldogs to assume those same responsibilities at Hopatcong High School.

Of course, we are sad to see Senese go. He will be missed at Dayton — as an English teacher and as a coach. But it is an important step for Senese and a decision made with his wife and the respect of his first child in mind.

There is little more that Senese can accomplish at Dayton; there is even less that he has to prove. In four years, he took a football program that was considered one of the biggest jokes in the state — falling to win 19 games at one point — and turned it into a winner.

And when the B-3 Bulldogs trudged off the field that cold December day in Hackenskill, Senese insisted that his players march off in double file, heads held high. It was a class move by a class coach.

No one can be bitter about Senese's departure. We stuck with his kids from their freshman to senior seasons and he left after the best football season in many years at Dayton. He leaves the Bulldog football program as strong as it ever has been.

It will be difficult for Dayton's football players and fans to adjust to a new coach and, possibly, a new system. They grew to appreciate the Senese system and they saw, firsthand, that it worked. And worked well.

All of us who follow Dayton football and, more importantly, concern ourselves with the welfare of Dayton students and with that phenomenon called school pride owe Senese a thank-you and a pat on the back for a job well done.

Good luck, Angelo. The 'Dawgs will miss you.

Your Library

A look at the life of Laurence Olivier

Following are the recently popular books for summer reading at the Springfield Public Library. ACROSS DISTINCTION by Thomas Kierman. Although the biography of Laurence Olivier was not authorized, it is nevertheless carefully researched and does not stray too far from the facts.

At 21, with the celebrated Birmingham Repertory Company, he had changed "from a scruffy, lonely adolescent in a dingy, hand-me-down suit" to a distinguished romantic actor. Kierman delineates Olivier's progress as he gained experience with failures and successes in his private and public life.

Two years later the Nechamans were induced to file a suit against White Laboratories, one of the manufacturers of DES. The authors (Charles and Anne Nechamans) describe the long, drawn-out, tortious present extracts from the testimony, and report on legal proceedings.

Good communication — written or verbal — is a requisite for success in most all areas of business, politics, education, community service and personal problems. To be able to stand up and speak well, with skill and confidence, to become a better communicator is a worthy goal and to this end, the author addresses himself.

With respect to the right subject must be selected (examples are given), the speech should be planned (introduction, middle, conclusion) and should be written (tips are given). Four types of speeches are proposed: those which inform, or persuade, or inspire, or entertain. Examples of these are cited, with advice for presentation and development.

Gaining and holding the attention of the audience, the use of examples and gestures in speaking, reaching and stirring the emotions of listeners — all these are problems which are discussed. Persuasive speaking and sincerity in speech, are also highly recommended. The author offers several examples of good speeches, a checklist for more effective speaking, and a self-scoring test.

In the garden: Some tips for month of June

By MAE SAMMARCO By this time I hope all homeowners have plucked off all bulb seedpods so the bulbs can send all strength derived from the leaves into replacing the old bulb with a new one for next year.

If the leaves are getting yellow, you can cut them off to the soil. Feed them some bulb food to help them grow better. Cut iris stems also when blooms all die back.

If your spring flowering shrubs are through blooming, now is the time to prune back or thin out if they are over-sized or too thick or too tall. Lilacs should be cut back at all. I merely cut off the dried lilac bloom now. Do not cut the new growth. That's where next year's bloom will come from.

When pruning flowering shrubs, don't treat them like hedges and shape them square, oval or coned. They were never intended to be grown that way. Shape them like a bush or a tree. Prune them like a tree, with branches uneven and some space between them.

TIMELY TIPS

The gardening season is well under way. The brilliance of the billions of Spring blooms is evidence of reduced damage this past winter.

1. The Gypsy Moth caterpillars are here! Caterpillars may be controlled NOW with contact and stomach pesticides. READ THE LABEL.
2. Gypsy Moth and other caterpillars may be controlled with the biological insecticide *Bacillus THURINGIENSIS* (BT). Read the label.
3. Mechanical traps may also be used to suppress the Gypsy Moth caterpillars.
4. Water conservation must continue. Replace leaky or worn out garden hoses and sprinklers. Install drip irrigation systems in vegetable, flower and ornamental gardens. Save one of our most precious resources, WATER.
5. Continue weed clean-up. Broadleaf and grassy weeds may be controlled with post-emergent chemicals now.
6. Prepare hanging baskets, window boxes, and planters for outdoor use. Prepared soil mixes will save time and money.
7. Seed new and shade now to assure successful growth. Homegrown, healthy seedling plants avoid high costs. READ THE LABEL.
8. Crawling insects around the home may be stopped now. Application of insecticides in and around the home must follow label directions. Read the label!
9. Feed garden plants such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, etc. Proper nutrients will greatly increase the harvest.
10. Spray equipment should be ready for use. Replace dirty, worn equipment. Quality is a must for spray equipment.
11. Start the 1982 compost pile. Leaves from spring cleanup and grass clippings that have not been treated with weed killers may be used.
12. Stake or cage tomatoes before they get to large plants.
13. Pest control in the vegetable patch is at hand. Always read the label and follow the manufacturer's recommended rates and directions.
14. Beautify your surroundings and keep out animals. Fencing will help.
15. Keep your lawn looking good all summer. Apply a fungicide now to head off later problems.
16. Prune any winter damage to trees and shrubs. Broken branches provide excellent entry points for diseases and insects.
17. Plant tender annuals now. These include annual flowers and vegetables such as tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, squash, etc. Be sure to water-in all transplants. A starter solution of fertilizer may be added at the same time.
18. Apply mulches to proper depth to provide weed control in the garden. Mulching also conserves moisture.
19. Gravelled areas around the home may be stepped now. It is often necessary to make a second application.
20. The "Number One" rule of the Garden Hotline - when using a pesticide, "Read the Label. Follow the Manufacturer's Recommended Rates and Directions."
