Forman, Holmes leave office; cop seeks reversal of verdict

Mayor Marc Forman and Township Committee member Joan Holms announced their final Township Committee meeting Tuesday.

"I'm enjoying being on the outside, looking in and being an older statesman," said Forman, a veteran of six years on the governing body, including the past two at Springfield's mayor's office.

"I've enjoyed working in government and will enjoy leaving it," Forman said.

Regarding former plans, Forman didn't specify, but did say she "had been from Springfield" and plans to keep contact with municipal affairs. He has final remarks as a committee member. Holmes thanked the township's employees for the many times they'd answered her questions and expressed wish for an enjoyable retirement.

"They've done a wonderful job of keeping the town going," she added. "They deserve the praise."

Forman and Holms also thanked their families, including the celebration of her 75th wedding anniversary, the couple to spend some time with her husband and daughter. In addition, she will thank Jonathan Dapkin, Bogalusa-High School's Project Graduation Committee.

Following members of the Township Committee took turns expressing thanks and congratulations to both Mayor Forman and State and the township they will remain in touch with the Township Committee to serve as a resource for the township.

Westfield hired

Fight over housing lingers through '95

Springfield's obligation to provide affordable housing resurfaced this year, as plans were submitted and township residents protested the development of several sites in their neighborhoods.

January
The Jan. 4 Planning Board meeting saw board member Marc Marshall present a proposal, that he called the Republican Party's plan, that would have met the state requirements and would have preserved neighborhoods' character, satisfied the needs of senior citizens, and minimized tax hikes. Several of the points included in the plan echoed the ideas of Springfield Planner Robert Michale, who suggested paying the City of Linden \$340,000 to take responsibility for 17 of the units, using the Park Place area for housing instead of office space, eliminating the nursery as a housing site and amending the zoning rules to accommodate those plans.

"In what would be one of the last meetings before the deadline for submitting an affordable housing plan, on Jan. 23 the Planning Board granted developer Frank Racioppi the right to construct 81 townhouses on the Park Place site. Racioppi in turn would pay the township \$340,000 up front for the right to develop that land, and to preserve the neighborhood's character. The money would be used to pay, when the township assumes responsibility for the units, an \$18,000 monthly fee. The township would also be required to pay for the physical installation of the units. District dissolution issue nears settlement in '95

As far as the proposed deregionalization of the Union County Regional High School District was concerned, 1995 was the year that brought the district's constituents the closest to settling the issue as they'd ever come.

January
Deloitte & Touche and Finance America, two consulting firms contracted to examine the feasibility of dissolving the Union County Regional High School District, recommended deregionalization.

These firms, hired by the boards of education of Springfield, Mountainside, Berkeley Heights, Kenilworth and Clark, submitted their reports to Union County Superintendent of Schools Leonard Fink, who would then pass his recommendations to state Department of Education Commissioner Leon Klingbeil within the next five weeks.

It was noted that the decision, based on referendum in each of the member municipalities, would rest on Klingbeil.

February
The Regional High School Board of Education suffered a blow as it opposed the annual budget. As one of some 70 districts throughout the state to raise portions of state aid, the district had \$610,000 less than it was charged with through successive administrative years. Although the board had to compromise its budget with this year, it had members vowed to fight it through representatives in Trenton.

1995: A look back
This announcement could not come at a better time, as the 1995-96 budget was set to be adopted. It was noted that the decision, based on referendum in each of the member municipalities, would rest on Klingbeil.

The Regional Board of Education passed its 1995-96 budget and put it on the ballot for the voters to decide.

On April 4, the budget was laid out as follows: general fund approved totaled more than \$27,801,000. That amount includes state and federal service funds totaling slightly more than \$252,000, and monies appropriated for the year summed up to \$27,653,013. The budget was waiting for specific approval through a vote on April 18.

On April 7, Fink released his report on the feasibility of deregionalization stating that reform is needed but that dissolving the district would not be in the best interests of the students. He reported that the creation of six new districts through 12 districts, each operating on one-half school year, would not be the most efficient necessary to offer varied and comprehensive programs. Additional financial considerations were noted.

The proposal did not fare as well as the elections. In 1995-96 budget was set to be adopted. It was noted that the decision, based on referendum in each of the member municipalities, would rest on Klingbeil.

