Police Department Petition Board For 10 Per Cent Bonus

Formal request for a 10 per cent bonus was requested by the Springfield Patrolmen's Benevolent Association to the Township Committee Wednesday night.

The petition follows: "The members of the Police Department hereby respectfully petition the Township Committee for a salary bonus."

"Attention is called to the following conditions confronted by members of the department: (1) The cost of living has increased approximately 27 per cent within the last year; (2) During the depression, members of the department were reduced in salary and were since that time required to purchase police uniforms; (3) Most of the surrounding communities such as Millburn, Westfield, Summit, Union, South Orange, Cranford, Hillsdale, West Orange and the Union County Park Police were granted increases and bonuses."

"It is therefore requested that the Governing Body grant the members of the Police Department a bonus of at least 10 per cent, and that the township reestablish the policy of purchasing police uniforms. Attention is called to the fact that present legislation and recognized municipal practice provide ample legal authority for such action on the part of the board."

"Police department personnel have been faithful to duty and are remaining in the service, even though their better financial opportunities are now presented."

"It is respectfully requested that this petition be given immediate consideration and favorable action."

Council Charles W. Weeks explained that the referendum adopted by voters several years ago, setting up the present wage scale provided that the only changes by the same referendum procedure, and at his suggestion, the clerk was asked to obtain from the P.B.A. the legal authority making a bonus arrangement possible at this time.

After the motion was passed, Finance Chairman Arnold Wright asked that the press understand the attorney's request was not "sarcastic" but intended as a sincere inquiry.

TO LIFT INDUSTRIAL DEFERMENTS

Selective Service Board No. 2 Acts To Reclassify Men Formerly Deferred, Into Class I-A

Union-Springfield Selective Service Board No. 2, for more than a year a steadfast opponent of the deferring of young and single men by virtue of their industrial jobs, decided last Friday to put every man so deferred back into I-A.

The reclassification took place late last week and about 200 men now deferred are transferred to the "available for military service" classification. That some of these men will test appeal board action in light of National moves to have fathers inducted only after other manpower sources have been fully tapped.

Vincent D. P. Slavin, board chairman, said cases in which deferments have been given by appeal boards citing approved replacement schedules may be reopened by local boards upon receipt of "new evidence."

The Union-Springfield board, Slavin said, feels that "new evidence" is contained in Selective Service Director Hershey's talk several weeks ago in which he hit deferments of single men, and in the Senate action, October 6, directing the taking of responsible able-bodied men of military age from both Government and industrial employment before fathers are called.

The public will be kept informed as to what happens to the men now being reclassified I-A, Slavin said. "Every single man and every man who married since he registered for Selective Service and who now enjoys a deferred classification will be returned to I-A. This reclassification will be done when Erwin L. Meisel and Frank J. Oit, offer board members; and Harrison B. Johnson, government appeal agent, confer," Slavin said.

"This will be one way to learn if the Senate action of October, or General Hershey's speech several weeks ago before 2,000 personnel directors, will tend to unshackle State directors, boards of appeal and local board members, who presently are suspects of industrial personnel directors."

"Hershey told those directors that public morale will be shaken unless requests to defer single men are halted. Unless the replacement schedules is to be driven into oblivion, or supervised in such manner as to prevent industrialists from taking advantage of it, the Senate action will go for naught. Under the replacement schedule a local board is given no information as to a registrant's duties; it merely is advised the company will release him for induction within six months."

These schedules are being revised and State headquarters is approving additional six months deferments. This is because National selective service officials have handicapped industrialists.

The latest step against industrial deferments follows other actions by the board in the same direction. It protested on the issue more than a year ago, and this spring issued a "Deferred and Why" listing. This summer it circulated nationally a protest on the matter, and two weeks ago revealed it has not reclassified any fathers.

Total of \$110 For Legion's Cigarettes The American Legion's Cigarette Fund, derived from coins and bills left in canteens at stores in the township, has reached a total of \$110 in less than two weeks since first established. It was announced yesterday by Charles Wernli, committee chairman.

In one business place, the Springfield Tavern, the week's receipts accumulated were \$40, which was considered particularly high. The following private donations are acknowledged: \$5, Mayflower Laundry Co. of Millburn; \$1 each, Mrs. Charles Zoeller and Nicholas C. Schmidt.

