Recreation properties to be revamped

The Township Committee is planning three recreational projects, including replacing the barren area in Jude Meadow Estates with a park. "There is a vacant lot there already, which will be converted into a passive park," said George Ragno, township recreation director.

"It is a piece of property that is decided to the area. It will be an attractive, landscaped area," said Mayor Marcia Forman. "It will have benches, flower beds and will be a pleasant place for the residents."

"It is not a playground, that's not the intent," she added.

According to Ragno, township officials met with area residents during the summer to discuss the situation. The residents didn't want a playground, but okayed a passive park.

"We promised the people we'd get a plan and then meet with them to discuss it," said Ragno.

A meeting will be held in the near future to show the residents the plan and discuss it further.

"It will improve the integrity of the drive; it'll be one of the first things you see. Basically, we're going to dress up the area. Right now it's just a barren wasteland," Ragno added.

There are also homes here and we'll have to separate their houses. The park will match the aesthetics of the area," he continued.

Another project that the township is working on is adding a new baseball field at Gardner School.

According to Ragno, a new baseball field can be added "without a lot of cost and effort. It's existing land. We can use it more this way."

According to Ragno, the reason for the additional baseball field is attributed to the growing population of children in Springfield.

"The field will benefit the recreation program, school kids in recess and gym. And it will be used for baseball and soccer as well," he said.

"The board has been planning for a while to put another baseball field in Gardner School," said Township Committee member Jo Ann Holmes. "Hopefully it will be completed by the end of the year."

According to Holmes, three groups united for the project: the Minneman Baseball League, the Board of Education and the Recreation Department.

Town's Planning Board proposes newest plan

In the latest revision of the township's Housing Element and Fair Share Plan, the township planner has officially dropped the former swim club and nursery sites, and added lots on Diacks Lane, Park Place and Hillside Avenue for development as housing.

The Diacks Lane site, which covers 5.2 acres, consists of 13 lots under different coverages. Almost half of the site is owned or controlled by option by Len Statile, who has expressed his interest in developing the land for multi-family senior citizen housing units.

"The location of the group of parcels, near the commercial center of Springfield and the San Bailey Civic Center, is an excellent location for the senior citizen housing," according to the new plan. "Pedestrian access to Morris Avenue also affords proximity to bus routes, which adds to the site's desirability for use."

The plan suggests rezoning the property owned by Statile to allow for construction of a three-story building with a density of 16 units per acre, for a total of 40 units. Eight units will be reserved for low- and moderate-income "senior citizens," Planner Robert Michaels said during the Planning Board's Feb. 15 meeting.

The remaining 2.7 acres of the tract would potentially be used for an additional nine units of housing for seniors.

The 8.2-acre property within the Park Place Condominiums development, once slated for development as office buildings, has been recommended for use as an affordable housing, district/regional, contribution agreement project.

With 81 affordable housing units allotted for the tract, it will replace the nursery property in the township's plan.

"Arden Associates, the owner of both the Park Place and nursery properties, has agreed to pay Springfield \$340,000 to be used to pay the City of Linden its assumed responsibility for 17 dwellings.

The payment of these funds for the RCA, to which the mayor of Linden has agreed, will be made upon passage of the necessary rezoning.

The third addition to the Housing Element and Fair Share Plan involves a piece of land, smaller than one acre, on Hillside Avenue near the Barnes & Noble bookstore on Route 22 West.

The land is owned by the Township of Springfield and has been used by the Springfield Garden Club since the 1970s. It generates no tax revenue for the town and is located in the multi-family residential zone.

"The land may go to New Jersey Connect, a non-profit group that works on behalf of disabled people. This new plan, released last week, will be the subject of discussion during the Planning Board's meeting on Monday at 7 p.m. in the cafeteria of Conditier School, located on South Springfield Avenue.

This plan is not the final word on low Springfield will meet its current, mandated affordable housing requirements: it is the Planning Board's recommendation to the Township Committee, which has the authority to amend Springfield's Master Plan.

The Township Committee will meet Tuesday to discuss the matter. The state Superior Court has mandated that Springfield submit its final plan for either incorporating affordable housing within its borders or entering into a regional contribution agreement with other municipalities.

