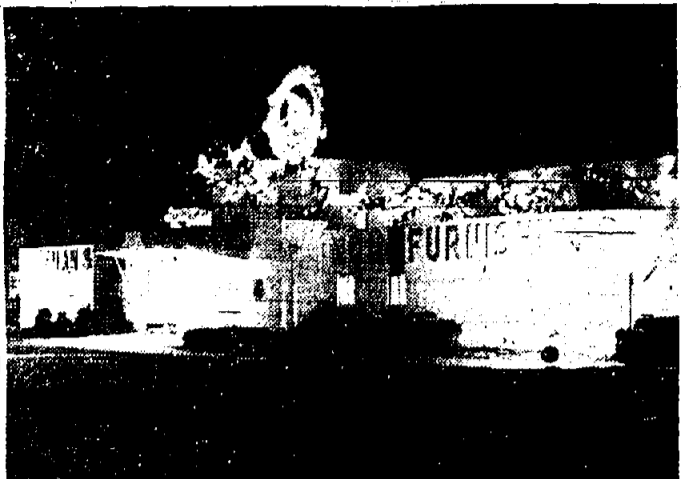

## First Development On New Pru Tract

Positions are expected to be available to scores of Springfield men and women in the accounting and clerical office, building of Chubb and Son which soon will be built at the Prudential Life Insurance Company's shopping center tract on Morris Turnpike, Millburn, two miles from Springfield line.

The firm is one of the leading marine, fire and casualty insurance organizations in the country. It plans to erect a modern two-story office building to contain its accounting and clerical activities. The land has been leased for a period of seventy years.

The twelve-acre tract is adjacent to the proposed Regional Shopping Center which Prudential plans to construct shortly. The Prudential acquired 135 acres fronting on Morris Turnpike and lying between Canoe Brook road and the Passaic river last year.

Although the Chubb firm will continue to maintain its headquarters in New York, approximately 1,000 persons are employed in the departments which will be shifted to this area. The personnel move will be made in two shifts, involving first 400 and then 300 employees. Move will be held at a later date, according to Albert Wall, a Chubb partner.

The company currently is seeking housing arrangements for those who will move to this area. Local real estate firms are being contacted. Application for positions in the new office are being taken at the firm's headquarters, 90 John street, New York.

### Advice Is Given On Tree Damage

Shade trees buffeted and torn by the Big Storm need special attention at once, an expert said yesterday.

Dr. Rush P. Marshall, director of the Bartlett Tree Research Laboratories, said that tree owners, after clearing away the fallen twigs and branches from the lawn, should:

- Remove all dangling limbs and branches. This is a safety precaution. Hanging twigs and limbs also afford ideal breeding places for bark beetles.
- Cut back all broken stubs flush with trunk or big branch. Stubs soon decay and woodrots set in.
- Examine trees for weakened and split V-crotches. Braces and cables these to avoid further damage this winter.
- Eliminate branches that rub together. Prune trees that have been damaged by the storm to their natural shape. But remember a thick high top makes uprooting relatively easy.
- Do not allow such brittle trees

as soft maples, willows and Carolina poplars to grow where they jeopardize public safety.

Trees tilted by the storm may be pushed back to upright position, then anchored with guy wires before the ground freezes. Some fallen trees can be raised by cables and ropes, but first excavate soil on the uprooted side to restore roots to normal positions. Avoid bark damage when using cables.

Anchor all swaying trees, and those newly planted, with guy wires, looping the wires through a segment of garden hose or burlap to prevent skinning the bark.

Pruning of large limbs exposes interior of trees to direct sun and drying winds. Serious damage can be averted by wrapping these branches with burlap or heavy paper.

Dr. Marshall reported a preponderance of trees in cities and towns knocked over by the storm had faulty root systems, weakened by sidewalks, curbs, roads and underground pipes. "A tree needs good anchorage," he explained, "and feeding for the de-

### Smuggled Gems Bring \$19,500

Two Lots of Diamonds Sold by U. S. Marshall at Auction

U. S. Marshal Harrington yesterday sold two lots of smuggled diamonds at an auction for a total of \$19,500.

They were included in connection with smuggling the gems by ship into this country from Europe. The charges against the persons who smuggled the gems were dropped and the others were deported to Belgium and Austria.

