## THIRD ELECTION DISTRICT CREATED

### Township Passes Ordinance to This Effect On First Reading Tuesday

An ordinance to form a third election district was passed on first reading at the meeting of the Township Committee Tuesday night. The new first district will comprise that area as follows: Beginning at the Rahway Valley railroad, thence southerly to the Rahway river, thence northerly to the boundary line of Union Township, along said boundary north to a point on the Millburn boundary where the projected line of the Presbyterian Cemetery is located; thence across the land in the rear of the cemetery to a point where Mountain avenue intersects Morris avenue to a point along Mountain avenue to the intersection of the Rahway Valley railroad and Mountain avenue.

The second district will be as follows: Beginning at Tooker avenue and Mountain avenue, westerly to Bryan avenue, to Shunpike road, to a point where the boundary line of Springfield intersects the boundary line of Summit, north to the boundary line of Millburn, and east to the point where the boundary line of Millburn intersects the projected line of the Presbyterian Cemetery, thence across the land in the rear of the cemetery to a point where Mountain avenue intersects Morris avenue, to a point along Mountain avenue where Tooker avenue intersects Mountain avenue.

The third district will be as follows: Beginning at Tooker avenue and Mountain avenue, westerly to Bryan avenue, to Shunpike road, to a point where the boundary line of Springfield intersects the boundary line of Summit, south to a point where the boundary line of Springfield intersects the Mountfainside boundary, thence east to the boundary lines of Westfield, Cranford, Keatliff, Union, along the Rahway Valley railroad to Mountain avenue, thence north one block to the intersection of Tooker avenue and Mountain avenue.

The ordinance will come up for second reading and final passage February 26. Each of the new districts will contain about 1,000 registered voters.

## TAX BUDGET PASSED ON FINAL READING

The budget of the Township of Springfield for the year 1930, totaling \$91,400, of which \$65,900 is to be raised by taxation, was passed on second reading at a meeting of the Township Committee held Tuesday night.

Township Committee Fred A. Brown acted as chairman in the absence of Chairman Gabriel Larson.

## Who's Who In Springfield



**CHARLES H. RUBY**  
Fire Commissioner and Candidate for Re-election Tomorrow; former Township Committeeman and Mayor. A Resident of Springfield for Twenty-eight Years.

Charles H. Ruby, fire commissioner, who is running for re-election tomorrow, has resided in Springfield for twenty-eight years, and has held many public offices in Springfield, such as former Township Committeeman and Mayor, a former member of the Board of Education, besides being active in fire company duties. Mr. Ruby was born in Jersey City in 1872, and lived many years in Fawcett, prior to coming to Springfield. He is a charter member of the Fire Company, and also an exempt fireman. He was also fire chief, and acted in that capacity when the Flemer barns burned down more than a decade ago. He is now second assistant fire chief. The chief at present is George W. Sisco, and the first assistant is Charles Pinkava.

Mr. Ruby served as a member of the Board of Education for two terms, and as a Township Committeeman three terms, for nine years. He was Mayor when the present Municipal Building was built in 1919.

The Fire Commissioner has served since 1924 and is unopposed for re-election with T. C. Davidson, Jr., who was elected a member of the Board of Education last Tuesday. He assisted in the purchasing of the two new fire trucks.

Mr. Ruby is married and resides at 99 Mountain avenue. He has four children—Edward Ruby, Mrs. E. Carleton Morrison, Jessie, and Charles, Jr. He is a member of the First Presbyterian Church.

## IRVINGTONIAN FINED AS DRUNKEN DRIVER

Charged with operating an automobile on Seven Bridge Road while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, Paul Kuscher, twenty-one years old, of 309 Twenty-first street, Irvington, was found guilty by Recorder Everett T. Spinning in police court Monday night, and was fined \$200 and costs of \$114, and had his driver's license revoked for two years.

Kuscher was arrested by Patrolman Wilbur C. Selander, January 28 at 2 o'clock in the morning, after having collided with the policemen's automobile. He was declared unfit to drive a car by Dr. Henry P. Dengler.

Kuscher pleaded not guilty to the charge. His attorney, Judge Standard of Irvington, magistrate in that town, argued that Kuscher had not been asleep for eighteen hours prior to his arrest, and that he could not be in the best physical condition. However, Judge Spinning thought otherwise. Dr. Dengler testified as to the condition of the defendant the night of his arrest.

### DEMOCRATIC CLUB ORGANIZED HERE

#### David Jeakens Elected Head of New Political Group

Springfield Democrats are planning to have a strong organization for the coming township election. They have launched the Springfield Democratic Club, which will meet weekly and propose to elect a Democratic slate for the coming election. The club is planning to appoint a candidate for that position.

The first meeting of the club was held several weeks ago, and the second meeting was held last Thursday night in the Lyons-Courley Company office, in Morris avenue. Attempts will be made to obtain the enrollment of every Department in the township, as well as those who will affiliate with the party for the fall election of a Congressman and United States Senator.

In the township election, the club will devote its attention to putting a Democratic Township Committeeman in office as well as a freeholder. They believe that with a large body of men, an excellent chance arises of having both positions in the hands of Democrats.

David S. Jeakens, former township committeeman for many years, and former chairman of that body, was elected president of the new club. Edward J. Gmitz is the secretary, and Vincent Shea is the treasurer. John Guth and George B. Gaskill form the committee on enrollment.

The club met last night in the Lyons office.

### COLONIAL TERRACE ASSESSMENTS O. K'd.

The report of the assessment commission on improvements made on Colonial terrace was approved at a hearing held before the Township Committee Tuesday night. Three property owners appeared to object that the rate was too high.

