### Local Squad Gives Help At Crash

#### First Aid Group, Police Chief Among Rescuers

Chief of Police William J. Thompson, Patrolman Vincent Pinkava and five members of the First Aid Emergency Squad were among the Springfield delegation which sped to the scene of Elizabeth's third airplane crash in less than two months early Monday morning.

The members of the first aid squad included Captain John Wilson, Richard Allen, Robert Robinson, Thomas Peterson and Harold Marter. The group responded with the ambulance at the request of the New Jersey State Aid Council, District 2.

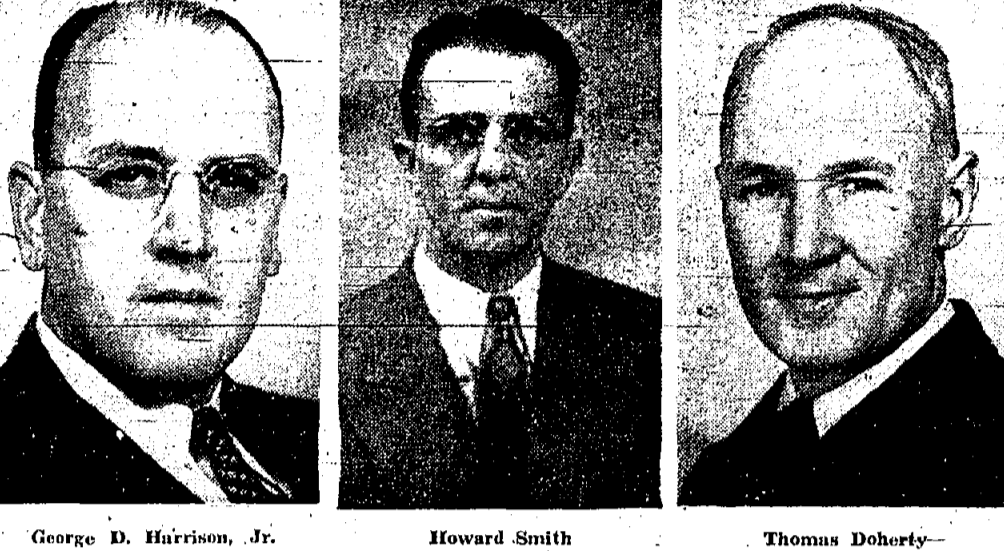
The group aided with the removal of several bodies from the plane, taking them to the morgue. They reported numerous ambulances from number of municipalities were standing by ready to assist with the rescue work. The local squad returned at 4 a.m.

While it was in Elizabeth the Springfield area was covered for emergencies by the Mounties and Westfield first aid squads.

Chief Thompson and Patrolman Pinkava assisted Elizabeth and other police in keeping the crowds back of police and fire lines so they would not interfere with operations. They closely observed the procedure which was adopted by police and firemen in handling the disaster.

The chief pointed out that he has made plans to handle a disaster of a similar type in the event it occurs in Springfield. Shelter areas already have been mapped out in conference with the Defense Council. The police department immediately would swing into action and call on other communities to assist in event a catastrophe of that nature should strike the township, the chief said.

### Township Ratables Show Big Increase

Springfield's ratables increased more than \$1,000,000 during the past year, figures announced this week by Union Mayor F. Edward Biertempfel, president of the Union County Board of Taxation, show.

The 1952 valuation is \$11,603,057, as compared with \$10,276,197. The total increase is \$1,326,860.

The Springfield increase was not the largest in the county—both neither was it the smallest. Union had the biggest increase with a rise of more than four million dollars. Elizabeth was second and Linden third. There were nine municipalities which had increases of less than \$1,000,000.

Springfield's increase was seventh highest.

### Morgan Finishes Fourth As Turnout Is Light

Incumbents triumphed in last night's school election. Howard S. Smith, board president, George F. Harrison, vice-president, and Thomas F. Doherty were elected by wide margins over Robert A. Morgan, the fourth candidate.

The vote follows: Harrison, 238; Smith, 241; Doherty, 220; and Morgan, 160. Total vote cast was 388. Springfield's voting population is approximately 3,600.

### It Happened In Good Old Springfield

For the first time in quite a while, the tournament field is without a real favorite. The seeding committee picked Plainfield as the team to beat, but most of the opposing coaches are wary about selecting a winner.
The Plainfield quintet lacks height, a factor which might aid in its downfall. But, on the other hand, the Cardinals have the best floor unit in the county. With Jack McDonough, Rico Parenti, and Tom Regan leading the way, the Queen City speed merchants could run most clubs in the county ragged. The Cards have a sound defense and steady, accurate ball-handling in their favor.

Thomas Jefferson runs afoul of city rival Thomas Edison, in its opening game. The Big Red, if it has an off night, is going to be in for a rough evening with the good-shooting Yellow Jackets.
Rahway, possessing more depth than any team in the field, can rely on its bench. The Scarlets will get good play from George Lewis and Lenny Robinson.
Dick Groeneveld, who will finish second to Vernacious "Vee" Crisby in the county scoring race, should lead Scotch Plains to a win over Westfield.
In our mind, the biggest boner on the part of the seeding committee was the fact that Linden was not given a berth. The Tigers, who we think will knock Union dizzy, are one of the most under-rated teams in the district.
Cranford, seeded seventh, should have an easy time beating Roselle.
St. Mary's, which plays Regional, is the defending champion. The Hilltoppers will have trouble retaining the crown.