On May 15, the Regional Board of Education agreed to put the deregionalization budget of \$256,000. It was noted that the budget must be agreed upon by all six member municipalities or the decision would fall on Education Commissioner Klingbeil.

Klingbeil was slated to receive the proposed district's budget and determine how much should be cut. Springfield, Kenilworth, Clark and Cranford agreed that \$350,000 should be removed, while Mountainside wanted to cut the budget by \$800,000 and Berkeley Heights wished it to stay as it was.

June
A motion to adopt a response to constituent towns' appeals to the state to examine the proposed dissolution of the regional district was shot down on May 23, cited as "unethical" by Board of Education President Joan Toth.

The New Jersey State Department of Education slashed the Regional High School budget by \$2.7 million, bringing the district's tax levy to the lowest in seven years. This was in response to the inability of the six member towns to agree on budget cuts in April.

In a letter to Commissioner Klingbeil, four members of the Board of Education complained that a document written by board attorney Lawrence Schwartz, that appeals to the state to examine the proposed dissolution of the district, "does not represent the views of a majority of our current board," which has eight members.

July
Mike Azzara, director of finance for the state Education Department, blamed the regional district's business office for the way it keeps its books, urging the district know of surplus it planned to use next year, but had not reported in its budget to the commissioner.

New Year's resolutions

The Township Committee will convene Monday, and while most Springfield residents begin putting their New Year's resolutions to the first test, the governing body will pass resolutions inherent in its reorganization process. Usually by the end of December, the Township Committee unofficially has selected its chairman — the mayor — for the coming year, but there seems to be a problem this time because the majority-holding Democrats can't agree on the most logical solution: choosing William Rucco as the next mayor of Springfield.

When the voters elected Rucco last month, they didn't just choose a Republican over a Democrat, they voted for a candidate who would bring 12 years of experience back to the Township Committee and would re-establish open, credible government. They rejected the existing absence of leadership.

Pained by the chastisement of electoral defeat, the Democrats discount last month's GOP victory by saying a 19-vote margin isn't significant. Because they unanimously say the new bipartisan governing body represents "all of the people," we'd like to remind them how those people include the nearly 1,800 voters who cast ballots for Rucco.

We remind them of how their party's candidates for Township Committee were the only Democrats to lose in Springfield. We want them to remember that Mayor Marcia Forman — the local Democratic Party's star player ending her six years of inactivity on the Township Committee — finished last among the four contestants.

Of the three Democrats, only Deputy Mayor Herb Slove has expressed interest in the mayoralty. Commissioner Roy Allan Hirschfeld has been pressed by fellow Democrats to join Committee member Greg Clarke in calling for bipartisanship, but he publicly hasn't committed his vote to anyone. With Slove and Clarke in one corner, and Rucco and Judith Blitzer in the other, Hirschfeld finds himself wielding a lot of influence and shouldering just as much responsibility regarding the selection of the next mayor.

We don't mean to put any additional pressure on Hirschfeld, but the credibility of Springfield's government, the financial health of the township and the morale of the municipal employees depend on him.

Let's keep smoking from killing our children

helps the tobacco industry keep its death grip on millions of Americans. All while the government spends countless dollars to discourage smoking.

Many times, I have stood on the floor of the Senate to talk about the destructive effect of tobacco use — how it causes problems such as heart disease, lung cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, low birth weight babies, and strokes. How every year a growing number of teen-agers start smoking, even though selling cigarettes to minors is illegal. And how tobacco is as addictive as cocaine and heroin. But many have turned a deaf ear to these facts.

This year, I introduced a bill that would raise the tax on cigarettes by \$1 per pack. This makes sense because tobacco taxes are compensation for a portion of the burden of health-care costs the government is forced to bear because of smoking. And smokers should assume some of these skyrocketing costs.

This tax would also be a first step in reducing the number of smokers in this country. Estimates show that a 10 percent increase in the price of cigarettes would cut smoking by 4 percent, and by an even greater degree among children.