Bill on high schools is still in committee

The bill before the state Senate, pertaining to the proposed reorganization of the county's high school district, remains unacted by the Senate Education Committee.

In May, Senate President Donald DiFrancesco, who represents the 22nd District, introduced the bill, which specifically deals with the Union County Regional High School District and the sharing of assets among the constituent districts if the district is dissolved.

According to Renee Trabert, spokesperson for DiFrancesco, the bill was referred to the Education Committee, while it has been amended since its introduction, no further action has been taken.

According to Trabert, DiFrancesco said that some of the issues involved in deregionalization should not be addressed through legislation.

The amended bill takes into account the titles and control of school grounds and buildings, and the furnishings and equipment inside the buildings.

"The withdrawing district and the remaining districts or such constituent district in the event of a dissolution, shall take title to and control of all school grounds and buildings, and the furnishings and equipment therein, other than those which had been rotated or shared among the regional schools, situated in their respective districts on the effective date of withdrawal or dissolution as established by the commissioner," according to the bill, known as S-1080.

The bill also delegates authority to the county superintendent to distribute any assets. "The county superintendent shall allow a fair proportion of the shared or retained furnishings and equipment to the withdrawing district or to each of the constituent districts in the event of a dissolution," the bill states.

The bill further discusses payment of debts. "Upon the assumption of title, each board shall also assume such amount of the indebtedness of the original regional school district as shall have been determined by the board of review. In the event of a withdrawal, the withdrawing district shall pay to the regional board of education, at least five days before it becomes due, the amount of the principle and interest of the assumed indebtedness," it states.

The bill goes further into detail regarding debt, stating that "such principle and interest shall be paid by the regional board, together with such amount due."

The bill also discusses what role the county superintendent and board of review will have in determining what will be paid. "In the event of a dissolution, the county superintendent and board of review, in determining the amount of indebtedness to be assumed by each constituent district, shall give due regard to the value of school building and grounds being conveyed to the constituent district in which those buildings and grounds are located," the bill states.

The bill also deals with bonds being issued to pay the taxes, saying that "the constituent districts may issue bonds for that amount, or any portion of that amount, pursuant to chapter 24 of Title 18A of the New Jersey statutes. Payment of that amount shall be made in full on or before the effective date of withdrawal or dissolution. This act shall take effect immediately."

Military program will be added to county high school curriculum

The Army ROTC will become a part of the Union County Regional High School curriculum next academic year, the Board of Education announced. "We've been approved by the Army to begin a program called the Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps," said Kenneth Matfield, superintendent of schools. "The four-year program is open to high school students, aged 14-18. The students would not be obligated to join the armed forces. According to Matfield, the purpose is to build better citizens by developing skills in leadership, public speaking, planning and studying. "It allows students to explore what a military career might be like," he added. "Students will begin with military protocol and drills. There's lots of extra-curricular activities to choose from." Participation in the program also gives students a competitive edge in obtaining ROTC scholarships for college, Matfield said. The program will be offered in Governor Livingston Regional High School and students from five regional six constituent towns will be based to the school. According to the Junior ROTC Training Guide, each grade level completes 180 hours, of which 108 are for required subjects. The remaining hours are for courses selected by the instructors from a list of Army-approved subjects, including: • **Map Reading** — Students will learn how to read a map, determine elevations and strategic and cardinal directions. They also will perform a dead reckoning exercise, locating a distant unknown location using eight-digit grid coordinates. • **American Military History** — Students will study the development of the United States military, from the American Revolution to the collapse of the Soviet Union. • **Career Opportunities** — Skills in developing a career exploration strategy, how to apply to colleges and filling out job applications will be taught. • **First Aid and Hygiene** — Classes will feature lifesaving measures, including how to evaluate a victim, stop bleeding, treat for shock and immobilize a fracture. Students will demonstrate proficiency in preventing/treating for heat and cold injuries, as well as for bites, stings and sprains. • **Techniques of Communication** — Students will learn efficient methods of taking notes, studying, taking tests and speaking in public. To demonstrate proficiency in writing, each will author an autobiography, a short position paper, and a research paper. • **Leadership** — Students will demonstrate an understanding of the traits, principles and styles of leadership, and methods for properly assuming a leadership role. They will

