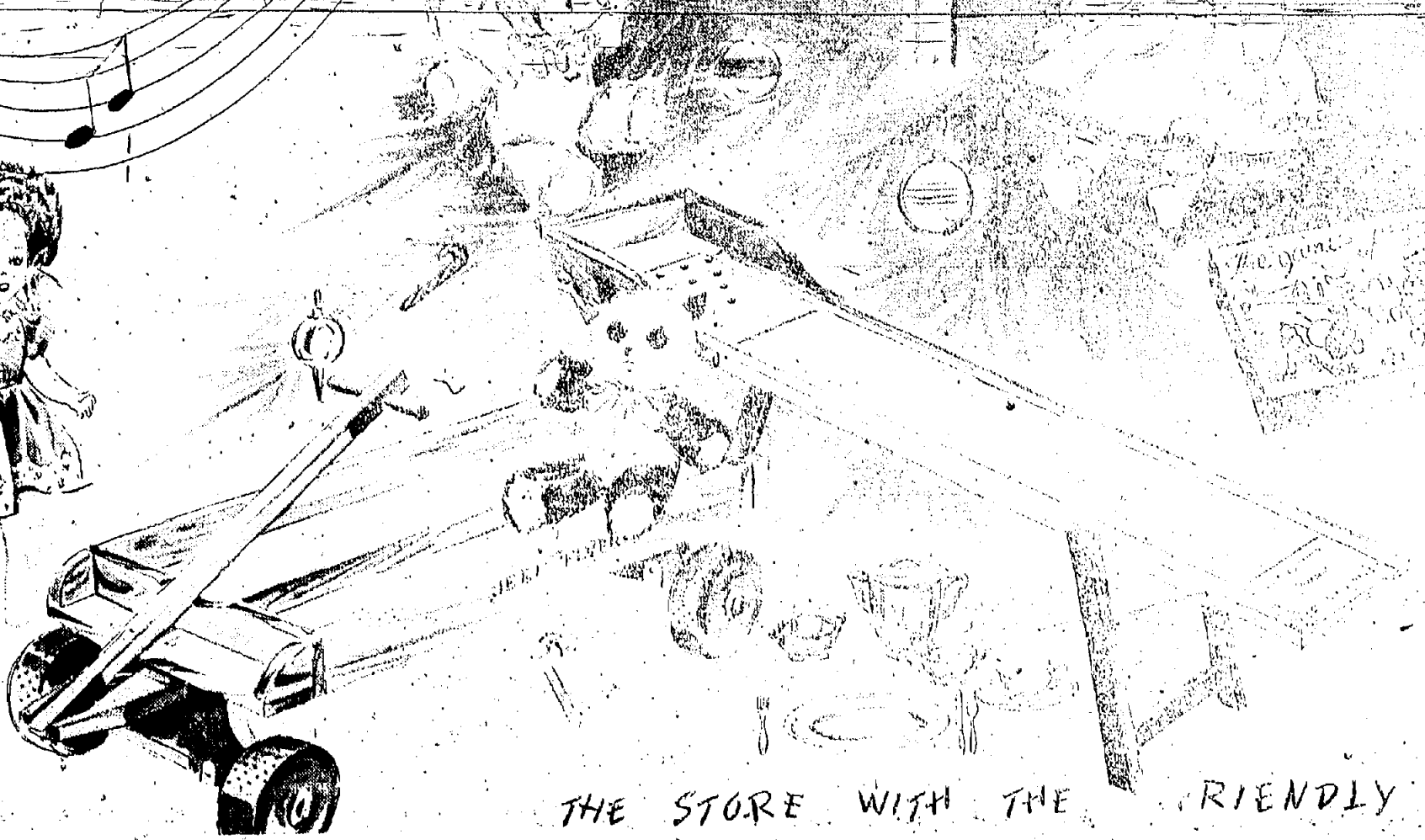
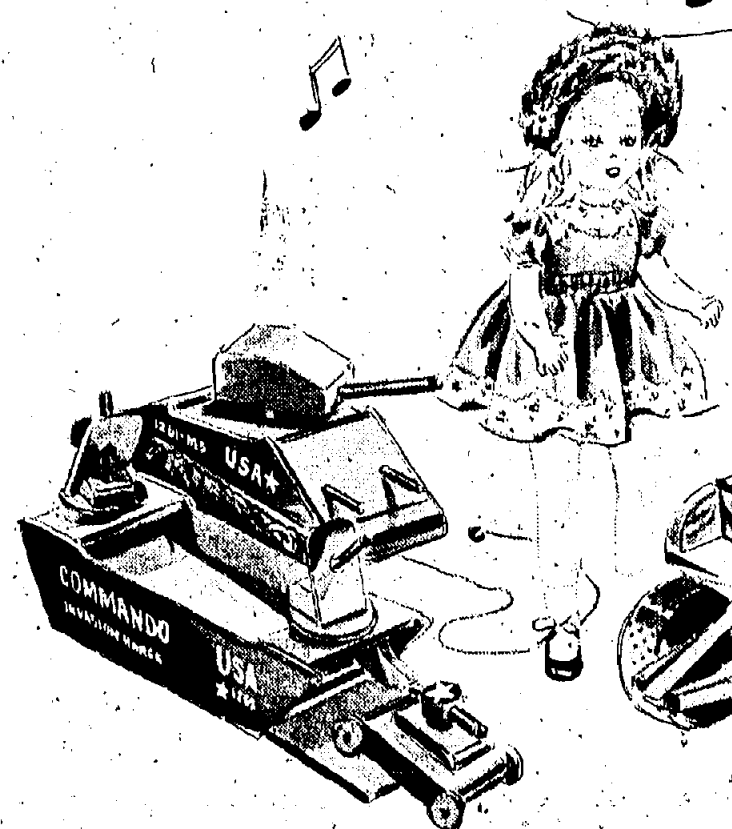