I also have acted to eliminate the federal subsidy of tobacco advertising. This year, I introduced legislation — along with Senator Tom Harkin of Iowa — that will deny tobacco companies the ability to deduct their advertising and promotional expenses when calculating their taxes. By doing so, this legislation will save the costs of cigarettes relatively low by keeping tobacco taxes low and by offering tax breaks for tobacco product advertisements, the government

is not careful of how we set punishment. What is truly of great concern is that many of these young offenders are violent beyond understanding. Many will not be scared by guns, knives or razors. They don't seem to have the slightest compassion or feeling about what they do. Some are violent and aggressive, and some are violent and aggressive.

Somehow, along the line, our well-meaning attitude for Johnny to spare the rod and try to teach him right from wrong, was a Frankenstein monster in disguise. We were doing Johnny no favor when we tried to teach him to be a "kindly" attitude. Johnny didn't get it. All he knew was that kids who got into trouble were supposed to get a strict lecture by the judge and to go to prison on others. We didn't get it either.

But now, the New Jersey Legislature is busy creating a bunch of bills aimed at getting tough with juveniles who don't seem to learn.

Agreed that many adolescents come from broken homes, indifferent parents and family and friends who don't seem to care. Unfortunately, some of these kids who can be rehabilitated will be thrown into the same cauldron as the incorrigibles, unless

we're talking about the old adage of let the punishment fit the crime. First of all, newspapers should be permitted to print the names of anyone over 13 who commits a punishable crime; there should be no plea bargain; and no sentences of "house arrest" in a juvenile shelter. Judges should be able to sentence a youthful offender to a certain amount of jail time with the youth serving the full sentence. Those who commit violent crimes involving a weapon should not be given light sentences or no sentences. What really must be done is we must hit the bullet and realize that some of these kids no longer going to straighten themselves out and all the counseling, pleas and wrist-slapping is a waste of time. We've got to get the present juvenile justice system and start anew to protect the victims from the predators who prey on the elderly, the handicapped and the weak. It

is our responsibility in Congress to support efforts to stop smoking and to dedicate resources to preventing people from starting. It is not our duty to subsidize the seller or underwrite the smoker. For all the risks that smoking poses, the smoker and the tobacco company — not the government — should assume the costs of this deadly habit.

 families is their way of giving back some of what they themselves, gained from their experiences as survivors.
 "Patients and families respond to the sensitivity that staff members and volunteers bring to the hospice program, because it's sensitivity and understanding born of personal experience. It's what sets our people apart from other caregivers," said Peggy Colony, co-founder of the center.
 As they go about the process of getting on with their lives, coping with the daily responsibilities of family, home and job, some survivors express resentment at not being able to find time to grieve.
 Hospice caregivers recognize that every survivor's response to death is highly personal, and can manifest itself in many ways — feelings of sadness, anger, guilt — sometimes involving a loss of appetite. The center provides comprehensive support for families and friends to help them find the time to work through their grief, and, ultimately, to heal.
 Bereavement programs are open to all Union County residents, whether or not they have gone through the hospice program. The center offers a "Journey Through Grief" lecture and discussion series which addresses issues such as anger, guilt, survival and healing. "Grief-creators" groups offer support for the unique needs of widows, widowers, parents or children. Personal counseling also is available. Within the Rainbow Program, children ages 5-12 receive especially careful handling.
 Anyone who resides in Union County, who desires to remain at home for the duration of their illness,

 anyone other than their children that a sex offender has moved nearby. I want to know if neighbors in the "immediate" area are excluded, or do the people allowed to tell neighbors have to be notified by police?
 "It's difficult for me to be able to tell if children, who apparently can only be notified by their parents, will be subject to contempt of court. If they are, then this notification procedure is the most stupid thing I have ever heard of. If it doesn't include children, who will stop children from telling other children, or other parents or other adults about the sex offender's new address? Good luck to anyone who tries to stop kids from telling other kids. Let's hope they point out the right person and/or address where offenders have located.
 Now, with all of this in mind, what happens to someone who is considering moving into a home in which a sex offender already lives? Let's say these people either have children or are considering having them. Do they find out before moving in who their neighbor is, or do they find out after they've moved in, or do they find out when their child has been molested? Or wait. Maybe their "immediate" neighbor — not the sex offender, of course — can tell them once they have moved in. That is, if the neighbor has been told by police. If the buyer is never told, can he sue? Whom could he sue? The seller? The state? The county? Not the seller, I guess, because he was not allowed to tell.
 All of these new restrictions are ridiculous. Besides, I wonder if all of this is constitutional — not the law, but all of the restrictions.
 How, for example, can someone who is informed of a sex offender in their backyard be forced not to tell others? How can a court restrict them? They have taken no oath, nor have they agreed to abide by a vow of secrecy? The court apparently has taken a page from "Big Brother." In other words, everyone

