



Why follow rules?

The U.S. Postal Service's decision to allow the Union Post to retain its second class mailing privileges after acknowledging in an out-of-court settlement that the publication misrepresented its circulation figures to obtain the permit and did not have records to prove that it was eligible for the permit is an injustice to all newspaper publishers who comply with the law.

The agreement, apparently not known to the attorney representing the Postal Service, may be looked upon by newspaper publishers across the country as a precedentsetting decision, whereby publishers can ignore the federal rules and regulations governing second class mailing privileges — and get away with it.

With people like that representing the Postal Service, it's not difficult to determine why the federal authority. has all the problems it does.

Two weeks ago, the Postal Service and the Post reached an agreement that overturned the decisions of the New York Rates and Classification Service Center and the manager of the Postal Service's Business Mail Acceptance office in Washington, D.C., which concurred that the Post's second class mailing privileges should be revoked. Second class mailing privileges give a publication the right to publish a municipality's legal notices at a cost set by the Legislature.

To determine whether or not a publication is eligible for the permit, an audit is conducted which includes the availability of a list of subscribers, total circulation and the cost of the publication. In all three areas, the Rates and Classification Service Center and the Business Mail Acceptance office both stated that the Post, a Union Township-based publication that circulates in Springfield and Mountainside, kept "insufficient" records, Their rulings were to revoke the permit.

Fair enough, That's the law, Worrall Community Newspapers, holders of second class mailing permits for 18 of its 21 weekly newspapers, knows the rules and complies - and in fact, turns down business when it believes it might violate those rules.

But under the settlement agreed to two weeks ago by Postal Service attorney Kenneth Hollies, we are left with. the feeling that rules really don't mean anything. Publishers may violate the rules, be taken to task for it, receive the equivalent of a slap on the hand, and go about their business. We can break the law, appeal and appeal again. Along the way, we wouldn't have to worry because eventually, we'll be in Hollies' company, and how could he not agree to the same terms?

If, as is stated in the agreement signed by Publisher Leonard Weiss, the Post can account for only 16.9 percent of the circulation it swore to as having, then the amount which the Post is charging Union Township for publishing its legal notices is severely more than state law mandates. Other municipalities, including Springfield, have given Weiss an audience when he asked that his publication be considered for publishing legal notices, and we urge them to ask more detailed questions than did the governing body in neighboring Union Township.

The Post currently charges 34 cents per line based on a circulation figure of more than 9,000 but less than 10,000. At 16.9 percent, or 2,075, the Post should be charging only 25 cents per line, a difference of 9 cents per line. The total may not be astronomical, but it adds up to approximately \$3,000 of taxpayer money that the Union Township Committee should be collecting from the Post. And each week this amount will escalate until action is taken. One of the sad things about this is that the Union Township Committee, in the spring of 1993, took a cavalier approach to deciding whether or not to consider the Post for publishing its legal notices. Not one of Union's five committeemen ever asked for an audit of the Union Post as was requested in writing by taxpayers. They ignored information that the Post contained more than 65 percent. advertising, which would make it ineligible for public notice advertising under state law.

The National Newspaper Association has said it will investigate the terms of the agreement. One look at the publisher's statement required by law to be published in the Post clearly showed something was not right, according to a representative of the NNA.

An investigation of the agreement is needed, especially into why the Postal Service would allow itself to be walked over, why the Postal Service would allow itself to be swindled, and why the Postal Service would allow itself to be made a laughingstock among newspaper publishers across the country - and not do anything

Administration failed to follow steps

To the Editor: Elected officials have no greater responsibility than to protect the taxpayers' pocketbook and oversee municipal services to ensure efficient operations. That process requires proper planning and execution. I find it particularly disturbing that the current administration has failed to follow the simple steps of planning and execution - all at our expense!

