
Date For Ground-Breaking To Be Set By Authorities Township residents Tuesday put their stamp of ap-

roval in decisive manner on the request of the Board of Education for additional funds when they voted approval of-an-additional bond issue of \$150,000+

The final vote found 707 residents favoring the proposal with 253 against. In the first district the vote was 455 to 172 and in the second 252 to eighty-one. However, it is significant that out of approximately 3,800 voters in Public hearing on the measure will the municipality, only 960 voters went to the polls. The additional bond issue, to

gether with the original appropriation- of \$650,000 brings the total bond issue for construction of the sixteen-room, upper-grades elementary school in Springfield avenue to \$800.000.