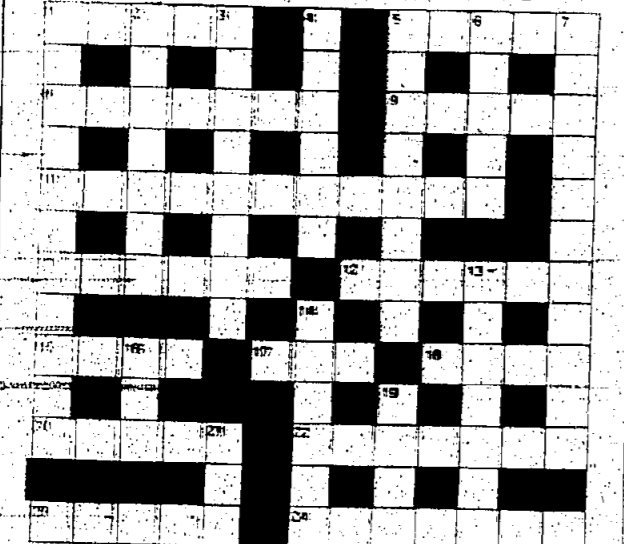

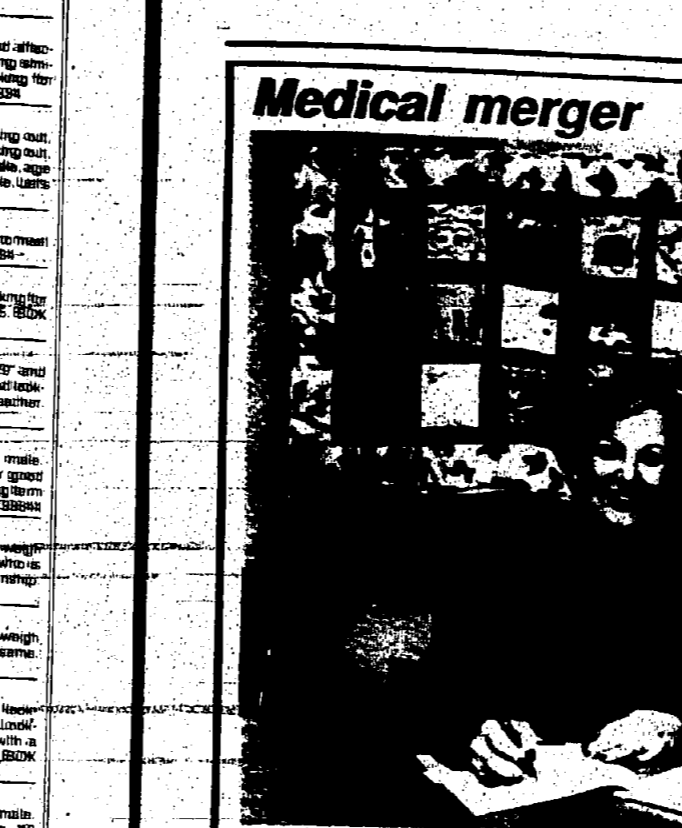

Health commissioner offers tips on winter health, safety

Winter weather has arrived, and state Health Commissioner Len Fishman urged New Yorkers to take precautions to avoid cold weather-related illness, injury and the risk of death. "Cold weather should not be underestimated as a public health threat," Fishman said. "The young and the elderly are especially at risk for suffering from hypothermia and other cold-related ailments. But winter weather can also lead to accidents, such as fires and poisonings related to improperly used space heaters, which burn people of all ages." People who use space heaters should be aware of their hazard and follow use. Livestock feed-burning space-heaters use oxygen and lead to the build-up of poisonous carbon monoxide gas, Fishman added. Because of this, users should keep doors open to the rest of the house and never use a space-heater overnight in the room where they are sleeping.