W. I. McMane Retires As Manager of Water Company

RETIRES FROM WATER CO.

W. I. McMane, who for more than fifty years has been associated with the Commonwealth Water Company, has announced his retirement from active service to be effective December 1, 1944.

A dinner for Mr. McMane was sponsored by the officers of American Water Works and Electric Company at the University Club in New York City, Tuesday night of last week.

Mr. McMane became associated with the Commonwealth Water Company in 1890. He worked steadily upwards through the organization, becoming manager and chief operating executive in 1916. During this period the area served by the Company was greatly extended as suburban New Jersey grew in rapid pace with the development of the metropolitan area surrounding New York and Newark.

When Mr. McMane started with the Company in 1890 water service was furnished to 145 customers. Today, the utility serves

upwards of 22,000 meters. Mr. McMane has been long identified with civic matters in the area served by his company. He has been a freholder of Clinton County for thirty years, during the last ten years serving as Chairman of the Board. Although Mr. McMane is laying down the burden of active management of the Commonwealth Water Company, he will continue as vice-president of the Company, an affiliated organization.

Earl S. Thompson, president of the American Water Works and Electric Company, added his expression of esteem to the many which Mr. McMane is now receiving from his associates in the New Jersey utility and from those in the central organization. Wrote Mr. Thompson: "On the part of the 'American' Company I wish to express to you our appreciation and gratitude for the many years of conscientious, loyal and devoted service that you have given to the affairs of the Commonwealth Water Company and the communities which it serves.

"You carry into retirement our best wishes and the confident hope of all of us that you will find much happiness in your increased leisure."

W. E. Stone, close associate of Mr. McMane and president of the Commonwealth Water Company, wrote as follows: "I am glad for you that your retirement is now possible. The excellent standing of our company, the reputation for efficient service and a record of civic responsibility will be long enduring testimony to your more than half-century of loyal service to the Commonwealth Water Company. My best wishes and highest esteem."

R. H. Sargent, who will become manager on December 1, plans to reside in the area served by Commonwealth Water Company. For some time he has been living in Westfield, but has made his arrangements to move to his new residence in Summit in the near future.