At least two instructors are required for programs of up to 150 students. For each additional 100 students, another instructor is required. Each program must have one Senior Army instructor, who has overall responsibility for the operation of the program, and at least one Army instructor to assist that SAI. Instructors are trained and certified by the Army, but they will be hired by and work for the school system. They will be responsible to both school officials and to the Army, and must adhere to school policies as well as to military standards. Their performance is under continual review by both the Army and the school system. Congress established the ROTC program with the National Defense Act of 1916. ROTC's popularity in the American high school system prompted Congress to expand the program in 1964, requiring each of the military services to operate Junior ROTC units. ROTC units are supported through a cooperative effort between the U.S. Army and host high schools in this country, its territories, and U.S. military communities abroad the world. Its mission, as stated by Congress in 1916, is to motivate young people to become better Americans. ROTC is not a recruitment program for the military. Although many graduates do enlist, ROTC's primary goal is to provide a quality education and training, equal numbers do not.

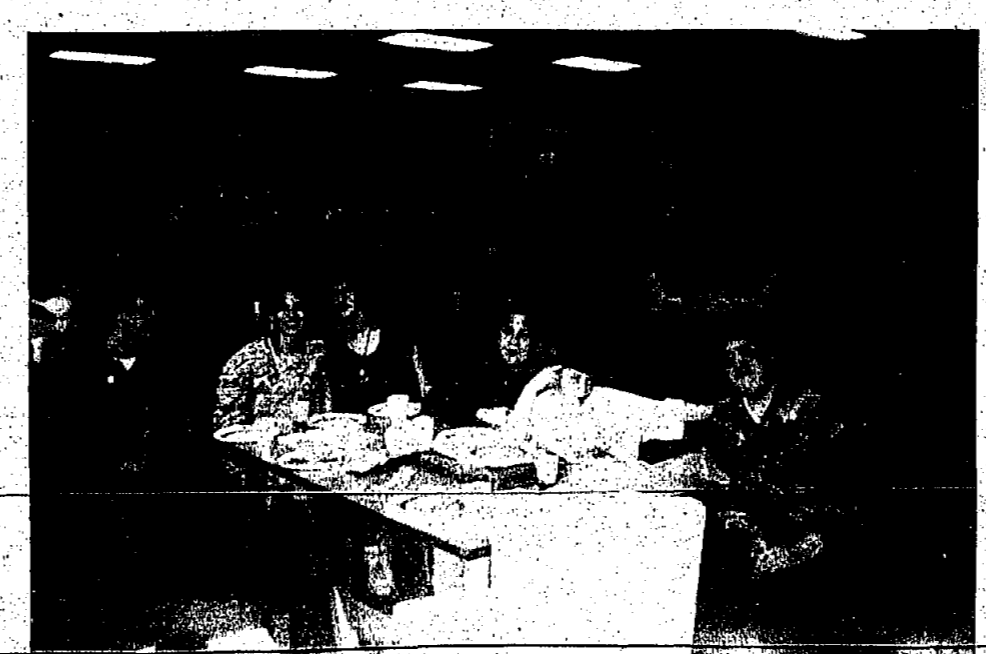

Gaudineer program unites students with mentors from seniors housing

As part of a mentoring program that pairs students with senior citizens, the Gaudineer Middle School hosted several seniors last week to see presentations of student projects as part of Native American Day. This is the second year of the program, and Thursday was the first time the seniors visited the school to see their progress in action. "They are so thrilled to be involved with them," said Judy Koth, a social worker affiliated with the seniors. "We look forward to seeing the children, and the kids look forward to the weekly visits." On this occasion, the students took turns recounting the histories of Native Americans — the Plains Indians, Pueblo and Iroquois, among others. Displaying the crafts that they spent months making themselves, the students demonstrated the lifestyles of several of the nations of Native Americans that once lived in North America. "The seniors, who live in the senior citizen housing complex on Hudson Avenue Way, usually pay host to the children, chosen from the seventh and eighth grades. In the past, the two groups have met for lunch, sometimes for pizza, other times for picnics. "I hope it will go further, to other places," said Helen Anderson, one of the visiting seniors, regarding this program's usefulness. "Other seniors and other students will get good feelings from it." They all began a lot from each other, Koth added. Activities considered mutually beneficial involve exploring any cultural differences created by the generational gap between the two groups, making educators and students out of children and adults alike. "I feel like a grandmother to them," Anderson said of her protégés, "and it makes a break in my life." Groups of students are rotated every two weeks, to maximize availability of all of the seniors to ensure a more diverse learning experience. Questions commonly asked of the seniors involved social mores of days past and historical facts. The occupational paths of graduates over the years are a generational point of reference. The seniors' personal recollections — including those of a World War I veteran — provoke animated discussion. Additional lessons in life for the



