Red Cross **Synchronizes War Effort**

When the Editor of the SUN asked us to write a "comprehen-sive" article showing what the Springfield Red Cross had done for the service men during the past year, we were glad to undertake the task; but we may say, frankly that the total statistics astonished us. It has been said that Springfield is Red Cross minded; it is now being demonstrated that our town is completely "service men minded." No hearing is given to skeptics who may say of a proposed project
—"It can't be done." If something
is suggested for the good of the boys, the challenge is accepted. Such is the spirit of service in the community that in spite of manpower and woman power shortages, just as acute in Springfield as in other towns, the job is carried on. There is no let-up; nor will there

by any. Let us look in at a session of surgical dressings folding. Many of these women are mothers of boys in the services. Some of these mothers are employed in essential work during the day, and in addition to managing their homes, find tion to manning their notices, into time at night to come to the work-room and fold dressings. Letters from the boys are brought out and parts of them are read at the work tables. There are similar thoughts in the hearts of these women, They hope that their boys will come home safe and sound; they hope none of the dressings will be needed for any of the Springfield boys; but wherever they go, the boxes bearing the name of our Chapter will carry only well-folded dressings meeting the required Red Cross standard The workers strive for that,

Our Home Service department which in war time is our primary obligation, is on call day and night No matter what the hour a telegram or cable may be received, immediate attention is given the matter Complete information is at hand on all benefits conferred upon the families of service men by Congres sional legislation. This information is made available to all next of kir of the men, on inquiry at the Chapter office. No matter where a man may be stationed in the service, there is a Red Cross field representative in his area who should be consulted about any problem affecting the family at home.

The knitting of garments for ou men in the Army and Navy has been a Red Cross netivity limited only by the amount of wool to be tained. In this connection, it is interesting to note the comme made by William Van Nest, a Re-gional High graduate of '42. Var Nest is a Sea Bee located on the Island Adak, Alaska. This island is uninhabited except during a few months of the summer, when the Eskimos come to it for fishing. During the greater part of the year, according to Van Nest, there is darkness during twenty hours and light during four hours of the day. In a recent letter written to his other, now residing in Millburn and Aunt A. (workers in the Spring-he wrote as follows: "Tell Aunt M. field Red Cross) that the Red Cross just came in yesterday and fitted us all out with handmade knitted garments. Were we thrilled and glad to get them! The Red Cross is certainly a Godsend to us out They are doing a swell job.

We wish it were possible to create for you pletures of our womer at their sewing machines making kit bags and "housewives"; of visits of the Blood Bank Unit to Legion Hall, where doctors and nurses at-tend the blood donors in an orderly routine through the processes of blood donation and canteen workers feed them after it is all over; of our Juniors making writing boards in manual training classes and groups of young people making favors for men in service hospitals of women scurrying around from store to store, trying to buy, in these days of scarcities, outing flannel for the muking of bed pan covers and other hard-to-get materials for the great variety of nior projects for service men; of canteen workers journeying to Camp Kilmer to serve refreshment: to 200 men on Saturday nights, and to Port Newark to cook and serve dinners to men of the Const Guard; of our motor corps in their attractive uniforms furnishing necessary transportation in the Chapter sta-tion wagon in all these activities; of the staff assistants taking turns at headquarters, typing, filing, answering the 'phone, or keeping rec-ords at the surgical dressings room.

No Paid Workers

All these individual pictures we All these individual pictures we must leave to your own imagination, but to us they form a co-ordinated pattern of service, the Red Cross. Let it be remembered that in our Chapter there are no paid workers with the avention of the workers, with the exception of the visiting nurse, who is engaged under contract. There is no paid office executive in charge of Chapter activities. Under these conditions, the members of our executive committee are subject to the call of Red Cross duties at any and all times. In effect, there is practically no limit to the calls upon their time and energy. 