The larger lot, 1247 karats, was bought by Busch & Sons, Inc. of Newark for \$15,650, \$100 less than the \$15,750 which the government was called upon when the diamonds were appraised by a government expert at \$31,580.

One lot of 145 karats was smuggled into the country August 1948, by Henri L. Gysse, of Belgium, and Antonio Hernandez of Montreal, both of whom were deported to their respective countries at the time of the seizure. Gysse was placed on probation May 28, 1948, by Federal Judge Mcaney.

### 435 diamonds sold by U. S. for \$15,650

The government auctioned off 435 diamonds yesterday for \$15,650. They were seized by customs agents at Weahawkan, N. J., and were smuggled into this country.

They were bought yesterday by Busch & Sons, Jewelers of 875 Broad St. George J. Busch, Jr., president of the company, called them "magnificent merchandise of exceptionally fine quality."

The diamonds total some 121,771 carats and range in size from 1/32 carat to over a carat.

The government had appraised the jewels at \$31,580 in an effort to through by the bid were not considered high enough.

At the same auction, 4145 carats of diamonds, appraised at \$2,065,500, were sold to a woman in Elizabeth, who was a New York list for \$500.

### Don't Let Death Take Your Holiday

Once again American armed forces are in action trying to protect and uphold the ideal of freedom. Once again the spirit of Christmas will be mocked by the hate and bloodshed of the battlefield.

In many American homes, the roar of the cannon will make it hard to hear the ringing of the Christmas bells. That is to be deeply regretted, but throughout history the torch of man's dignity and freedom has been held aloft only through the sacrifice of its bearers.

We can do little to prevent such personal tragedies. But we CAN do a lot to prevent another kind of tragedy which is equally poignant at the Christmas season—and more cruel because it is needless.

We refer to the preventable tragedy of accidents. The National Safety Council has called for intensive accident prevention effort during the holidays—usually a very dangerous period of the year.

That is an objective which has our wholehearted support, not only because it is better to have a joyous Yuletide, but also because we cannot afford to waste the resources of manpower and material so necessary these days to our national strength.

The waste is enormous—much more than most persons realize. The American Medical Association has shown that accidents rob the nation of more working years than any disease, because accidents strike all age groups, not just those whose productive years are largely behind them.

The traffic accident problem this year is serious, with a death toll of 35,000 in prospect. That would be the largest number of automobile victims since the record year of 1941.

Rigid enforcement of the laws by state, county and municipal police, plus individual determination to play it safe, can keep the Christmas spirit—and all of us—alive this year.



