For the first time since the tragic days of the World War the American people are being asked to contribute to a Red Cross war relief fund.

As one of the few remaining nations enjoying peace and security in a world of chaos, the United States is in a position to extend a strong hand of sympathy.

Fortunately, mercy is of a flexible nature. Unlike other forms of human expression it can be translated into effective action by dollars and cents.

The American Red Cross is the logical channel through which the people of this country should express their deep concern for the plight of women, children and aged in Europe's war zones.

With the invasion of new countries, overwhelming needs are being reported daily. They are manifold reasons why a general appeal must be made to the nation.

VOTING IN THE PRIMARIES

Next Tuesday is Primary Day, when scores, perhaps hundreds of Springfield's registered voters will stay away from the polls in droves just to show what they think of the American system of suffrage...

Many people take the view that the Primary Election is not important, but our own view is just the reverse. The Primary is the time for selecting the men to represent the party in the fall, and from those chosen in the Primary the men will be selected to fill public office.

The Republicans have four candidates for delegates to the national convention pledged to Thomas E. Dewey and two running unpledged. Candidates for the Democratic delegates, while all pledged to President Roosevelt, are split, there being twelve candidates for eight positions.

There's certainly enough excitement in all this to warrant everyone's going to the polls to support whom ever he feels to be the best candidate. But, excitement or no excitement, exercise of the privilege of suffrage on all occasions is one of the best ways of making democracy more effective.

McLean Opposes New Pension Grab

Congressman Donald H. McLean, of Hillside, has announced his opposition to the widows' and orphans' bill, H. R. 9000, which would create an entirely new class of war pensioners not connected in any way with disability from the World War.

He said he is opposed to the bill in principle and indicated President Roosevelt probably would veto it anyway if passed by both houses. He declared the Social Security program seeks to cover the ground the bill attempts to add.

McLean said veterans now suffering, or dependents of those who have died from disability, due to war service, always should receive generous treatment. H. R. 9000, however, according to McLean, would "in effect grant pensions to the mother, father, widow and children of men who incurred no disability in the service. The only qualification for receiving a pension would be the soldier served 90 days and that the widow married him before July 3, 1921, unless a child was born of the marriage, in which case the effective date would be May 13, 1939. Benefits would extend to all children now living or hereafter born of the marriage.

"The pension system must be protected against inequalities and unwarranted expenditures. This legislation would weaken it. It would make it necessary to grant increases of existing pensions and add new groups to the pension rolls."

Among the books purchased recently for the library is one written by Zane Grey, TALES OF FRESH WATER FISHING. Zane Grey was not only one of the most successful of American novelists, but a famous fisherman. These stirring fishing adventures are told by him from his own experience. He takes the reader on his trips through the inland waters from Pennsylvania to Oregon and from the Delaware to the Rogue River. There are nearly one hundred illustrations—many full page photographs taken by the author, himself, which add to the interest and beauty of this unusual book.

ONE PAIR OF HANDS by Monica Dickens, the great granddaughter of Charles Dickens, describes her experiences as cook, house maid and laundress for cranks, artists, newlyweds and spinsters. No comic situation escaped her notice and the result is a book crowded with characterizations from employers to the nerdist vacuum cleaner salesman.

THIS LAND IS OURS by Louis Zara is a story covering the eighty years from 1775 to 1855, and describing the march across the Appalachians, the struggle to oust the Indian tribes from the Ohio country and the winning of the old North West. It's a novel for all those Americans who believe passionately that "This Land Is Ours."

New Children's Books are: AMERICAN FOLK AND FAIRY TALES selected by Rachel Field and illustrated by Margaret Freeman. This is the first collection that has been made of the folk tales of our own country. It contains a number of the best Indian folk stories and legends, the best of the Negro animal stories and a group of colonial legends like that of "Rip Van Winkle" and "The Great Stone Face." The stories were selected because they were good reading from the child's point of view.

WAGON TRAINS WEST by Rhoda Nelson. Nicky and her grandfather traveled with one of the covered wagon trains going to Oregon. They rode on horseback for Grandpop had no money to pay their way. They had adventures galore—some pleasant and some quite frightening.
