REPORT FROM MAYOR MOXON

To the Borough men and women in service—  
 "The SUN's Christmas number offers me the one chance of the year to write all of you and I take advantage of it to send Christmas wishes from all of us. We miss you and are looking forward to having you back again before another Christmas comes along.  
 "As for us here at home there is not much real change. The Community Association and War Chest campaign for \$3,200, a new high, went over the top by more than \$200. The Civic Association got away for a good start with weekly dances in the Borough Hall for the teen age youngsters. During the winter the dances will be replaced at times with straw rides, skating parties at Lake Surpina, etc. And the inside of the Borough Hall is to have its face lifted with a new insulated ceiling (to save gas bills and improve lighting), remodeled washrooms and a general brightening up.  
 "We also plan to continue the paving of Central Avenue toward the intersection with New Providence Road and the Fire Department, which has a lot of new members, including the Reverend Burns, is scheduled to get a second piece of equipment. The chassis is being contributed by the Department who will also build the body, while the equipment and materials are being bought by the Council.  
 "The Three Robins, thanks to the pleasure driving ban, gave up the ghost early in the summer and the Mountainside Inn is only open two or three evenings a week for bowling. We now have a Mountainside bowling league and also had a series of softball games (with beer) during the late summer. I had the perhaps unique record of losing every game I pitched. With you away you can see how hard up we are for players. The girl in the current song is right; we're all 'either too young or too old'.  
 "Everybody wanted to be Mayor less than I did and so I'm it again. Aus Johnson even refused the Democratic nomination when he got it. The only changes in the set up are that Jean Vincent replaces Charlie LaRocca on the Council January 1 as Charlie didn't run again and Norman Woolley was appointed in place of Frank Lemahan, resigned, and elected in November. Some of us oldsters may, however, disappear via the draft at the rate the Warfield Board is moving 'em down.  
 "The salvage campaigns run along like 'Tennyson's' brook under the able management of Bud Stedman and volunteers and today we spent all afternoon at the unfamiliar job of sorting, of all things, women's clothes collected for recaptured countries. We're most of us wiser men tonight.  
 "The Parents-Teachers Association had a most interesting English woman talk on England under the Blitz the other night. It gave you a lot of respect for the British and made you glad Mountainside is where it is. I wonder what it is like where you are. It is growing, colder here now. We had some snow flurries last week and the bluebirds passed through on their way south. The jays and cardinals are back for the winter and, despite the Borough hunting ordinance, some of the rabbits are now hassenpfeffer.  
 "We have a new flag pole, gift of the Fire Department, and a fine honor roll dedicated in October. Civilian defense is a bit slow and our tin hats will make good hanging flower pots for the front porch after the war. But, best of all, OGD has announced that we civilian defenders are now to get service ribbons! We, like Goering, will have to wear them on our pajamas.  
 "And so it goes. I wish I could write you more often and keep you posted on the happenings in the Borough. I promise though to answer any letters, do any chores, or place orders for Christmas, birthday or anniversary gifts as requested, strictly on a cash basis."

# Red Cross Synchronizes War Effort

When the Editor of the SUN asked us to write a "comprehensive" article showing what the Springfield Red Cross had done for the service men during the past year, we were glad to undertake the task; but we may say, frankly, that the total statistics astonished us. It has been said that Springfield is Red Cross minded; it is now being demonstrated that our town is completely "service men minded." No hearing is given to skeptics who may say of a proposed project—"It can't be done." If something is suggested for the good of the boys, the challenge is accepted. Such is the spirit of service in the community that in spite of manpower and woman power shortages, just as acute in Springfield as in other towns, the job is carried on. There is no let-up; nor will there be any.

Let us look in at a session of surgical dressings folding. Many of these women are mothers of boys in the service. Some of these mothers are employed in essential work during the day, and in addition to managing their homes, find time at night to come to the work-room and fold dressings. Letters from the boys are brought out and parts of them are read at the work tables. There are similar thoughts in the hearts of these women. They hope that their boys will come home safe and sound; they hope none of the dressings will be needed for any of the Springfield boys; but wherever they go, the boxes bearing the name of our Chapter will carry only well-folded dressings meeting the required Red Cross standard. The workers strive for that. Always on Duty.

Our Home Service department, which in war time is our primary obligation, is on call day and night. No matter what the hour a telegram or cable may be received, immediate attention is given the matter. Complete information is at hand on all benefits conferred upon the families of service men by Congressional legislation. This information is made available to all next of kin of the men, on inquiry at the Chapter office. No matter where a man may be stationed in the service, there is a Red Cross field representative in his area who should be consulted about any problem affecting the family at home.

The knitting of garments for our men in the Army and Navy has been a Red Cross activity limited only by the amount of wool to be obtained. In this connection, it is interesting to note the comment made by William Van Nest, a Regional High graduate of '42. Van Nest is a Sea Bee located on the island Adak, Alaska. This island is uninhabited except during a few months of the summer, when the Eskimos come to it for fishing. During the greater part of the year, according to Van Nest, there is darkness during twenty hours and light during four hours of the day. In a recent letter written to his mother, now residing in Millburn, and Aunt A. (working in the Springfield) he wrote as follows: "Toll Aunt M. (field Red Cross) that the Red Cross just came in yesterday and fitted us all out with handmade knitted garments. We're thrilled and glad to get them! The Red Cross is certainly a Godsend to us out here. They are doing a swell job."

