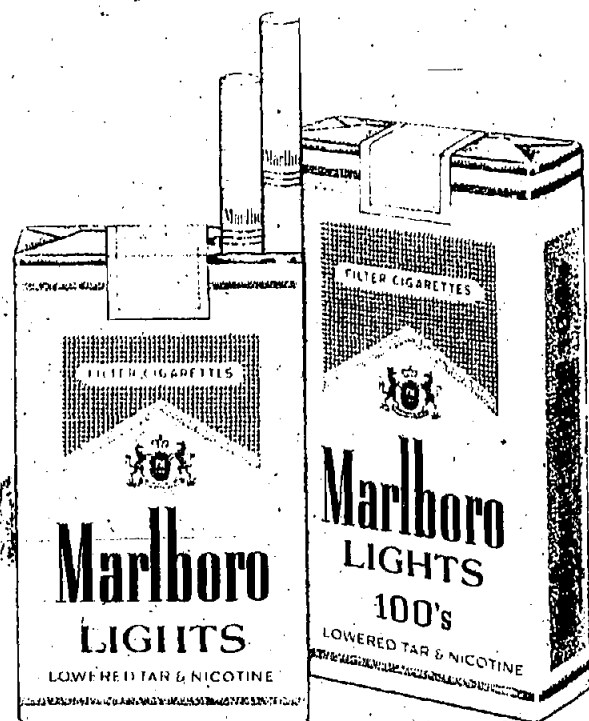

Teen's career in modeling is moving ahead

An 18-year-old model from Springfield is making her way into the world of glamor and fashion. Barbara Marliano of Milltown Road gave her career a boost last month when she appeared in Seventeen Magazine's Fall Trends Show in the Parsons Fashion Center in New York City.

Although that was her latest appearance, Marliano is not a stranger to the business. Since the age of 15, when she approached Seventeen, she has appeared in many shows and publications in which she has promoted the designs of top clothing manufacturers.

Her credits include two appearances in Seventeen, in June and November of 1980, spots in the Sears and Roebuck catalogue, recent shows at Monmouth Mall in Eatontown and Sachs in Springfield and another Seventeen show held in Lincoln Center in New York.

The spring graduate of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, who this fall will be attending Union College in Cranford, said her next scheduled jobs will be for Bloomingdale in the Short Hills Mall, where she works as a promotional model. She will appear on Aug. 14 and 21, modeling both informally and as a mannequin.

Following that, she will be in a back-to-school fashion show at Hahnes in the Rockaway Mall. Marliano, who was represented by the Ford Modeling Agency in New York for more than a year, now has the Joyce Conover agency in Westfield handling her bookings. She said she hopes to be with Ellie, another New York-based agency, soon.

Her start in modeling came when she was 15 years old, when her family photographer compiled a small portfolio for her. After Seventeen saw the pictures and decided they liked what they saw, a fitting and photo session were arranged which led to her appearances in that magazine.

A lot of people are very impressed when you say you worked for Seventeen; it's very established," commented Marliano.

She said her interest in the business began when she was a little

girl. "It seemed so glamorous and when I was younger I was into older things. My family and friends said I should get involved — give it a shot — and I'm glad I did."

Although she had the interest, she said it took more than that to become successful and win jobs. Prior to being signed by an agency a major concern of hers is appearance. In addition, the portfolio must be top-notch.

Even with those things there is still an audition of sorts to go through. "They ask you to walk, do some dancing, smile, give a few different looks," she said.

If all that goes well, then there is the chance to be signed.

"They treat you very well, once they sign you."

For now, Marliano is enjoying the rewards of being a model and speculating on her future.

Part of the rewards include the admiration of her friends and family and a great social life, Marliano said.

"My best friend is very proud of me and the guys I date are very proud of it. My girlfriend is a model, that kind of thing."

"I love socializing; I don't let my modeling interfere with that."

She said she also is proud of herself. "I did everything on my own. I really did."

As for her future, that may include acting, a lot of which is part of modeling, she explained.

"This is just a step toward acting, actually... I would be very happy with doing soaps." Her planned major in college, drama and liberal arts, should help her toward that goal, she said. She admitted that dance lessons and singing also have added to her repertoire of talents.

During high school she also appeared in several plays at Union College.

No matter where her career goes, Marliano said the most important thing to her is her family, which she said is "very down to earth."

She lives at her Milltown Road with her parents and has two married sisters, ages 22 and 27, who live in the township. She also has a 20-year-old brother, who lives in Berkeley Heights.

Boilers to repair; cost is about \$49,000

For about \$49,000, the boilers at the James Caldwell School may be in more efficient working condition by the heating season.

The Board of Education passed the first reading of a resolution on July 14 that would make repairs necessitated by an insurance company report on the boilers.

Two burners need replacement, relubing is needed, controls and safety devices need updating, welding must be done and the safety codes and design of the boilers must be reviewed, according to board member John Westerfield.

