## Committee Wipes Out Old Taxes

### '32 to '34 Personal Tax Held Uncollectible By Townfathers

The Township Committee Wednesday night authorized cancellation of \$1,776 in personal taxes held uncollectible because of deaths, unknown residence of debtors and others who moved out of town, before enactment of an ordinance requiring movers to secure permits from the local tax office that such charges have been paid.

The list included items from 1932 to 1936, inclusive. Collector Charles H. Huff indicated that since the new moving ordinance had gone into effect, over \$1,000 has been received, which ordinarily would not have been collected.

**Sewer Charges Fixed**  
Mayor William M. Selander, local representative to the Railway Valley Joint Sewer Meeting, notified members that Springfield's share of maintenance during 1940 has been set at 10.86 per cent, based on the flow of sewage this year. The total budget of the Joint Meeting next year will be \$45,000, unchanged over present figures.

At a recent meeting in Woodbridge, the Joint Meeting adopted a resolution apportioning maintenance charges against member municipalities for next year, based upon this year's figures and for future years, on those of the previous years. Such a measure is expected to enable the towns to have definite costs for given years, rather than work on an estimate which may show a difference, with ensuing transfer difficulties, at the end of the period.

Reports were received from two assessment commissions on five sidewalk and curb and gutter projects, hearings on which were held last Thursday. The committee fixed January 10 as a hearing for confirmation of the reports.

The board agreed to pay 2 per cent assessment, as its share of a fight, along with other municipalities headed by Mayor DeWitt Barlow of Plainfield, to re-establish a method on distribution of franchise and gross receipts taxes to municipalities.

The Court of Errors and Appeals, recently upset a method used by State Commissioner J. Thayer Martin. In a letter to the committee, Barlow stated that his committee feels that features in the present State Act, found defective, can be repaired by new legislation. The committee, Barlow added, would work toward enactment of legislation which would continue the apportionment of tax franchise as made in 1938. Springfield previously subscribed 3 per cent as its share of operation cost.

**By the upset of the higher court**  
Springfield stands to lose on both gross receipts and franchise tax, which loss will adversely affect the 1940 municipal budget. In 1938, the township collected \$6,058 in franchise tax as compared to \$4,672 in the previous year, 1937, under the old plan of apportioning on valuations of local rates. In gross receipts tax in 1938, Springfield was given \$3,068 as compared to \$2,154 in the previous year.

**HEAD FUND DRIVES**  
Postmaster Otto F. Heinz has been named local chairman of the 1940 "March of Dimes" campaign in Springfield to raise funds for infantile paralysis control, held in conjunction with a celebration, in honor of President Roosevelt's birthday in January. Postmaster John H. Traynor of Westfield is directing details in that city and also Mountaintide.

**ATTENDED SCHOOL DANCE**  
The Misses Evelyn Snybell, Edythe B. Mellor, Kathryn Richardson and Frances Coeyman, all of town, attended a Christmas luncheon and party Tuesday at the Hotel Suburban, East Orange, given by the Berkeley Secretarial School of that city. Guests included 25 crippled children from the Hospital and Home for Crippled Children of Newark. Gifts were presented to the children, and entertainment consisted of acts by a mandolin and ventriloquist, and selections by the Trio Musetto of the Orange.

## Greenhouse Proposed At High School

### Regional Board Considers Plan for Addition to Farming Course

With the entire enrollment of the new horticultural class at Regional High School, virtually assured of jobs upon graduation, the Regional Board of Education is looking toward increasing facilities of the course. Pointing out there is a definite demand for farm, nursery and greenhouse workers with practical training, James Duguid, chairman of the board's building committee submitted tentative plans Wednesday night for a combination greenhouse, classroom and workshop structure that would provide facilities for practical experience of those taking the special course.

Duguid reported that in connection with study of tentative plans for the greenhouse building the committee considered the employment question, and is convinced pupils will have little or no difficulty securing positions upon completion of the horticulture and floriculture studies.

The structure recommended by the building committee would be 38x125 feet. Approximately 50x38 feet would be devoted to the greenhouse, and the rest would contain a workshop, classroom, preparation room for plants and nursery stock, lockers and showers. It was estimated the building could be erected for approximately \$10,000 and equipped for \$2,500. The state, it is believed, would bear half the cost for equipment and supplies. Board members agreed facilities for practical training would enhance the value of the new course, but at the suggestion of President Mulholland it was decided to refer the proposal to the finance committee for a study as to possible means of financing.

### Name Depositories

To safeguard \$46,446 funds, which are expected to total about \$70,000 when current bills are paid, the board named six more bank depositories, making twelve in all. The president, custodian and district clerk were authorized to deposit approximately \$5,000 in each two banks, to procure guaranteed deposits, and thereby obviate the possibility of bank loss. The National State Bank of Elizabeth, Plainfield Trust Company, Union Center National Bank, Mid City Trust Company of Plainfield, Roselle National Bank and Roselle Park Trust Company were added to the list of depositories.

