



The markets were nearly glutted-in the first days of operation of the program under which the government is buying plgs and sows, soon to farrow, at premium prices. Secretary Wallace certainly lemonstrated that he is the nation's champion hog caller, especially, when the inducement was each do hand.

As soon as the Department of Agriculture decided that a reduction in the potential marketing of hogs during the coming year was advisable and made known that the government would buy plgs weighing between 25 and 100 pounds and sows, soon to far row, there was a rush for market. Despite the fact that the government is prepared to buy 4,000,000 plgs and 1,000,000 sows, at the premium prices. approximately 30,000-pigs and 1,000

sows reached the main markets on the first day. Mr. Wallace watched the pigs go to market for a few_days more,



-Under the allotment plan, the machinery of which is now, completed, the government will pay the farmer 28 cents per bushel on 54 per cent of his crop. or that portion destined for consumption in this country. In return the farmer must agree to cut his 1934

Some \$120,000,000-In-compensating-payments is expected to be paid this year, if all wheat farmers sign government con--tracts-promising to reduce their next year's planting by the stipulated amount. Among other steps by the Vienna government is the decreeing of a new short-term enlistment force in which from 16,000 to 20,000 men will be trained annually and a second army