Influenza vaccinations urged

Flu is an illness caused by influenza viruses. It generally affects people of all ages. Usually, people with influenza have fever, chills, headache, cough, sore throat and loss of energy. Most people recover within a week. However, people with chronic health problems like diabetes, disease of the heart, lung, kidney, liver, or who have chronic illness or are taking medications which lower the body's resistance to infection. It is also high for older persons, particularly those about 65 years old or older.

Med center opens laser facility

The Food and Drug Administration recently approved the use of this laser for correction of low to moderate nearsightedness. Saint Barnabas has opened the Summit Excimer Laser for more than two years and recently had it modified for presbyopia or nearsightedness. The Excimer Laser is used to reshape the cornea, thus reducing dependence on glasses or contact lenses. The advantage of the laser is greater precision shaping the cornea compared to earlier refractive surgery procedures.

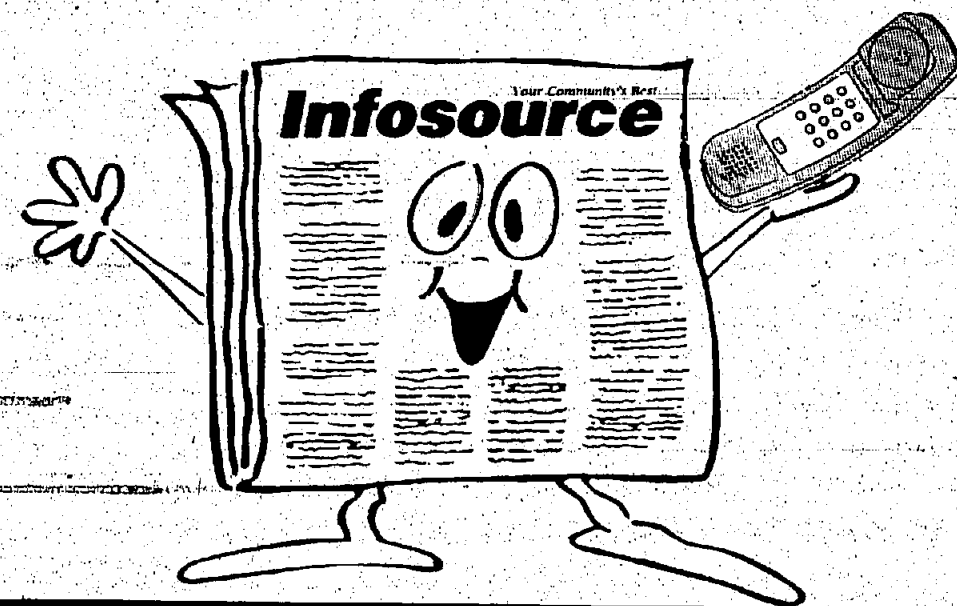

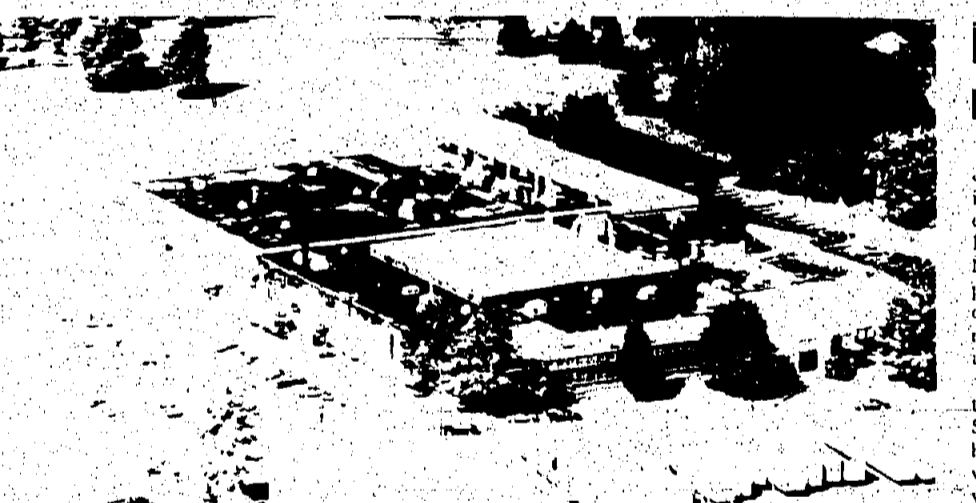