The children were transported from the local Town Hall in a bus, provided through the courtesy of Somerset Bus Co.

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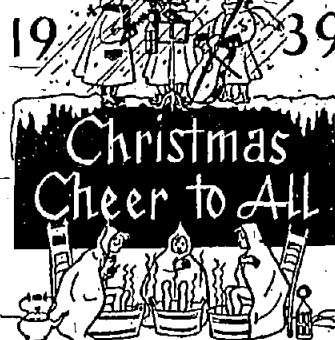

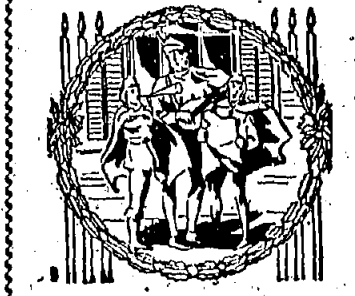

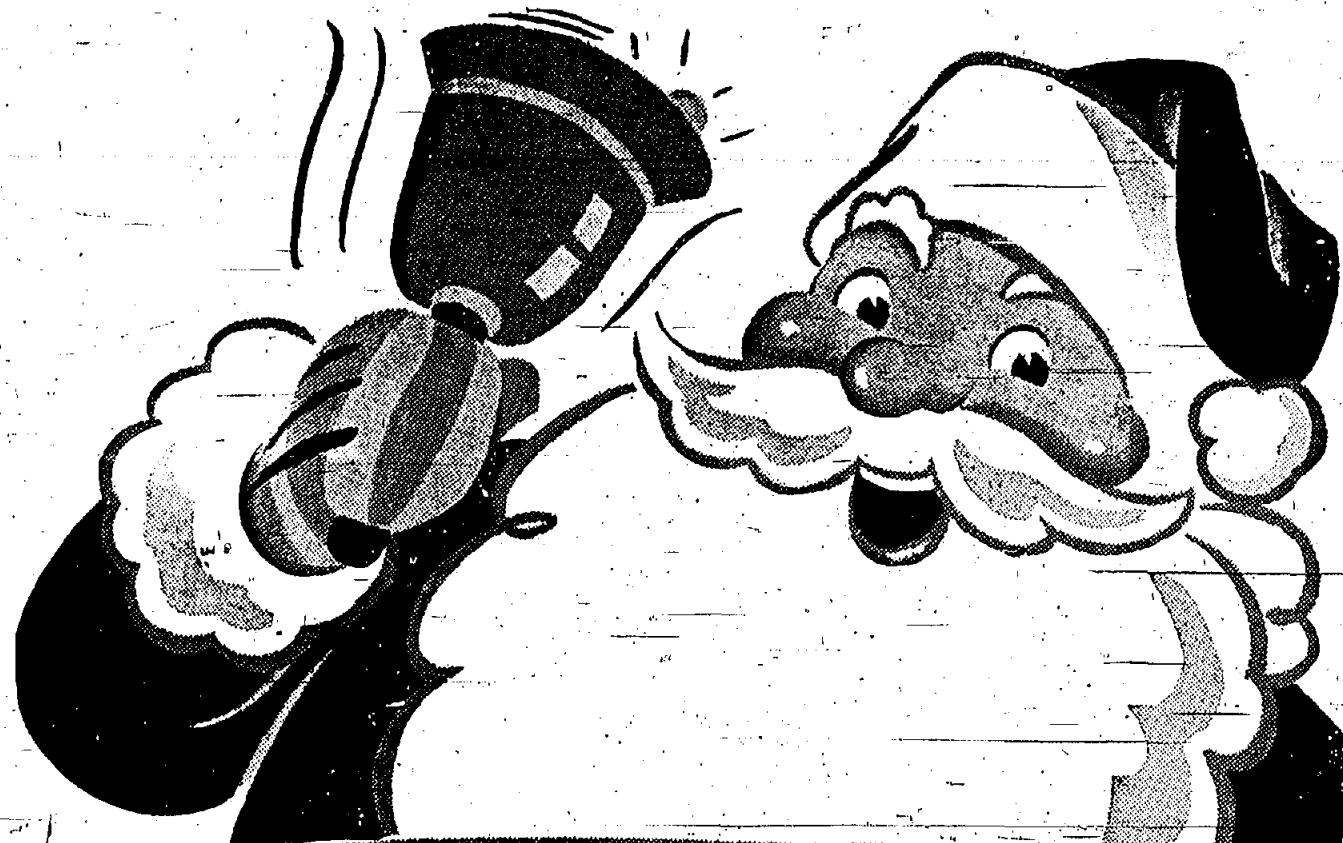
