Until recently no highway worthy o the name ventured closer than 200 miles to the site, but in recent months the state of Texas has built a road study. to the base of Mount Locke. Now engineers are mapping out a winding road to make the last 700 feet ascent to the peak.

Ten Buildings Planned. Some ten buildings will be erected nton Mount Locke to house telescopes and instruments\_and\_to\_serve as dormitories for scientists and their fam illes. In all, ten scientists will be sta-


