

Following the action of its ounty committee-members uesday night in unanimousnaming Mrs. Eleanore Worthington, of-42 Marion venue, as the candidate for ownship clerk, Springfield's Republican party today was faced with a likely all-out. all-female battle_for the post in which the ultimate victor may prove to be the Democratic candidate.

Political observers today were agreed that in the event Mrs. Carolyn Harmon, acting township clerk, seeks the post as she has indicated she may, the reverberations of the intra-narty battle are such that the G. O. P., long the party in power, may be split assunder and the minority_Democrats may walk off with another plum.

Should the minority party present a candidate with the prestige of Harry Monroe or former ownship Committeeman Francis

Keane, it was generally conceded that a struggle between the Republican nominee and a G. O P. independent probably would re-sult in a Democratic victory.

Tuesday night's surprising action vas a slap at Wilbert W. Layng, chairman of the Republican county committee, who had gone allout in his support of Mrs. Harmon. The result indicated, many observers insisted, that obviously Layng's backing was apparently of little value.

This Practice Must Stop ut Once On or after July 15, 1951, any omployee found sitting up after he has died will be dropped from the payroll at once, without any investigation, under Regulation No. 29-Section 31.

Where it can be proved that the employee is being held up by a desk, dratting table, or typewriter, or uny other support, which is the property of the agency, a 90 day period of grace will be granted.

The following procedure will be strictly adhered to:
