Population, 1912, 5,000; assessed valuation—1912, \$5,224,200; tax rate—
1941, \$1.07 (including school, \$1.02); state and county, \$1.02.
Springfield was settled in the early 1700's. Its township form of govern-
ment was established in 1791, and was incorporated in 1857.
Springfield is essentially a community of industry with its primary occupa-
tion being the production of machinery and electrical apparatus. It is
located on the New York City and Newark, Elizabeth, Summit and Plainfield
Railway Valley Railroad, with a branch station in the township.
It is also served by the New York, Jersey and Delaware Bay Railroad, with
a station in the township. The township is 30 miles from New York City,
10 miles from Newark, 10 miles from Elizabeth, 10 miles from Summit,
and 10 miles from Plainfield.

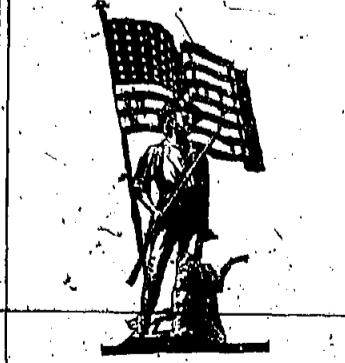

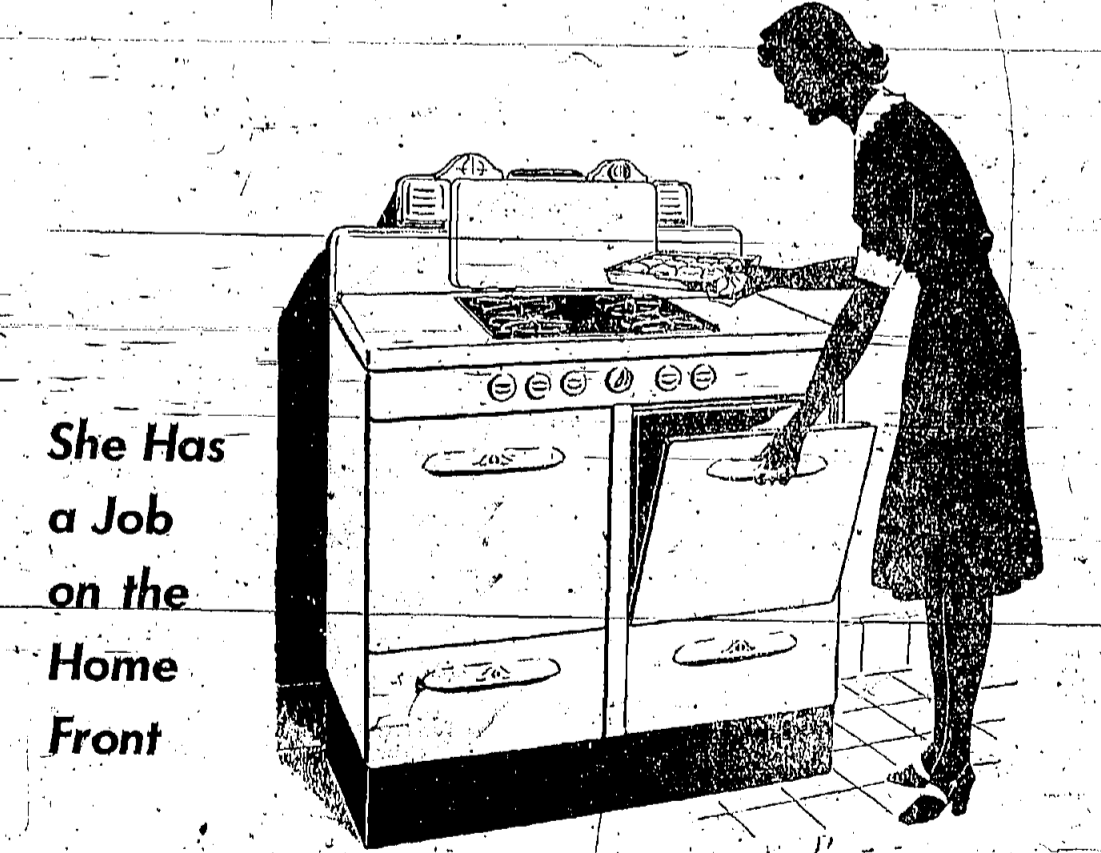

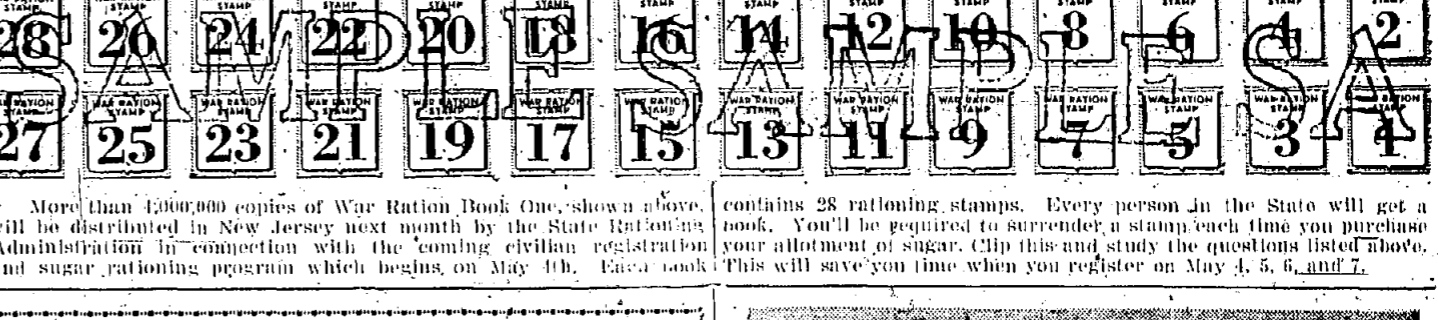
