New Budget Is Reviewed By Taxpayers

Governing Board Claims Boosts Are Necessary

Nearly 100 persons Tuesday night learned about all phases of the 1952 budget at a public forum in Town Hall held under the auspices of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce. Finance Commissioner Fred A. Handville, Mayor Robert W. Marshall, Police Commissioner Albert C. Binder and Fire Commissioner Walter W. Baldwin were the members of the Township Committee who were present to answer questions about the budget.

The principal speaker was Roscoe Walker, director of the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association. His topic was "Municipal Budgets." It was pointed out at the beginning of the session that the Chamber has asked members of the governing board to attend as guests to answer questions. Members of the audience were requested to govern themselves accordingly. They did. One of the queries centered on the big tax rate jump and the fact that the budget shows a substantial increase. Mayor Marshall said there is no waste in stock piles of inventory and that all township equipment is being used to maximum capacity. He said the municipality is encouraging industry which will help ease the tax load.

It was pointed out that assessments in Springfield are low, which, it was said, minimize to a considerable degree the high municipal tax rate. One query centered on the possibilities of reassessment. Belief was expressed that this procedure would be expensive and would not have much effect on reduction of taxes. Police Commissioner Binder pointed out that with the growth of the township it will be necessary to add several more patrolmen. Fire Commissioner Baldwin said a new fire siren is needed so it can be heard by firemen in every section of the municipality. It was pointed out that there has been a blanket 10 percent raise for all municipal employees.

Smith Re-elected School Bd. Head

Howard S. Smith was re-elected president of the Board of Education at the organization session at the James Caldwell School, Monday night. George D. Harrison, Jr., was re-elected vice-president. Smith, Harrison and Thomas P. Doherty were inducted for three-year terms. They were re-elected in the annual school election on February 13.

Petitions Here Ask Airport At Newark Close Permanent

Stories of persons in Springfield today had signed petitions urging for the permanent closing of Newark Airport. Shaken by the series of airplane crashes which have taken place in the city of Elizabeth in the past two months many Springfield residents today are apprehensive that what happened in the county seat may occur here. "After all it could happen in Springfield," was the theme of women shoppers as they congregated in stores following the third plane crash. Discussing the strange sequence of events which has seen three giant passenger planes fall to earth and in two instances strike buildings and kill Elizabeth residents, people here were convinced that there should be a permanent curtailment of operations at Newark Airport.

"There is too much plane traffic here and if it continues the area beyond Elizabeth also will not be safe. That means us," it was said. The feeling apparently was that the New Jersey delegation in the National House of Representatives, the two U.S. Senators and the Union County representatives in the Assembly as well as State Senator Kenneth C. Hand, should take action.

Residents May Hit Budgetary Items

A crowd that will tax the capacity of Town Hall is expected to attend the hearing on the 1952 municipal budget Wednesday night. The measure which totals \$977,167 is nearly \$240,000 higher than the 1951 budget. The new tax rate will be \$8.12 per \$100 valuation as compared with \$7.27 for last year. The rate increase is 115 points, one of the highest in the history of the municipality.

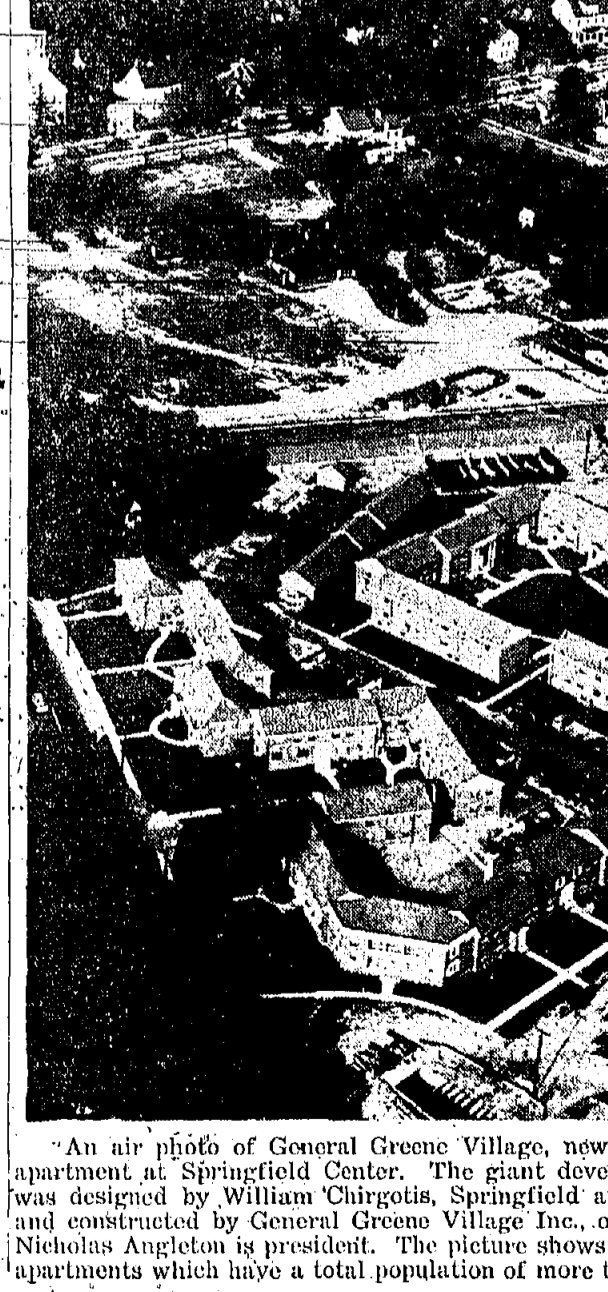

Answer Filed In Apartment Suit

Township Attorney Mox Sherman has filed an answer to the suit instituted in Supreme Court by Baltusrol Gardens, Inc., seeking to compel the governing body to permit erection of a 58-unit garden apartment project at Morris avenue, near Millburn avenue. The Baltusrol corporation recently sought a variation for construction of its project. The proposal was recommended favorably by the zoning board. The township committee, however, rejected the application.

