



### The waste crisis

Union County — along with more than a dozen other counties in the state — is in the midst-ofanother solid waste disposal crisis.

Already beleaguered by threatened landfill closings, the counties now are faced with a state directive ordering them to get moving toward a solution — or else. If you don't start doing something, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection told the counties, we'll get the attorney general after you.

The directive has drawn a totally predictable cry of outrage from Union County authorities, who are protesting that they've had very little help from the state in solving this complex problem.

County officials are blaming the state for lack of strong leadership; they're perfectly right. State officials are blaming the counties for dragging their heels for a decade; they also are perfectly

There is plenty of blame to go around. But recriminations will not solve the problem of disposing of the mountains of garbage that we generate every day.

What is needed now is a solution.

There is much that the state can do. It can intervene to provide interim landfills for counties without sites of their own in other counties which don't want to accept solid waste from outsiders; itcan mandate source separation of paper and glass, a step which may be something of a nuisance to the householder but which will significantly reduce the amount of solid waste produced each day; and it can provide the technical help that is so sorely needed in planning for resource recovery plants.

There also is much the county can do. Principally, it can, and must, take firm action toward erecting a resource recovery facility. That means that the freeholders will have to have the courage to take some highly-unpopular steps. They will have to commit themselves to a site for a resource recovery plant. Just as important, they will have to make it clear to the taxpayers that garbage disposal is a costly business which is going to cost even more in the future.

We ran out of easy answers long ago. Now we've got to stop wasting time and face the unhappy facts: there may be no "perfect" solution to the problem of solid waste disposal, but we must pick the best of what's available, or face the threat of being buried under our own garbage.
