Committee Wipes Out **Old Taxes**

'32 to '34 Personal Tax Held Uncollectible By Townfathers

The Township Committee Wednesday night authorized cancellation of \$1,776. in personal taxes held uncollectible because of deaths, unknown residence of debtors and others who moved out of town, before enactment of an ordinance requiring movers to secure permits from the local tax office that such charges have been paid.

The list included items from 1932 to 1936, inclusive. Collector Charles H. Huff indicated that since the new, moving ordinance had gone into effect, over \$1,000 has been received, which ordinarily would not have been collected.

Sewer Charges Fixed

Mayor Wilbur M. Selander, local representative to the Rahway Valley Joint Sewer Meeting, notified members that Springfield's share of maintenance during 1940 has been set at 10.88 per cent, based on the flow of sewage this year. The total budget of the Joint Meeting next year will be \$45,000, unchanged over present figures.

At a recent meeting in Woodpridge, the Joint Meeting adopted a esolution apportioning maintenance charges against member municipalbuildings and Spring Brook tree, will ities for next year, based upon this year's figures and for future years, on those of the previous years. Such a measure is expected to enable the towns to have definite costs for budget making at the end of any given year, rather than work on an estimate which may show a difference, with ensuing transfer dif-

ficulties, at the end of the period. Reports were received from two assessment commissions on five idewalk and curb and gutter-projects, hearings on which were held ast-Thursday. The committee fixed January 10 as a hearing for con-

firmation of the reports. The board agreed to pay 2 per fight, along with other municipalities headed by Mayor DeWitt Barow of Plainfield, to re-establish method on distribution of franchise and gross receipts taxes to munic ipalities. an be repaired by new legislation: The committee, Barlow added, yould work toward enactment of egislation which would continue the ipportionment of tax franchise as made in 1938. Springfield previously subscribed 3 per cent as its share

of operation cost. By the upset of the higher courts Springfield stands to lose on both gross—receipts and franchise tax, which loss will adversely affect the 1940 municipal budget, In 1938, the township collected \$6,958 in franchise tax as compared to \$4,672 in the previous year, 1937, under the old' plan of apportioning on valuations of local ratables. In gross receipts tax in 1938, Springfield was given \$3,068 as compared to \$2,154 in the

previous year.

Greenhouse **Proposed At High School**

Regional Board Considers Plan for Addition to Farming Course

With the entire enrollment of the new horticultural class at Regional High School, virtually assured of jobs upon graduation, the Regional Board of Education is looking toward increasing facilities of the

course. Pointing out there is a definite demand for farm, nursery and greenhouse workers with practical training, James Duguid, chairman.of the board's building committee submitted tentative plans Wednesday night for a combination greenhouse, classroom and workshop structure that would provide facilities for practical experience of those taking the special course,

Duguid reported that in connection with study of tentative plansfor the greenhouse building the committee considered the employment question, and is convinced pupils will have little or no difficulty securing positions upon completion of the horiculture and floriculture studies.

The structure recommended by the building committee would be 36x125 feet. Approximately 50x36 feet would be devoted to the greenhouse, and the rest would contain a workshop, classroom, preparation room for plants and nursery stock, lockers and showers. It was estimated the building could be erected for approximately \$10,000 and equipped for \$2,500. The state, it is believed, would bear half the cost for equipment and supplies.

Board members agreed facilities for practical training would enhance the value of the new course. but at the suggestion of President Mulholland it was decided to refer the proposal to the finance_committee for a study as to possible means of financing.

Name Depositories

To safeguard its funds, which are current bills are paid, the board named six more bank depositories making twelve in all. The president. custodian and district clerk were authorized to deposit approximately \$5.000 in each twelve banks, to procure guaranteed deposits, and thereby obviate the possibility of bank

loss. The National State Bank of Elizabeth, Plainfield Trust Company, Union Center National Bank, Mic City Trust Company of Plainfield, Roselle National Bank and Roselle Park Trust Company were added to the list of depositories.

Supervising Principal Warren W. Halsey reported that, of 175 graduates from the school this year, 22 per cent, or thirty-nine, are attending school: 54 per cent, or ninetyfive are working and 23 per cent or forty, are memployed. He said with business conditions improving others had doubtless been employed since the statistics were gathered a month ago. He reported the graduates engaged as follows:

Attending colleges of art, seven State Teachers' College, five; nursing school, two; prep school, one; private business schools, eleven; post raduates at the local school, five; attending other schools, eight; in office jobs, twenty-two: store posts. twenty-nine: trades and industry. twenty-three: farming, seven; miscellaneous occupations. Jourteen; and unemployed, forty-one.

The principal reported anticipated enrolment in September, 1940, of 278 freshmen, 248 sophomores, 239 juniors and 227 seniors, making a total of 992.

The meeting was adjourned to anuary 8, at which time budgetary equirements for the coming year will be studied.



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