The total amount for the assessments will be \$2,077, or an average of \$155 per foot for one side of the street. While the complainants objected that the amount of work done on their street did not justify such a high rate, the committee told them that with the additional work done besides that planned originally, the rate was just and fair. Chairman Gabriel Larson was absent, and Committee man Fred A. Brown acted as director.

### 7 DON'T WANT SCHOOL CONNECTED TO SEWERS

T. C. Davidson, Jr., Walter White and George Arnold Wright, were elected to the Board of Education for three years, and August H. Schmidt was elected for one year at the annual school election held Tuesday night in the James Caldwell School. Frederick O. Freyer, running for a full term, was defeated.

White, who was re-elected, was the high man with 120 votes. Davidson, the new member, was elected with 114 votes, and Wright, re-elected, his next with 108 votes. Schmidt, running unopposed, polled 418 votes, two less than the high man. White, French received 53 votes.

The school budget was passed with the vote for, mutual training getting the largest vote against it that any of the items had, there being 92 votes for the manual training item of \$1,900, and 13 against.

Mr. White has been a member of the board for three years, and a resident of Springfield eleven years. He is a teacher in the South Side High School in Newark, and principal of the South Side Evening High School.

Mr. Davidson is a member of the fire commission for six years, and is also a candidate at the fire election to be held tomorrow. He has resided in Springfield ten years. He is a member of the Volunteer Fire Company for eight years and is a member of the Exempt Firemen's Association. He is also a director in the Battle Hill Building and Loan Association. He is taking the position on the board left vacant by the resignation of the president, William N. Heard, who finds that his business affiliations force him to retire. Mr. Heard has been a member of the board for six years, and vice-president for four years, prior to the death of the late Lewis L. Smith, and he was elected last December to take Mr. Smith's place as president. Alvin H. Boss was selected to the position of vice-president.

August H. Schmidt, who has just returned from a tour of duty in the army, will be a member for one year. He has resided in Springfield for six years. He is a former president of the Parent-Teacher Association.

The next meeting of the Board of Education will be held Tuesday evening in the James Caldwell School.

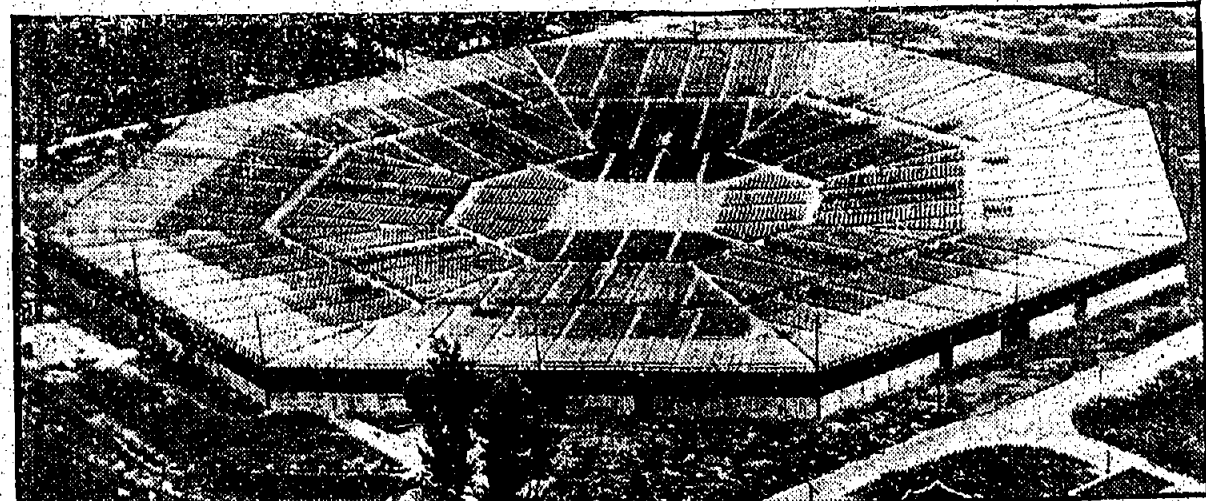
## Blast Sinks Liner

## Doris Lawson Shows How

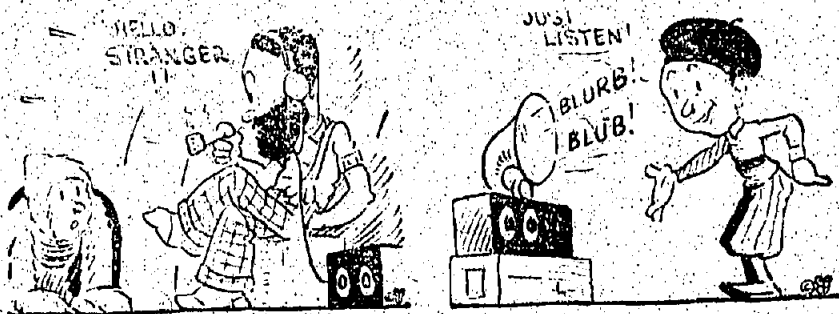


THREE TERRIFIC EXPLOSIONS, followed by a rush of flames, wrecked and sank the North German Lloyd liner Muenchen two hours after she had docked at her American port. The Muenchen, a cabin ship of 14,559 tons, carried 100 crew and 200 passengers. As far as it is known two men, passengers were killed and three of the crew are missing, but the list is not complete yet. The passengers' luggage was being checked out when the first blast occurred, which originated from the fire in the cargo of potash, lye and nitrates, which were stored in the hold. Several of the firemen who answered the summons were severely injured in the succession of blasts which sank the liner.
