

Irvington Center to Springfield Center-The Somerset company sought to impose a-fare of 10 cents from Newark to Irvington center and 15 cents from Newark to Seven Bridges road, on the Newark-Westfield-Somerville route. The schedules wereopposed by the Lincoln, Browell and Ellmas bus companies, Irvington, and independent operators on the Springfield avenue route between Newark and Irvington.

The board expressed the opinion that the service on these two lines was established primarily to carry long distance riders and that the evidence did not indicate any necessity to revise the fare-rates as proposed.