The cost estimate is less than an original \$119,000 proposal for similar work.

"I feel good about this proposal... because it cuts the original cost more than half," Westerfield said.

Leonard DiGiovanni, board secretary, said the repairs would extend the life of the boilers "by at least five to 10 years."

Repairs needed on windows in the school will have to wait, the board decided, because of fiscal constraints brought on by the recent cut in state minimum aid which has strapped the district for funds.

"Get the boiler room working first in give us budgeted money to think about the windows," DiGiovanni said.

On the cuts in aid, there is a "very slim" chance of regaining the lost money, Board Vice President Arnold Genet said. He reported that the New Jersey School Boards Association has informed school districts that they will

probably have to work within their current budgets.

Last month \$202,058 in state minimum aid, the entire allotment for the district, was cut from the budget by the state.

To continue current programming this year, less than that money, the board would have to resort to "drastic" measures, board member Barbara Adler said. She added, however, that for the time being discretion is needed.

Superintendent Dr. Fred Baruchin was stronger in his comments.

"We can't accommodate those losses. Our budget was predicated upon those funds and they ought to come through."

He added, "They (the state) must come through with some solution legislatively."

In other business, new election procedures were added to board policy. They include selecting a non-partisan committee which will oversee the training and pre-screening of election workers. Workers will be instructed on the rules and laws of school board elections.

Also, police will be present at each polling place and legal council will be made available to workers during the election.

The changes were made following charges that CAUSE candidates, Lou Monaco, George Gomes and Dennis Francis, committed violations during the April board election. Monaco and Gomes were elected to the board.

The procedures were passed with one abstention, Adler, who said she did not vote because "the reason this was motivated was abominable."

Teachers: no pact is reason to take walk

More than 350 Union County Regional High School district teachers have taken a "no contract — no work" position.

The resolution was passed nearly unanimously during a recent, special meeting of the district's teachers in the Springfield Knights of Columbus hall, according to Evelyn McGill, president of Local 3417 AFT-310.

"Today's strike vote is the first step in letting the board know where we all stand," McGill said. "It's significant that all the district's teachers are standing together."

"I hope we have a settlement by Sept. 7, but in any event we'll be ready," she added.

Prior to taking the vote, McGill, an English teacher at Jonathan Dayton, presented the teachers with a report on the status of negotiations. "We had hoped we could bring you a contract package today, but the board's attitude made that impossible," she began.

"Even after three sessions with the mediator, the board still is stonewalling."

The American Federation of Teachers (AFT) Local 3417, won bargaining rights for teachers in the

four regional high schools in a secret ballot election last December. McGill said it, since February, has been in negotiation with the Board of Education and now is in mediation.

The four regional high schools are Jonathan Dayton in Springfield, Governor Livingston in Berkeley Heights, Arthur L. Johnson in Clark and David Breaux in Kenilworth.

After the vote was taken, AFT staff representative John Fallon briefed the teachers on the Federation's plans for the summer.

"We have scheduled two more sessions with the board and the mediator and we'll be reporting to you during the summer," he said. "We plan at least two meetings over the summer to report to you and, like this meeting, they'll be open to all teachers, not just Federation members."

Plans are under way to set up a crisis headquarters and a telephone hotline for the staff in the four district schools. "You'll be hearing from us," Fallon said.

Committees are being established to deal with matters such as fund raising, community relations, financial assistance and labor liaison.

Fireworks still up in air Merachnik gets strike authority

"On the positive side, we may break even," explained John Cottage, the director of this year's Fourth of July celebration.

As reported earlier this month, the annual fireworks display is in danger of being discontinued in the future if public interest, in the form of gate donations and business contributions, is not increased. Costs are increasing with inflation and this year, despite the largest crowd ever to see the fireworks, the final ledger showed a probable loss even though donations were still trickling in two weeks ago.

In 1982 about \$4,200 was collected, just \$300 short of the cost of the celebration. Of that, \$500 were donations from local businesses, down from \$900 contributed last year. The rest came from the largest gate collection in years attributed to perfect weather and the Jewish War Veterans and American Legion, who were manning the gates.

"They were a real help; the major contributing factor to why the gate collection was so good," said Cottage, who is also the director of emergency management in the township.

Cottage added that without the help of those two groups the fireworks could not have been put on, since emergency management does not have enough members to cover the gates.

He said part of the problem is that some people walk in but don't pay. What hurts contributions even more, he explained, is the large crowds that watch from across the street, at the high school and in the retention basin but contribute nothing to defray costs.

Also, since Meisel Field is a county park the town cannot charge anyone to see the fireworks. Meisel Field also is the only appropriate place to put on the show, Cottage explained.

"About four years ago it almost was discontinued. The committee which ran it disbanded. If emergency management said no, it would have to be discontinued," Cottage warned.

