--Propaganda Diagnosis--

(Editor's note: "Propaganda Diagnosis" will appear in the SUN from time to time and is devoted to a study of the functions of propaganda and how to "detect" it. Comments and questions from readers are welcomed.) The following contains excerpts of a communique from Reichsfuehrer Hitler's headquarters issued Saturday: "German troops with brave cooperation by Hungarian units scored a big success in the Ukraine. . . . 'Big success' can mean anything. The two words give the reader the impression that a victory was scored. That is exactly what the Germans want. Most people will assume that this reported battle was a victory even though it might have been only an advancement of German troops. In the battle of Uman, the communique tells in precise figures how many guns, tanks, etc. were taken. Another sentence reads: 'The enemy's bloody losses exceed 200,000.' 'Bloody losses' is meant those killed and wounded. But the Germans hope that the reader takes that figure as those who were killed. With 200,000—killed, perhaps, there were three to four times that number wounded, therefore, making the Russian losses very high. . . . German troops after days of fighting in an impassable forest and swamp region took the important railway junction of Korosten." The word "impassable" means that no one can stop the Nazis. All obstacles can be overcome by the German Army. It's an excellent word to throw fear into neutrals. In announcing German air activities over England, a part of the report read: "Bomb hits were scored between parked planes and hangars." The reader is supposed to take for granted that the bombs destroyed "parked planes and hangars." However, the report doesn't say that. The words were conveniently placed together so as to make them appear that if a bomb fell near planes and hangars, both were damaged, anyway, at least, one. All warring nations write communiques with double meanings. Words with triple meanings are even funnier to read. Communiques are reports to the public. They are made to please the public because when the forces encounter a reversal, the blow will be considerably softened by padded communiques.

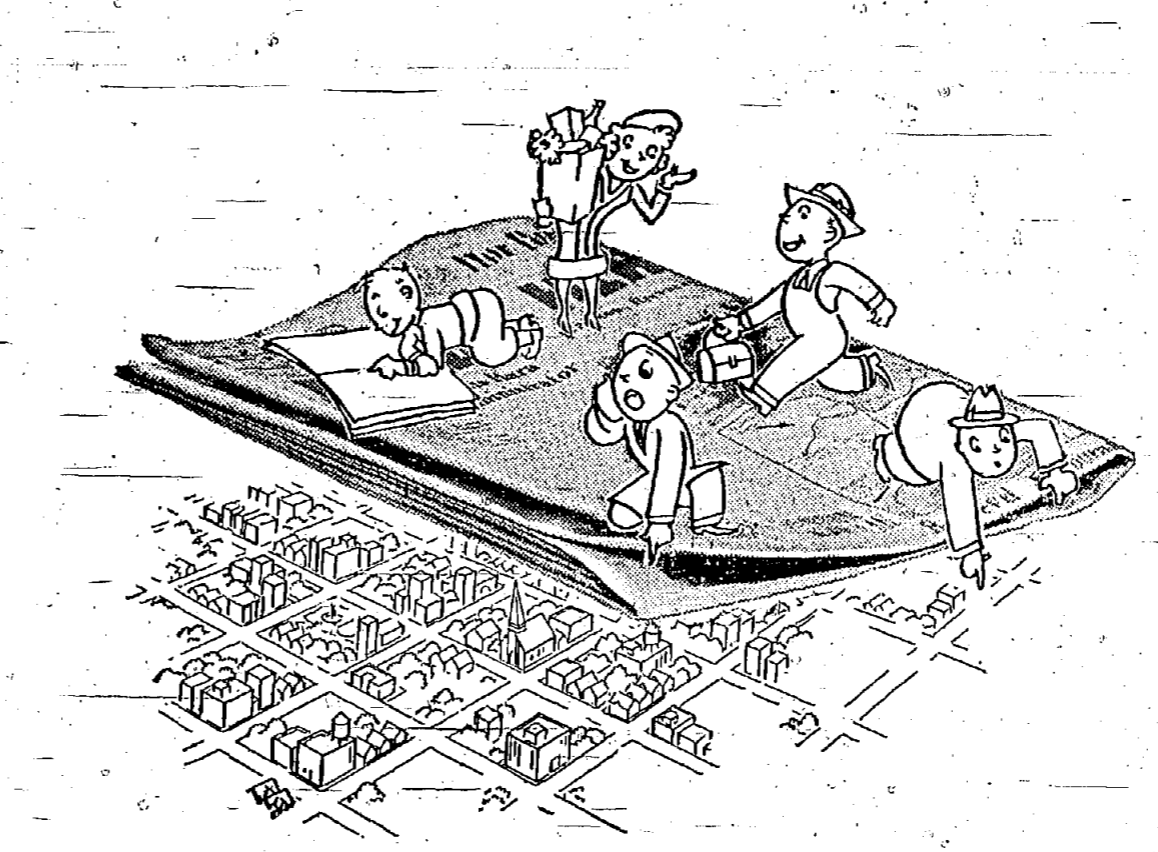
