### WATER LENGTHENS XMAS TREE LIFE

The Christmas tree will hold its needles and retain its natural beauty longer in the home if the butt is kept in water. This also keeps it from drying out and becoming a fire hazard.

If you have already bought your tree, be sure to store it outdoors until you are ready to decorate it. Rain and snow will keep it from drying out.

When you are ready to take the tree into the house, use a saw to make a fresh diagonal cut on the butt end. Set the butt in water and keep the water level up so that the cut is always covered. It's surprising how much water a tree will use.

Eric H. Peterson, Jr., Union County Agricultural Agent, says no other means of preserving a tree is needed if you make sure to keep the butt wet.

### Know Your Government By N. J. Taxpayers Association

Government Employment?—  
up, Up, UP

Fastest growing field of employment in New Jersey is government, points out the New Jersey Taxpayers Association.

Between September, 1950 and the same month of 1951 employment in all levels of government in New Jersey increased 6 1/2 per cent. Greatest increase was in Federal Government hiring. During this period New Jersey's non-agricultural establishments showed an overall average employment increase of only 1 1/2 per cent. The percentage computations are based upon data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U. S. Department of Labor.

The increase in government employment was greater than in the private construction field, despite high-level building activity.

Outside government, but within specific classifications of non-agricultural employment in New Jersey, greatest employment booms were shown in mining (up 5.3 per cent) and contract construction (up 5.2 per cent). The climb was slower in the fields of transportation and public utilities (2.8 per cent), finance (1.5 per cent), manufacturing (8 per cent) and service (7 per cent). A one per cent decline in employment was shown over the one-year period in the trade classification.

Numerically, New Jersey's largest class of non-agricultural employment was in the field of manufacturing with 766,900 people at work last September as compared with 761,000 in the same month of 1950. Ranking second was the field of trade where 274,200 people were engaged. Government was in third place with 186,600 employees last September, as compared with 175,300 the previous year.

Use of materials like cotton batting, straw, dry vines, leaves, grass and celluloid without fire proofing them is not only dangerous, but illegal, Chief Pinkava declared.
