Legionnaire, Harry J. McGeehan. At its last meeting the Post dopted the following resolution: "BE IT RESOLVED, that Contidental Post No. 228, American Legion, cause to be struck a medal

"This Memorial is to be a symbol of our reverence and veneration for the first of our community's illustrious war dead. As John's life was sacrificed in defense of the com-munity and that this sacrifice may not be in vain, we, the living, must carry on in an endeavor to make the community for which he fought a better place

"THEREFORE, to recognize and encourage devotion to the public interest, Continentul Post No. 228, on selection and recommendation of the executive committee, and by unanimous concurring vote of the membership, will confer the John McGeehan Medal of Merit, with full citation, upon uny resident of Springfield who shall perform some outstanding service to the community. It shall be conferred at such times as muy be deemed appropriate, but not more than once in any calendar year, and it shall be conferred in open meeting with appropriate ceremonies and with the reading of the citation by the Commander.
