Pattern Unchanged Over Taylor Park's Flood Gate Problem

Flood history repeated itself this week in Springfield following closely the pattern of the famous July 23, 1938 storm when what was termed then as the worst rainstorm in 20 years caused two broken dams resulting in severe damage to local homes. Sunday's storm brought repercussions at the Township Committee meeting Wednesday night when residents of Marlon avenue complained. "We've got homes there and we don't want to see them float away."

Just as the Governing Body thought this week so did the officials act upon the night of July 27, 1938 when they wrote to Millburn Township to "either open your dams earlier during heavy rainfall or keep them closed entirely."

Mayor Selandor said, "If Millburn wants to make a joke they should keep the gates closed instead of dumping water on us when it gets full."

As the board pondered on a motion to write Millburn, Council Charles W. Weeks recommended that more could be gained through a conference instead of writing letters and a conference will be held in the near future, at a date to be announced.

Flow 6 inches less. The Fire Department was called to many many cellars in the Highway River branch area and in the vicinity of the Town Hall where the municipal plaza was one large lake, the American Legion building suffered damage in its cellar.

Under Chairman Brown's leadership Sunday morning in the vicinity of the Highway River sub-factory until the Millburn gates were opened. 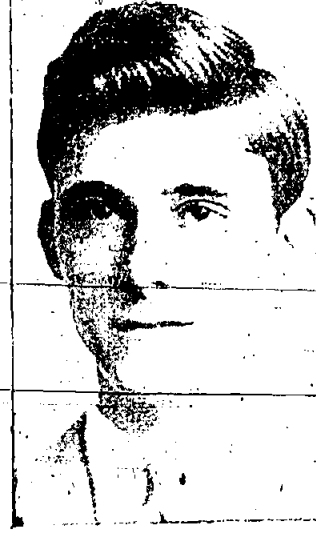

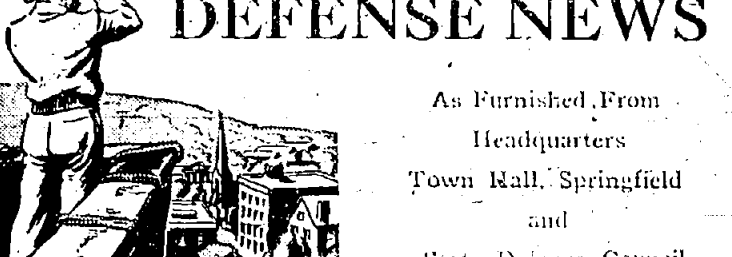
