

## County Officials Toward Better Draining Plan

Protest against flood conditions in the vicinity of the East Branch of the Rahway River was voiced by about thirty-five residents of Washington, Angell, Battle Hill, Marion and South Maple avenues, and Riverside drive before the Township Committee Monday night. Heavy rains last week resulted in an overflow of the river which prevented residents in some cases from leaving their homes for several days.

In instances, firemen were called to carry children over several feet of water to enable them to attend school. In other cases, unsanitary cases were caused by backing up of the sewage system. Several residents declared there was considerable water in their cellars at that time, a week after the heavy rain storm.

Mrs. Elwood Carmichael of Battle Hill avenue spoke for the group and asked relief. John J. Mohr, a resident of the street, suggested unemployed recipients of local relief work, clean out the bed of the river and clean the debris along the sides. Others in the delegation also spoke.

Property along the Rahway River i owned by the Union County Park Commission, it was declared at the meeting. The matter was referred to the local sewer committee. The clerk and Arthur H. Lennox, township engineer, were authorized to confer with the Board of Freeholders to discuss proper drainage measures. A joint meeting of the county board and local lowniathers will be arranged.

The condition in this section has been discussed for a number of years but no definite action taken. Although heavy spring rains cause similar disturbances yearly, the latest rain was the most serious of flood conditions in several years.

Committeeman Alfred G. He said he was satisfied the appointive powers as provided by the statutes approved the original plan of the ordinance by having the chairman appoint planning board members. Second reading was delayed since the wording of the ordinance had been changed to included "Chairman of the Township Committee" where it had formerly mentioned "Mayor."

Charles W. Weeks, township counsel, declared the "Mayor" wording was a typographical error on the part of his office in preparing the ordinance since the text was taken from statutes on the subject where "Mayor" was used,

The clerk was ordered to prepare a list of delinquent gasoline station owners who have neglected to pay pump fees. Police will investigate these cases.

Request for a perinit to erect a gasoline station at Mountain and Tooker avenues was received from Stickel & Stahl, located at the corner now. ## Rigby For Under-Sheriff

from the East Branch of the Rahway River are not new. About two years ago, if memory serves, home owners in the vicinity of the stream were similarly afflicted, and the problem of enlarging this tributary of the Rahway River, which now is forced to carry the great volume of water discharged into it from stormsewers in several neighboring communities, was brought to the attention of the Union County Board of Freeholders by the suffering householders. It would seem that this is the logical time to make such alterations in the channel of the stream, whether widening, deepening or straightening, as will permit the unhampered flow of water in times of continued and heavy rains. Work of some kind must be provided for those receiving relief, and probably there is no condition with greater potential menaci than the possibility of serious flood in the area along the stream bordering our town. The situation is a detriment not only to those who have already built homes, but to the owners of unimproved land in the vicinity. Three official bodies, the Board of Freeholders, the Union County Park Commission and the Union County Mosquito Commission, should be asked to unite their efforts in a solution of the problem: Continued and persistent attention on the part of the group of property owners affected in keeping the matter before these three boards cannot fail of bringing about remedial action. There can be no doubtt