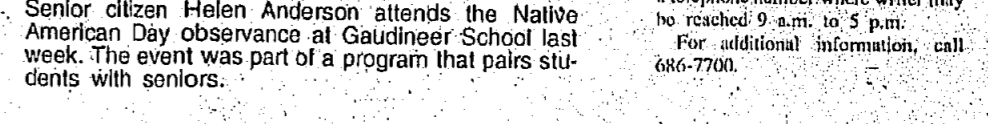

5 Dayton students earn top honors on AP exams

Five members of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School Class of 1994 have been named AP Scholars by the College Board in recognition of their exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement Examinations. Approximately 10 percent of America's graduating high school seniors have taken one or more AP Examinations during the past year. Only about 12 percent of the more than 450,000 students who took AP examinations in 1994 performed at a sufficiently high level to merit recognition as AP Scholars.

The College Board recognizes three levels of achievement — the AP Scholar with Distinction, the AP Scholar with Honor, and the AP Scholar. Jonathan Dayton graduate Michael Glover earned the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning grades of 3 or above on five or more AP Examinations, with an average exam grade of at least 3.5. Fellow 1994 Dayton graduates Gregory Cahauer, Michelle Nagler, Michelle Rozan and Maricé Saintry earned the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP Examinations with grades of 3 or higher.

SDI to build watchman station at Park and Ride

The continued car thefts at the Park and Ride lot on Springfield Avenue and Ridge Road is the focus of a new security effort. SDI, Joseph Steiner, president of Summit Downtown Inc., wrote, "We propose to erect a small security office (prefab) sited on the lot in the bus turnaround island, and have an attendant on duty in the lot from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays."

