BETTIQUETTE SAYS

The following are a few of the more important commodities upon which dollars-and-cents price ceilings have been established. It is expected that in the next few months more and more foods and commodities will be placed under this type of price ceiling. At present, the ceilings are fixed at the highest price charged by each individual store during March 1942; other items are controlled by a "marginal mark-up" which permits the retailer to sell at a fixed margin above his net cost. This data is printed in cooperation and at the request of the Office of Price Administration in Newark.

BUTTER
Print Butter (salt or sweet) 93 score (four one-quarter pound prints) 57 cents a pound (quarter-pound print: 14 cents).
If delivered by route men, 57 cents a pound.
Tub butter, 93 score: 55 cents a pound.

EGGS
Grade A, large, 53 cents a dozen in cartons.
Grade A, extra large, 55 cents a dozen.
Grade B, 51 cents a dozen.

MEAT
Effective April 1, the following ceiling prices on pork:

Your Victory Garden This Week

As soon as frost is out of the ground and the soil is sufficiently dry, gardeners can get ready for the actual work of planting. If you are planning to have a Victory Garden this year, it will be necessary, of course, to dig the soil, but care should be taken to make certain that it is well dried out before it is worked.