Mr. Wernli explained that for each \$40 unit realized, cigarette companies will send 1,000 packages of cigarettes, of which 200 are donated and the 800 are sold at 5 cents each. Thus, two units will be shipped overseas to service men, or a total of 2,000 packages.

It is intended to carry on this work for the duration, Mr. Wernli added, and a nickel each week in the canteens will make it possible to regularly forward at least 1,000 packages weekly.

RATION BOOKS ONLY AT CALDWELL SCHOOL

The James Caldwell School will be the only school building in Springfield where Ration Book No. 3 will be distributed Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Both local grade schools will also be open in the afternoons of these days.

Hours will be 2 to 8 P.M. with local grammar school teachers acting as registrars. Covers of Book No. 3 must be filled in completely and brought to the Caldwell School when the new books are being sought. Residents are asked to come to school on certain days, according to their alphabetical order, to avoid confusion and delay to an overburdened staff.

On the first day, those with names ending from A to F should appear; on the second day, and R to Z on the third and final day.

Walter Edge To Tour County On Thursday

Walter E. Edge, Republican nominee for governor, visiting Union County next Thursday, faces 12 hours of constant and arduous campaigning in which he will visit the principal communities and address eight meetings. Four major public appearances will be in Elizabeth and one each in Totelle, Westfield, Plainfield and Summit.

Although the county campaign committee admits that it has arranged a hard schedule for Edge and other candidates joining him in the hunt, it points out that barely two weeks of working time remain before the general election, November 2.

Edge will speak at two industrial plants in Elizabeth during the noon hour, at a luncheon of women from all towns in the county at 2:30 P.M.

Canning Exhibit To Be Judged In School

The Nutrition Group, War Service Committee, Springfield Defense Council, will sponsor an exhibit of home canned fruits and vegetables, immediately following the Springfield P.T.A. meeting the evening of October 25 in the James Caldwell School.

The exhibit will be arranged on the stage of the school auditorium and may be viewed during the social hour following the regular P.T.A. meeting. While this event is sponsored by the War Service Committee of the Defense Council, it is being combined with the P.T.A. session due to the gasoline shortage.

Everyone who has canned fruits or vegetables either from their Victory gardens or purchased from the markets, is eligible to participate. Entries will be received in the Caldwell School on Monday afternoon, October 25, from 3 to 5 P.M. Those interested are requested to particularly note that only between two and three hours will be accepted. Judges will be Miss Carolyn Leh, home economics teacher at Regional High School, and Miss Charlotte Sorensen, home economics teacher in the James Caldwell School. The identity of the exhibitors will be unknown to the judges, since each entry will bear a number.

Ribbon awards will be made for first, second and third place in each class. Entries will be judged on appearance only, and no jars will be opened. Appropriate prizes will be awarded to the two persons receiving the greatest number of points earned by their entries.

Pract and vegetable classes are as follows: Vegetables—aspargus, beans, green, lima and wax, beets, broccoli, carrots, corn, greens, spinach, beet, etc., peas, peppers, tomatoes, whole, stewed or juiced, and sauerkraut; fruits—apples (for pie), applesauce, apricots, blackberries, cherries, peaches, pears, plums, raspberries, rhubarb and strawberries. Only the foods listed above will be accepted for judging. Novelty entries will not be accepted for exhibit, but not for judging. Judging will be based upon (1) method used in processing; (2) appearance as to texture, shape and color, and (3) arrangement of pack and container used. Jars must be labeled as to contents and methods of preserving, such as "Green beans—pressure cooker" or "Peaches, boiling water bath." This busy group, originally small in number, has been reduced by removals, and Mrs. Richards hopes that enough interested women will soon be found to form a new class for instruction. Telephone Millburn 6-0872. Meanwhile, there is opportunity for services by volunteering to help on Saturday mornings between 9 and 12, at Overlook Hospital, Summit. Each canteen worker is permitted to bring a helper; those desiring to be of assistance in this work may call Mrs. Richards. Needless to say, hospital authorities are very grateful for this help.

Last night the canteen group had charge of the serving of light refreshments at the war fund rally held at Legion Hall. They will perform the same service at the card party to be held October 23rd at Regional High School by the Springfield Council for Camp Kilmer.

