## Keep Cool In An Emergency

**Editor's Note:** This is the sixth in a series of ten articles on Home Nursing prepared by the Public Information Service of the American Red Cross. For complete details about the standard course, inquire of your local Red Cross chapter.

Try to keep a few of the most simple and often needed rules and remedies in mind then you can "keep cool" in an emergency. You may save a life by knowing:

**Burns** are of three degrees: first, where the skin is reddened and tender; second, when skin blisters; third, where tissues are destroyed and skin partly gone. The more extensive a burn, even though not deep, the more serious it may be. Fill a basin with lukewarm water and soda (two or three tablespoons to every quart). Soak a soft, freshly-laundered white cloth in the solution, twist ends to remove excess water and apply to burn, then bandage loosely. For deep or extensive burns, a doctor's advice should be sought.

**Poisons:** "Flush, drain and refill." When you suspect that someone has eaten poison, do everything you can to make him vomit while waiting for the doctor. Give four to seven glasses of warm or salt water (one teaspoon to a pint) or soapuds.

Severe abdominal pain may come from a number of causes. Play safe by doing what would be right if it were a case of appendicitis. Give no food, laxative, or enema. Do not apply heat. If pain is accompanied by nausea, vomiting, fever, or abdominal tenderness, get in touch with a doctor at once.

**Animal Bites:** All animal bites should be reported to a doctor at once; keep dog confined so it can be under observation. If the animal should be rabid, anti-rabies treatment should be given as soon as possible. In the meantime, you can give emergency care by washing the wound with running water and drying it with a clean cloth. Then apply two per cent iodine with a cotton swab on a toothpick. Pain from the center outward for an inch or more. Let iodine dry before covering with a clean dressing.

## BAUER, OTTO TO SEEK RE-ELECTION

### Surrogate and Register Jointly Announce They Will Be Candidates At Republican September Primary

Surrogate Charles A. Otto, Jr. and Register Edward Bauer announced jointly today that they will seek re-election in the Republican primary, September 21. Otto is completing his second five-year term and Bauer was appointed register in 1917. Both are residents of Elizabeth.

The two candidates pointed to the administration of their offices as ample reason for their re-election. Each devotes full time to his work and each steadily has elevated the efficiency of his department of the county government. Unblemished years of experience, Bauer and Otto said, have fitted them to continue as register and surrogate.

Surrogate Otto brought to his office a long and varied experience in law and in public life. He is a native of Elizabeth, educated in its schools, and graduated from Dickinson College, Carlisle, Penna. He began practicing law here in 1909.

After Otto entered politics he was a journal clerk in the assembly, judge of the Elizabeth Police Court, an assemblyman for seven years, house majority leader in 1931, minority leader the subsequent year, and speaker in 1933.

Also, during those years, he was president of the Elizabeth Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club, and Union Council, Boy Scouts. He holds membership in the Masons, Elks, Odd Fellows, Jr. O. U. A. M., and Delta Chi legal fraternity, and is treasurer of General Arthur MacArthur Camp, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

**Surrogate Duties Multiplied**  
Since the United States entered the Second World War, the surrogate's duties have multiplied because of care of estates of men killed in the armed forces, and necessary cooperation with the county alien property custodian in the control of possessions of deceased enemy aliens and aliens of enemy occupied lands.

Governor Walter E. Edge appointed Bauer to succeed Frank H. Smith as register of deeds and mortgages in 1917. Bauer at that time was deputy register. Increasing county population and the attendant advance in the number of property owners expanded the records and the routine of the register's office. Bauer reorganized the filing and the indexing, installed new equipment, and boosted the standards to equal any in the whole state.

As a candidate to succeed himself he promised to continue this policy and to maintain the service to the public. During the year he has been register, said Bauer, his office has turned over to the county treasury a net profit of more than \$400,000. Although long allied with the Republican party, Bauer's career has been within the ranks. Frequently he has held party positions and currently is a member of the Tenth Ward Republican Club.

The register is president of the Excelsior Building & Loan Association, a director of the Elizabeth Trust Company, a director of the Lawrence Portland Cement Company, and a member of the Chamber of Commerce. He is a Mason, and a member of Salem Temple.

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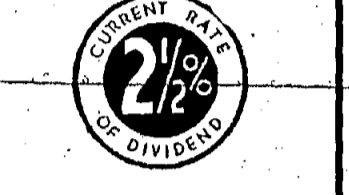

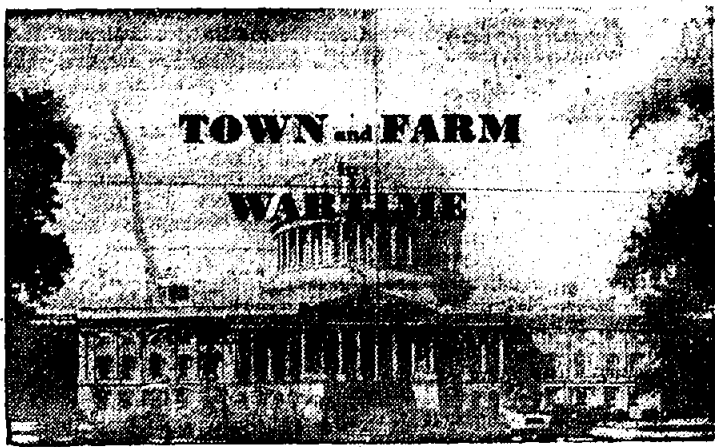