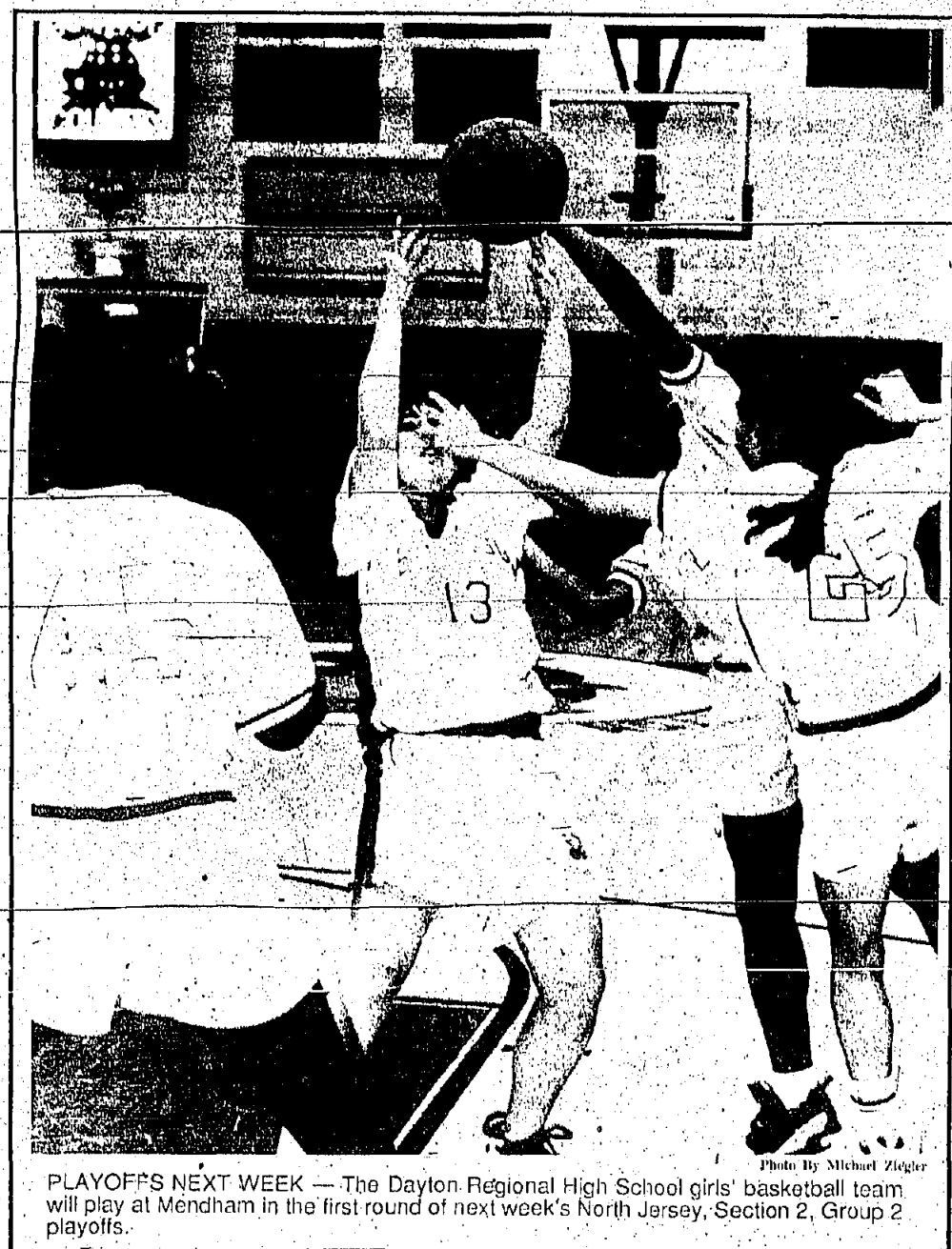

UCUA on call for recycling aid

The Union County Utilities Authority recently hosted a seminar for public and private school systems to help them implement effective recycling programs.

The seminar, "Recycling in Union County Schools," was open to both public and private school systems and attracted more than 60 school officials.

The UCUA's event, held on Jan. 26, is the first such initiative in the county. School systems are required to recycle under the county's solid waste management plan. The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has made school recycling a priority and requires each county to sponsor a seminar on school recycling.

Active participation by area schools is essential to the county's overall recycling success. "The county's schools are large producers of potential recyclables but there have been no coordinated efforts to recycle this material," said UCUA Chairwoman Blanche Banasiak.

During the seminar, experts from the UCUA, the DEP, waste haulers and area municipalities offered guidance on ways schools can participate in various recycling programs. The UCUA was represented by Executive Director Jeffrey Callahan and District Recycling Coordinator Marian Swintonsky.

The economic benefits of recycling were emphasized during the conference. "People always assume that recycling only involves extra costs, but that is not always the case," said Banasiak. "For example, the avoidance of disposal fees and the potential generation of revenues offset counter-charge for the costs of recycling. Beyond economic reasons, natural resource conservation and pollution prevention are the primary reasons to recycle."

In addition, the UCUA sponsors a recycling directory.

County program warns of storms before they happen

The lack of severe weather conditions hindering Union County motorists from getting to their destinations, this winter is not stopping officials from preparing themselves for a potential storm.

Last winter, which brought a multitude of snow storms that ravaged the county and state, served as a wake-up call, and county officials don't want motorists to be caught sleeping at the wheel on to spend this year. Officials hope to steer motorists away from the dumb luck approach employed by many last year when choosing a route to work, home or anywhere else for that matter.

During a Feb. 8 press conference of the Union County Administration Building in Elizabeth, officials announced the formation of a service to provide navigation to travelers of impending weather emergencies. Participants include the New Jersey Department of Transportation, municipal police and public works departments, Radio Amateur

"We'll never forget it," said then Laganga, coordinator of the Union County Office of Emergency Management.

Froehlich Henry W. Kurz, county OEM liaison, agreed. "The severity took everyone by surprise. At rush hour, many motorists frequently had no idea how road conditions were," Kurz recalled.

The real tragedy of last winter was that many of those who were stuck in traffic, ice or snow could have avoided those mishaps had they been aware of what they would be up against when traveling a particular route, Laganga pointed out that had "real time" current traffic advisory information been made available to motorists via the local media and other sources, incidents may have been avoided.