The intent of this letter is twofold. First, I wish to point out the problems that exist and the cost to the taxpayers, and second, to strongly urge current and future administrations to learn from these mistakes and stop repeating them. Since the inception of the New Jersey Transportation Trust Fund, Springfield has always applied for and received substantial grants for repairs and resurfacing of its roads. In the past, these grants have neited our community more than \$100,000 each. He was a scrawny 13-year-old, but he could hit the ball. In fact, when the batter before him in the championship Little League game lined a single and got to second base on a throwing error, his teammates cheered when he came out of the on-deck circle and walked to the plate. The score was 1-1 in the top of the fourth. It was the Irvington Little League's Giants vs. Reds, and the winner of this game would bring home the championship and receive the larger-than-life trophy at the annual

Little League dinner. Before stepping to the plate, he looked back toward the stands and saw his father. His father was pacing the grounds between the stands and the dugout, the way he always paced everytime his son was at the plate. It comforted him, knowing his father was there.

The scrawny 13-year-old stepped to the plate. He took the first pitch low for a ball before swinging and missing at the second pitch. "The batter's gonna strike out." It was Cathy from the housing projects where he lived trying to jinx him. Cathy was biased because her brother Billy played for the Reds. So when the next pitch came in and he foultipped it off the backstop. Cathy was right there telling him how had he was, and again, that he was going to strike out.

But a voice from the other side calmed him. "Pace yourself." It was his. father, who brought his pacing closer to the area near the batter's box. The count was 1-2. There were two outs: If he choked, it could mean ne game and title. It also would mean some more harassment from

He remembered his father's words. "Pace yourself" meant relax, watch the pitcher and keep your eye on the ball. It's what his father taught him

He relaxed, watched the pitcher and kept his eye on the ball, and connected with a shot that fell borween the left and center fielders. The runner on second, who happened to be his brother, scored, and he went into econd with a stand-up double and a run batted in. With the score 2-1 in the Giants' favor, the fans cheered, but it was his father he searched for, and found, raising his fist in the air in a display of pride. It wouldn't be until many years later that he would realize his father was always there. The Giants held the Reds for the next two innings and went home with the championship title. When the Reds batted into their third out in the bottom of the sixth, he ran to his father and jumped into his arms with joy. He didn't say it then, nor at any time in the future, but it was his father who taught him the game and should have been given an honorary assist

That was 20 years ago and only one of the million memories I share My dad has always been there when I needed him - and even when didn't. That's why today - he's 63 and 1'm 33 - I admire him and appreciate him more than when I was a child, a teen and a young adul

I remember him being there in May 1966, when I was 5 years old and in St. Michael's Medical Center with pneumonia. Working just down the street from the hospital, he visited me every day and recalls how every day, I asked him to put me under his coat and sneak me out of this God-A few years later, we were walking near the pond in Irvington Park on

Easter Sunday. I was trying to be cool, walking along the edge of the pond like only kids do, dressed in my Easter Sunday best, when I fell into the water and he had to save me. Years later, in 1978, I remember him giving me the keys to his 1969 Chrysler Newport - I would take that car over a Cadilluc any day - to take my date to our high school prom. Boy, Lisa will be impressed. I had

They are all happy memories, except one, which occurred this year when my father was rushed to Saint Barnabas Medical Center with chestpains and shormess of breath. I was at work that night when my mother called, but as soon as I hung up the phone, I was out of the office and on my way to the hospital. The rescue squad had beaten me there by about five minutes, according to my mother, who questioned my driving while answering the questions of the receptionist in the emergency room My father would have to undergo an angioplasty, more commonly known as the balloon, to unblock some clogged vessels. That was a Wednesday morning, a heetic production day for me, but I, as well as my brother and sisters, were there for my dad. I got to Beth Israel a little late than I wanted to, and was forced to drive around the parking garage fo

approximately 20 minutes before I found a space. Walking to the hospital, I wondered if my former girlfriend would be working that morning. We had broken up two months earlier, and this would be the first time I'd see her since that memorable night at the Span ish Tayora in Mountainside. Not only was she working, she was in the operating room with my father as an OR nurse. I didn't know which should have been more worried about - her in the operating room, or the procedure itself.

Less than one hour later, the procedure completed, my dad was wheeled back to his room in the Cardiac Critical Care Unit and we were all by his side to offer our comfort. The first thing he asked me was how I could afford to be at Beth Israel on a Wednesday morning when I had to make sure 10 newspapers made Thursday's mail and the newsstands. It was simple. I wanted to be there for him as he had always been there

I love you, dad, and Happy Father's Day. And Happy Father's Day to all fathers reading our papers.