We wish it were possible to create for you pictures of our women at their sewing machines making knit bags and "housewives"; of visits of the Blood Bank Unit to Lagdon Hall, where doctors and nurses attend the blood donors in an orderly routine through the processes of blood donation and canteen workers feed them after it is all over; of our Juniors making writing boards in manual training classes and groups of young people making favors for men in service hospitals; of women scurrying around from store to store, trying to buy, in these days of scarcities, outer linings for the making of bed pillow covers and other hard-to-get materials for the great variety of Junior projects for service men; of canteen workers journeying to Camp Kilmer to serve refreshments to 200 men on Tuesday nights, and to Port Newark to cook and serve dinners to men of the Coast Guard; of our motor corps in their attractive uniforms furnishing necessary transportation in the Chapter station wagon in all these activities; of the staff assistants taking turns at headquarters, typing, filing, answering the phone, or keeping records at the surgical dressings room.

**No Paid Workers**  
All these individual pictures we must leave to your own imagination, but to us they form a co-ordinated pattern of service, the Red Cross. Let it be remembered that in our Chapter there are no paid workers, with the exception of the visiting nurse, who is engaged under contract. There is no paid office executive in charge of Chapter activities. Under these conditions, the members of our executive committee are subject to the call of Red Cross duties at any and all times. In effect, there is practically no limit to the calls upon their time and energy. Red Cross obligations must be met, and leadership cannot be dropped for one minute. This is volunteer service at its best, when leadership is inspired, unselfish and unflinching. Following in support of service for men in the Armed Forces during the past year:

**Home Service:** 170 cases handled, 24 hours a day service.  
**Surgical dressings:** 200,000 dressings folded and shipped.  
**Kit bags:** 100 bags for men in Army sewed and filled with "housewife" and more than a dozen articles for their comfort, including cigarettes, book, playing cards, etc.

72 bags for men in Navy similarly made and filled.  
**Hospital garments:** 27 men's shirts, 10 bed jackets, 100 bedside bags, 10 pillow slips, 10 pillows, 20 bed pan covers.  
**Knitted garments:** 125 knitted garments for men in Army and Navy, including sweaters, helmets, mittens and gloves.  
**Blood Bank:** 272 pints of blood donated.  
**Canteen:** Solicited and served refreshments of coffee cake and sandwiches to an average of 200 soldiers at Camp Kilmer, five Saturday evenings in May, 1943. Cooked and served dinner once a week for twelve weeks to men in Coast Guard at Port Newark. Arrange and pack box luncheon for inductees when they leave Springfield for service. (This project financed by Central Postal Directory, American Legion.)  
**Motor Corps:** Transported workers, materials and donations of various kinds to Camp Kilmer.

Transported workers to Port Newark. Transported surgical dressings, knitted garments, etc., for shipping. Made monthly trips to Camp Kilmer for Hospital Council meetings.  
Silk flag and letter to men in service. More than 200 silk flags mailed to men with letter offering assistance of Home Service. (Note: Because of difficulty in obtaining correct addresses, some of the men failed to receive these flags. The letter and flag are now handed to each man as he leaves for induction.)  
**Camp Kilmer Council:** Chapter contributed \$50 of its funds to Hospital Service at Camp Kilmer. Sponsored and organized Camp Kilmer Council. Assisted in collection of furniture for recreation porch for convalescent soldiers.  
**Junior Red Cross:** Made 6 writing boards, 6 tin boards, 60 ash trays, 20 writing portfolios, 85 memo-pads, 20 flower vases, 3 afghans, 50 hot water bag covers, 20 bed pan covers,

100 utility bags, 30 jig saw puzzles, 200 cross word puzzles (cut out and pasted on cardboard), 150 story booklets, 300 menu-covers, 50 Washington's birthday favors for Camp Kilmer; 100 favors to Veterans' Hospital at Lyons on every holiday, made 8 dozen cup cakes and 20 large cakes for Saturday evening refreshments at Camp Kilmer.  
**Red Cross Visiting Nurse:** Makes visits called for in cases involving families of service men. Co-operates with physicians in maternity

care to wives of service men, including pre-natal and post-natal visits, in accordance with recent legislation.

## 389 Members of the G. I. Family are Somewhere Over There . . .



**THEY ARE** forging doggedly ahead on the difficult Road to Rome; scooping down in dive bombers over the Gilbert Islands in the far-off Pacific; battling enemy submarines in unfamiliar seas; risking their lives in the Blitz over Berlin.

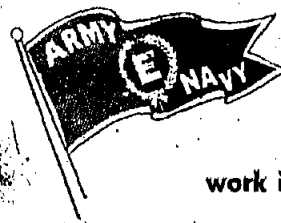


