A WEEK OF THE WAR

A summary of information on the important developments of the week made available by official sources through the Defense Advisory Committee of the National Editorial Association.

War Production Chairman Nelson announced the War Production Board is re-evaluating every project in the war program to secure the "maximum impact on the enemy now." Combat planes, particularly bombers, are at the top of this new list, Mr. Nelson said.

Chairman Nelson reported the U. S. is now producing munitions three and a half times the rate in November 1941, the month before Pearl Harbor. July production, he said, was 16 per cent above June production, but 7 per cent short of production forecasts made at the beginning of July.

Some persons have been careless in carrying their gasoline coupon books in the glove compartments of their cars, with the result that the books have been stolen. Under orders from the State, it is becoming more and more difficult to issue new books for lost ones.

U. S. Army headquarters, European theater, announced arrival in Britain of the largest U. S. convoy of the war, with more men and material for the American Air Forces which had already begun precision bombing by daylight of Nazi-occupied Europe.

The War Department said it will inaugurate this fall a voluntary pre-induction training program utilizing existing facilities of schools and colleges to meet present and future needs for properly trained personnel in the armed forces.

Selective Service Director Hershey said draft boards will begin calling men with dependents before Christmas. He said single men with "secondary" dependents, such as aged or crippled relatives, will be called first.

Secretary of Agriculture Wickard said he would approve a plan of livestock ceiling prices which "must not permit abnormal profits to anyone in the industry at the expense of the producers or consumers."

The quotas will have to follow a downward trend the rest of this year to keep within the amount of rubber earmarked by the WPB for the purpose, the Office of Price Administration said.

WPB Chairman Nelson appointed Under Secretary of War Patterson, Petroleum Coordinator Ickes and Price Administrator Henderson as a committee to determine whether fuel oil should be rationed in the east coast area this winter.

Payroll Up \$30,000 Taxes Up \$110,000 Water Company Says

W. I. McMane, manager of the Commonwealth Water Company in a public statement calls attention to the fact that the company's taxes rose from \$205,408.25 to \$310,000 (estimated) or more than 50 per cent between 1935 and 1942 and that wages have increased more than \$30,000 a year.

"We are asking for increased rates because in common with every other business we are faced with greatly increased costs of operation, to say nothing of taxes," Mr. McMane says.

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DEFENSE NEWS



As Furnished From State Defense Council

RAW MATERIALS ARE NEEDED - Donald Nelson, chief of the War Production Board, recently declared that today our production of planes, tanks, guns, ships, and other fighting gear is limited only by the availability of raw materials.

For example, last week, the WPB forbade the use of rubber in many military items, including cartridge clip boxes and gun grips.

WPB CRACKS DOWN ON CHISLERS - There aren't very many chiselers on the Home Front, but Uncle Sam is ready to act tough with any person who tries to dodge rationing regulations, beat price and control, or evade the penalty orders which serve to conserve our diminishing war materials.

SUGAR REGULATIONS ARE OBEYED - Yet in the main, we Americans can be proud that we know what the score is. Sugar rationing, for example, which covers every man, woman and child in the nation, has produced only 12 prosecutions for violations so far.

TRANSPORTATION - NEEDS REACH NEW PEAK - No need to tell you perhaps, that our public transportation systems are carrying their largest passenger loads in history.

FUEL OIL BURNERS! CONVERT NOW! - Mr. Homeowner - you'll have only yourself to blame if you haven't begun plans to have your fuel oil home burning unit converted to use coal or kerosene, other substitute.

MERRY CHRISTMAS FROM THE ODT! - Despite the transportation problem, there won't be any government restrictions on Christmas packages next Yuletide, nor on Christmas cards.

That was the answer of the Office of Defense Transportation recently when government agencies were asked whether carloads of Christmas mail still would be permitted to roll across the country.

ODT's loading regulations have conserved much boxcar space and these will be checked up again on September 10 when no car may carry less than ten tons of package freight.

Ruth Rinker To Be Wed September 26

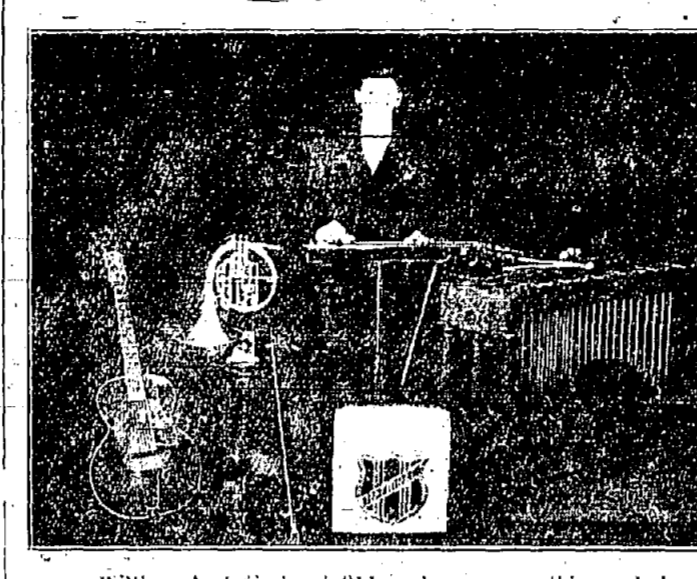

METER READING DATE CHANGED BY P. S.