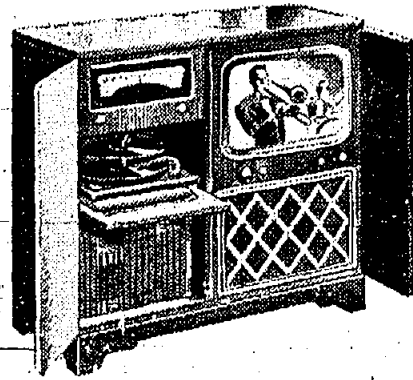

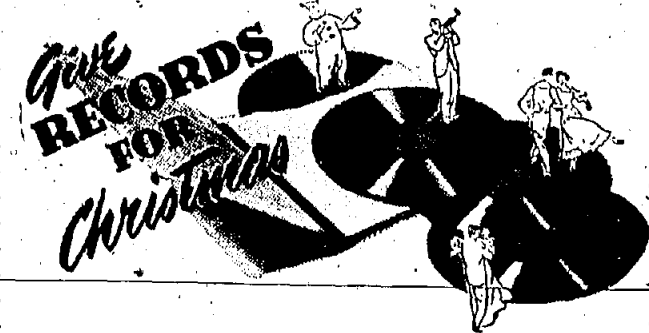

**Veterans' Queries**  
 Q—My doctor told me that I should have my tonsils removed, but I can't afford it. As a World War II veteran, can I have this operation performed at a VA hospital, even though my condition is not service-connected?  
 A—Yes, if VA doctors deem surgery is necessary and if you sign a certificate stating you are not able to pay for the operation. But you will have to wait for a bed to become available, for in VA hospitals first priority goes to emergency cases; second, to those with service-connected illnesses and disabilities; and third, to those with non-service-connected ailments.  
 Q—I am a retired regular Army officer drawing career compensation retirement from the Army. Is it possible to get disability compensation from VA at the same time?  
 A—Yes. When you apply to VA you will be required to state the amount of your retirement pay. After your claim is adjudicated, VA will notify the Army of the amount of compensation or pension granted. The Army then will deduct an equivalent amount from your retirement pay.  
 Q—My brother, a World War II veteran, is in a mental hospital. May I pay his National Service Life Insurance premiums for him?  
 A—Yes. Be sure you identify the payments properly.  
 Q—I enlisted in the Navy recently, but I am afraid I won't be able to keep up premium payments on my commercial life insurance policy. Can anything be done about it?  
 A—Under the Soldiers and Sailors' Civil Relief Act, you may apply to VA for protection of your insurance. If your application is approved, VA will guarantee your premiums until you get out of service. But after your discharge, you must repay the indebtedness.  
 Q—As a Public Law 16 on-the-job trainee, I am required to submit a report of my earnings to the VA. In that report, am I supposed to include disability compensation pay I receive from VA?  
 A—No. You are required to report only earnings from productive labor.  
 Q—May I receive both disability compensation and State benefits for old age?  
 A—Yes. VA has no restriction, so far as compensation is concerned.

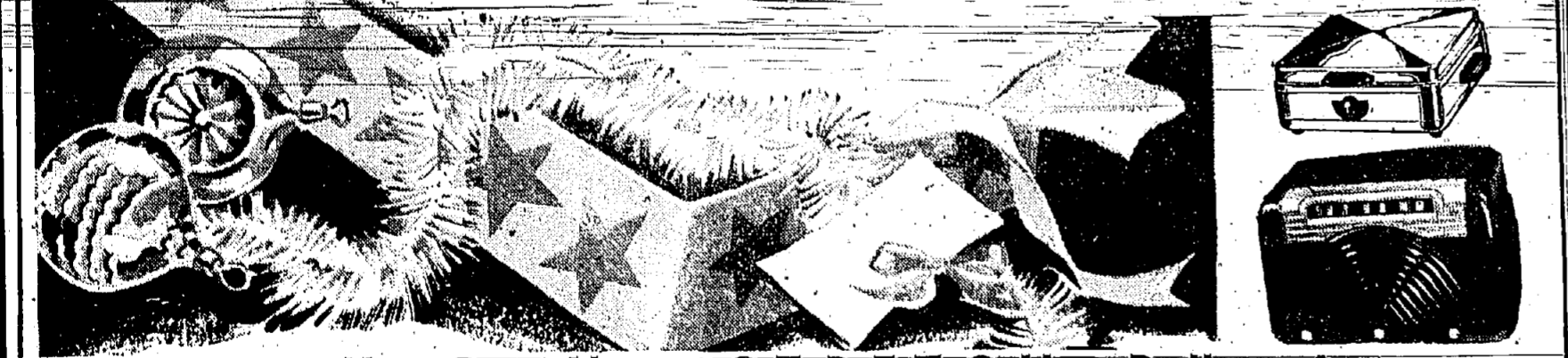
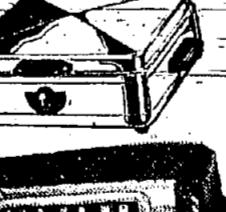
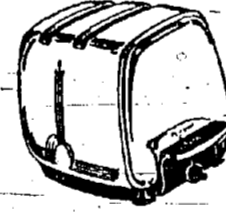
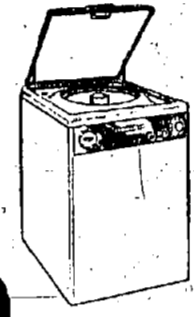
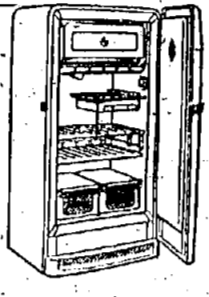