This has spurred the OEM to form a Union County travel advisory partnership with an assessment of public and private entities. Participants include The Salvation Army, American Red Cross, AAA New Jersey Automobile Club, the Union County Fireholders, the New Jersey Department of Transportation, municipal police and public works departments, Radio Amateur

Seized drug monies boost sheriff's fleet

Union County Sheriff Ralph Froehlich intends to use the nearly \$120,000 in funds seized during drug arrests to boost up his department's vehicular fleet.

The sheriff's office received two checks totaling \$119,593 from John J. Coleman, special agent in charge of the Newark Branch of the Drug Enforcement Administration. These checks represent a percentage of confiscated drug monies intercepted through the assistance of the sheriff's K-9 handlers and drug detection dogs.

Froehlich intends to use these funds to help replenish his fleet of vehicles, which have deteriorated during previous years. Capital equipment has received a low priority during periods of fiscal restraint and must take creative measures to bring his fleet of vehicles up to a safe and operational level where it can satisfy my mandated functions," said the sheriff.

Portions of these funds also will be directed toward domestic violence, senior citizens and community education programs, the sheriff noted.

On July 12, 1994, Sheriff's Office Brian Way, along with K-9 Falco, responded to DEA Headquarters in Newark and conducted a search of a non-contaminated area. Falco helped law enforcement authorities prove \$39,000 previously seized from "Tony Brand" and David Evans was involved in narcotic trafficking, according to the sheriff's office.

On Aug. 30, 1994, Sheriff's Office Mark Bank, along with K-9 Max, responded to DEA Headquarters in Newark at the request of Special Agent Treva T. Whitefield. Max was taken to a non-contaminated area where he conducted a drug sniff search and helped authorities prove that \$68,505 of the DEA recovered and been involved in narcotic trafficking, according to the sheriff's office. This money had been seized from George Gonzalez.

The Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984 allows law enforcement authorities to seize money used in narcotic trafficking and redistribute this money to law enforcement agencies to fund the war on drugs.

Specialty trained dogs like Max and Falco, along with their handlers, enable these seizures to take place. The accuracy of the dogs and the ability of the handlers to perform necessary sniff tests have been tested and upheld in federal and state courts. This asset enables law enforcement to take the profitability out of narcotic trafficking and use these funds for the public good," said Froehlich.

The sheriff, in recognition of the cooperation that exists between the DEA and his office, presented distinguished service certificates to the following agents: Coleman, Whitefield, Group Supervisor Stephen J. Moran and special agents Joseph P. McGinay, Earl W. Fielder, Jorge Marrero, Brent Edwards, John Piser, Alek Kozminski and Mark A. Rusin.

"I'm proud of my officers and the DEA. When law enforcement agencies come together and put aside jurisdictional authority they have the strength to overcome the efforts of organized criminal activity. Today's presentation of funds and awards represents the successful culmination of this type of cooperation," the sheriff stated.

At that point, we're going to be transmitting via fax and phone, travel advisories to our partners," stated Laganga. "Radio and cable stations will be asked to make ongoing travel advisory announcements. Large businesses will be contacted regarding the best time to send employees home, Red Cross and The Salvation Army will begin to open reception centers near major roadways, and AAA will advise its emergency road service facilities and members of the situation via a telephone recording."

In addition to the incident classification levels, the American Red Cross, The Salvation Army and AAA are working to educate motorists about the importance of being prepared in advance of a winter storm or other emergency.

"The position at the American Red Cross is that knowledge is one of the best defenses against disaster," said Anne Ditzel, disaster coordinator for the Eastern Union County Chapter of the American Red Cross. "In addition to establishing and staffing reception centers, our chapter is also encouraging the media to share our safety tips with the public."

Franz Fischer, assistant vice president of Public Relations and Safety for AAA in Florham Park, indicated that the club has provided numerous free safe winter driving workshops for area businesses and community groups during the past two months. "It's evident by the number of workshops we've conducted, that motorists are anxious to learn what they should do in advance of a winter storm," she said.

"This is just the kind of inter-governmental and inter-agency cooperation that serves our customers — the people of Union County," stated Union County Manager Ann Baran.