Every other Thursday afternoon Springfield canteen workers journey to Port Newark, where they cook and serve dinner to the Coast Guard. They leave for the Port at 3 P. M. and arrive home between 8 and 9 P. M.

We hope this brief recital of canteen service will incite other Springfield women to sign up for instruction, or as a helper for hospital work. "We could undertake more projects," said Mrs. Richards recently. "If we had more trained workers."

Perhaps you have noticed the uniforms of the Motor Corps around town. Mrs. Harry Spencer, department chairman, reports that all the members of the corps now have their winter uniforms. It is a tribute to state that all Red workers are enthusiastic. You must become enthused before you can bring yourself to devote countless hours to a cause which calls for service without pay, hard work. Perhaps we are "sticking our neck out" in expressing our personal opinion that members of the motor corps not only enjoy their work, but get a lot of fun out of it.

It was our interesting experience recently to watch one of the drivers get the best of a ticklish situation while delivering a wheel chair to an invalid living in a rather isolated section of the town. The chair was crammed into the back of the chapter station wagon. It was heavy and awkward to handle. Not a man was available, and passing motorists—driving by—gave no heed to her struggles. Two women in the neighborhood answered her call for help, and under her clever directions the chair was flung lowered to the ground with nary a scratch to the beloved station wagon or to the chair. Hats off to the resourceful woman of the motor

corps! Of course you know they have completed a stiff course in motor repair and upkeep. The group is continuing the Saturday services at Overlook Hospital in driving the ambulance. Mrs. Allyn C. Burdick, vice chairman of motor service, is in charge of special motor projects, and directs the chapter's ambulance service. The hours are from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M. each Saturday. Drivers serve in relays during three periods, 8 to 12, 12 to 3 and 3 to 6.

Due to the illness of Mrs. H. G. Morrison, chairman of staff assistants, Mrs. Stephan Terrel has been made head of this group. She is assisted by Mrs. Charles Saffery as vice chairman. Visitors to Springfield Chapter this afternoon will be Mrs. Eleanor Topp, field representative of the North Atlantic Area, and Mrs. H. Baer, home service representative. They will be met by chapter officers in conference. Red Cross home service is the connecting link between the man in the armed forces and his family, and the government. Charles H. Huff, chapter chairman, is also chairman of home service, and will preside at the conference in the Red Cross room, Town Hall.

Miss Florence Howard In Civil Air Patrol

MOUNTAINSIDE—During the summer Florence Howard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Howard of Woodland avenue joined the Civil Air Patrol, and was, at the time, the only girl in Mountainside and vicinity to enlist. Miss Howard is a senior at Regional High School and will graduate in June. She is studying nights and taking courses in aeronautics, pre-flight training, code work, etc. Monday nights at the Y.M.C.A. in Rahway. Miss Howard has already made her third flight at Hightstown, New Jersey. She was the only girl at Regional to take the "Aviation" Pre-flight Training Course which consisted of aerodynamics, navigation, instruments, engine and meteorology. The idea from which the Civil Air Patrol Cadets stemmed was: If each civilian airman at local airports throughout the country would give one youngster some practical knowledge of aviation, America would progress the faster with the development of flyers and ground crews for war. After only six months this program has taken hold in most of the forty-eight states, and his boys and girls are already finding their way into the armed forces pre-trained by intensive courses both in aviation and in military subjects.

When the Civil Air Patrol was founded a week before Pearl Harbor, its primary job was, and still is, to mobilize the civilian airman and their equipment for the war effort. For nearly a year CAP concentrated on the tasks of organizing and training units at more than 1,000 local airports under a Wing Command in each state, establishing its series of anti-submarine control patrols—and developing its carrier services for the Army. This job completed, the CAP Cadets were added to the Wing organization. Aviation training includes every subject required for a private pilot's license. In addition the cadets are instructed in Morse code, the use of radio equipment and first aid. Membership in CAPC is limited to students in good scholastic standing in the last two years of high school. The uniform of the Cadet is similar to that of an Army private with special CAPC insignia. All expenses are borne by the members. When Miss Howard finishes school in June, she will be sent to Sweetwater, Texas, for a six months' training period for Ferry Command work.