"Also, the more the town has to cough up, the more likely they're going to say we're not going to do it anymore."

"Everyone who came on the field should feel they were responsible for the fireworks next year," he commented.

In a special meeting held July 13, the Union County Regional Board gave Superintendent Donald Merachnik extraordinary powers to deal with a possible teacher strike in the fall.

A release issued by the board last week said the powers will "enable the four regional high schools located in Clark, Kenilworth, Springfield and Berkeley Heights to remain open should the teachers engage in a strike, as threatened, commencing in September of the new school year."

The local American Federation of Teachers (AFT), which represents about 350 teachers in the regional school system, this summer announced plans to renegotiate their contract to obtain fewer steps to maximum salary and other fringe benefits. The union has threatened to strike if their demands are not met.

The release stated further: "The Board of Education indicated that it has been and will continue to negotiate with the new teachers' union, the AFT, in good faith. However, in recognition of the threats that the AFT has given to the Board of Education, including advising the board and the newspapers that it has approved a strike, it was necessary that the board recognize this possibility and authorize its administration to deal with this contingency."

It was indicated that the main objective in giving extraordinary powers to the superintendent is to assure the citizens and students that the schools will be open, that they will be maintained and secure. The superintendent was authorized to hire teacher personnel, appropriate security personnel and to arrange for transportation of teachers and students to and from the various high schools maintained by the Board of Education. The board further indicated that since a strike is illegal under the laws of New Jersey, should a strike occur, it will deal with that aspect in the courts and seek appropriate court injunctions. The board directed its attorneys to prepare all necessary documents to accomplish its objectives."

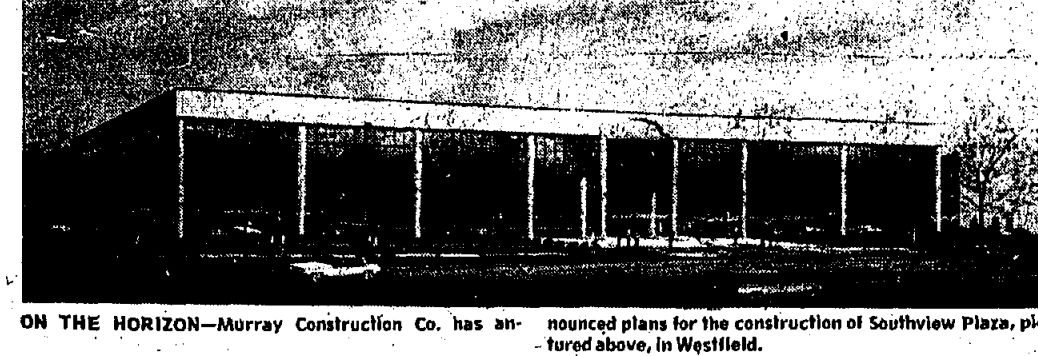

Opponents planning appeal on Route 78 ruling

An appeal of U.S. District Court Judge Frederick B. Lacey's recent ruling delaying the completion of Interstate Route 78 is on its way. In the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.

At least three of the four groups opposing the highway had decided, as of Tuesday, to join the appeal. According to Bob Barrett of Winer Neuburger and Sive — the law firm which is handling the case for the plaintiffs. The plaintiffs are the Parkland

Preservation Fund, the Watchung Nature Club, Berkeley Heights and Springfield townships. By Tuesday morning, all but Berkeley Heights had decided to appeal.

The notice of appeal is expected to be filed "this week in advance" of deadline (possibly this week), Barrett said. Although Lacey handed down the ruling in late June, the judgment was formally entered on Monday. The appeal has to be filed within 60 days of that date — Sept. 16.

Barrett said the appeal will be filed on a number of grounds: "The basic one is that we believe the judge's opinions to be in error."

He said that Lacey granted all motions for summary judgment for the defendants (the state) and "denied all relief to the plaintiffs."

In addition, "the judge's allowance of the advance acquisition of the Houdaille Quarry last fall was incorrect under the regulations because there was no need for advance acquisition, and no imminent development," the lawyer said.

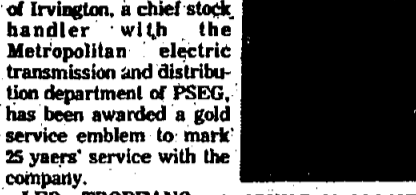

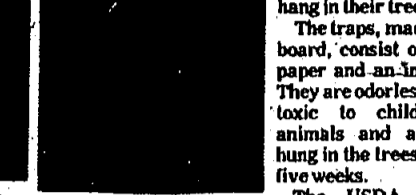

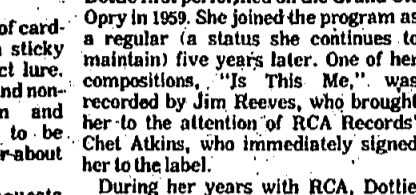