Change Over To Checking Meters Every Third Month In Outlying Districts, To Save Gas and Rubber

To save gasoline and rubber, in cooperation with the war effort, Public Service Electric and Gas Company will read electric and gas meters every third month in outlying districts only, instead of each month for the duration of the emergency.

This plan will go into effect in September or as soon thereafter as practicable and will apply particularly to those automobiles used by meter readers on their rounds. It is estimated the plan will result in an annual conservation of approximately 75,000 miles of automobile usage.

About 75,000 accounts throughout the company's territory will be affected. A few districts which do not have rural territory, notably Newark District, will not be affected at all. Also, certain types of accounts will not be included in the change.

For their convenience in submitting payments regularly, customers affected by the revisions in meter reading procedure will receive a bill each month. The first monthly bill will be an averaged bill based on estimated meter readings. Subsequent bills for the first and second months following each actual reading of their meters by the company will be averaged bills, unless the customer prefers to read his own meters. Every third monthly bill will be based on actual meter readings by a Company representative. Any difference between the actual use and the estimated use, it is pointed out, will adjust itself when the meters are read every third month.

It, during the months when meters will not be read by the company representative, a customer prefers to read his own meters and to submit such readings in the company on specified dates, bills based on his readings will be sent him instead of averaged bills. In view of the experience of other utility companies which have put the plan into effect, Public Service Electric and Gas Company anticipates a favorable reaction from its customers and their acceptance of the plan as a necessary measure during the war emergency.

There are two complete floors for dancing, a beautiful, well-kent canteen which provides FREE MEALS, and I am told that more than 25,000 men have been served there in a single day. Then there is a lounge and

library, a game floor, a floor for girls that come to entertain and dance, a business office, which provides information and free tickets for various functions.

Why, I am told that electric razors are furnished along with towels and other needed paraphernalia! If this were a first-class hotel, it could not be better.

You and I often do something to "I wish I could do something to help." Well, believe me, they can. Anyone who cannot serve in the armed forces or other direct manner in this terrible conflict can certainly do a world of good if they do all they can in furthering the benefits of the USO.

The USO is composed of six member agencies, which did, in World War I, so much good, but each of them worked independently of the other. This time, at the request of our President, they have joined hands to form the United Service Organization. In pooling their resources they have been able to accomplish far more than they ever could have singly.

Anyone who really wants to help with this war can do much toward accomplishing our purposes if they will remember that the USO is building morale within the ranks of our fighting men in all branches of the service, and every contribution received by them helps to keep the morale of our boys at its highest point. . . . when victory is finally won, we will know the high spirits of our men helped immensely to carry on the principles of a free people.

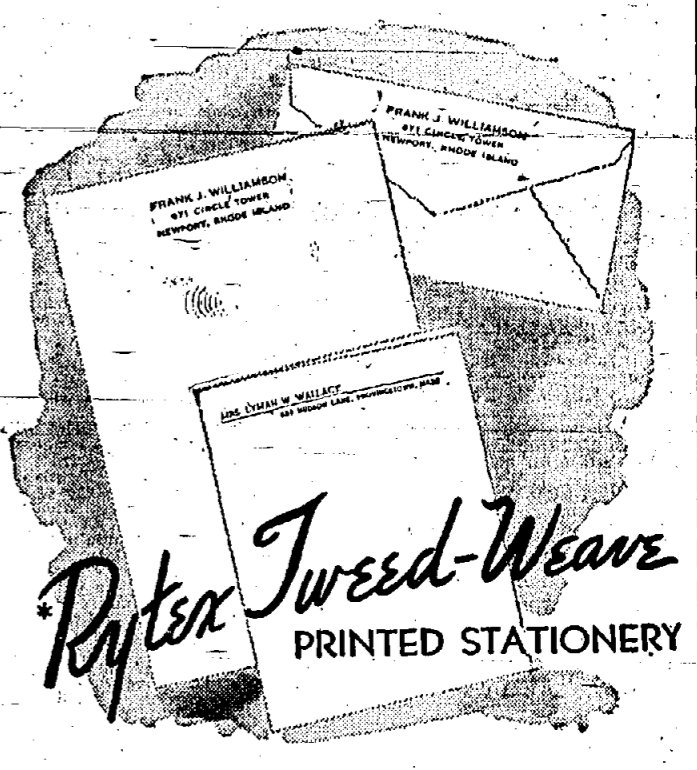