Plan Law To Clamp Down On Hot Dog Stands, Carnivals

An ordinance which will crack down on food stands and carnival-type rides is being prepared by Township Attorney Mox Sherman. Recommendations for the measure were presented last week to the Township Committee by Police Commissioner Albert C. Binder. The commissioner expressed belief that henceforth the municipality should have special types of carnival rides, food stands and what he termed "other non-beneficial businesses." Actually there are not many operations of this type in the township. Stand currently is a refreshment stand on Palmer avenue near the township green.

Magistrate's Wife Heads Drive For Stassen

Mrs. Henry C. McMullen of 27 Moller avenue, wife of Magistrate McMullen, is in charge of petitions to enter Harold Stassen in the GOP Presidential primary. At least 1,000 signatures in this state are needed and petitions must be filed in Trenton by March 15. Baldwin can be expected to wage a bitter battle and even with the support of the organization Remlinger, observers believe, may have his hands full.

Howard L. Kellogg of 38-A Forest drive, Springfield, certified public accountant, has been elected a member of the American Institute of Accountants, national professional society of CPAs. He is associated with the New York office of Arthur Young & Company, accountants and auditors. From May 1941 to December, 1951, he was on the staff of the Securities and Exchange Commission in Washington, becoming Assistant Chief Accountant in September, 1950. Kellogg is a native of Iowa and a graduate of the State University of Iowa. He holds a CPA certificate, obtained by written examination, from the District of Columbia.

Incumbent Likely To Seek Renomination

With the deadline for filing petitions for the primary election scheduled for March 5, less than two weeks away, indications today were that two incumbents and a newcomer will be battling for the two nominations for the township committee in the Republican primary. On the Democratic side there has been no news but it is assumed the party will present two candidates. No contest is expected among the members of the township's minority party.

New Artificial Respiration Method

On recommendation of the National Research Council, the Holger Nielson push-pull method of artificial respiration has been adopted nationally. It will supplant the Schafer prone-pressure method as soon as personnel can be taught the new system.

- The Nielson method is employed as follows:
(1) The patient is placed face down with either cheek resting on his crossed hands.
(2) Kneel on one or both knees at the patient's head, facing toward his feet. Spread your hands out on his back with the base of the palms just below a line running between the armpits. Your thumbs should be touching.
(3) Rock slowly forward with elbows spread until your arms are approximately vertical, exerting a gradually increasing pressure. Be careful to adjust this pressure to the body size of the patient.
(4) Immediately slide your hands to the victim's arms just above his elbows and rock slowly backward. As you rock, draw his arms forward until you feel definite tension at his shoulders. Repeat the full cycle twelve times a minute, giving equal time to the compression and the expansion phases.

The act of drawing the arms forward assists the patient's own "elastic recoil," which the Schafer method does not accomplish. Under special circumstances (arm injury or when an individual cannot be placed on his stomach) other methods are recommended.

Hospital To Help Train Nurses

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 21—Overlook Hospital in Summit will provide clinical facilities for practical training of nurse students enrolled in the State University's two year experimental nursing program. It was announced today by Theodore S. Kenyon, president of the board of trustees, and Arthur W. Smith, director of Overlook Hospital Association.

Trustees of Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, had approved the program at the annual mid-winter meeting of the board.

Through remuneration in recognition of service given by the student during her period of training and internship, Overlook Hospital will defray much of the costs of the individual's education. Although students will be encouraged to live at home, the hospital will provide residence and board where required.

The experimental program in Nursing as planned, controlled, and directed by Rutgers University is a departure from current practice. Traditionally, nurses attend three year hospital schools where they are trained as apprentices.

Designed for secondary school graduates, the two year program will aid in alleviating the current nursing shortage by providing trained nurses after only twenty-two months of study.

Students enrolled in the Rutgers plan will devote two days each week to clinical practice in the hospital with the remainder of the time devoted to professional theory and academic study at the college. Nurse students will be required to take half of the required credits

Know Your Government

By N. J. Taxpayers Association
BIG BUDGET ITEM
About one-third the total State Government budget next year would go for State aid under recommendations of Governor Driscoll to the Legislature.
An analysis of the budget recommendations for the fiscal year beginning July 1 has been reported by the New Jersey Taxpayers Association. This shows that most of the \$69,331,579 proposed as state aid would go for three purposes:
Educational aid would be increased to \$36,288,478. Of this local school districts would receive \$26,109,880. The remaining \$10,178,598 would be paid into the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund, thereby relieving school districts of substantial pension contributions required in many other states.
Other aid recommended includes:
(1) \$15,800,180 to be distributed to counties and municipalities for construction, maintenance, repair and other costs of local roads;
(2) \$13,907,750 for welfare grants to county mental and tuberculosis hospitals and payments for old age assistance, board and care of children, aid to the permanently and totally disabled and other relief programs;
(3) \$1,498,570 in inheritance and outdoor advertising taxes allocated to counties and municipalities; appropriations for salaries of the county boards of taxation, and a contribution to the police and firemen's apportionment fund;
(4) \$1,200,000 to continue the program of beach protection and inland waterways administered by the Department of Conservation and Economic Development;
(5) \$432,100 toward support of county courts; and
(6) \$105,000 for veterans' aid programs.

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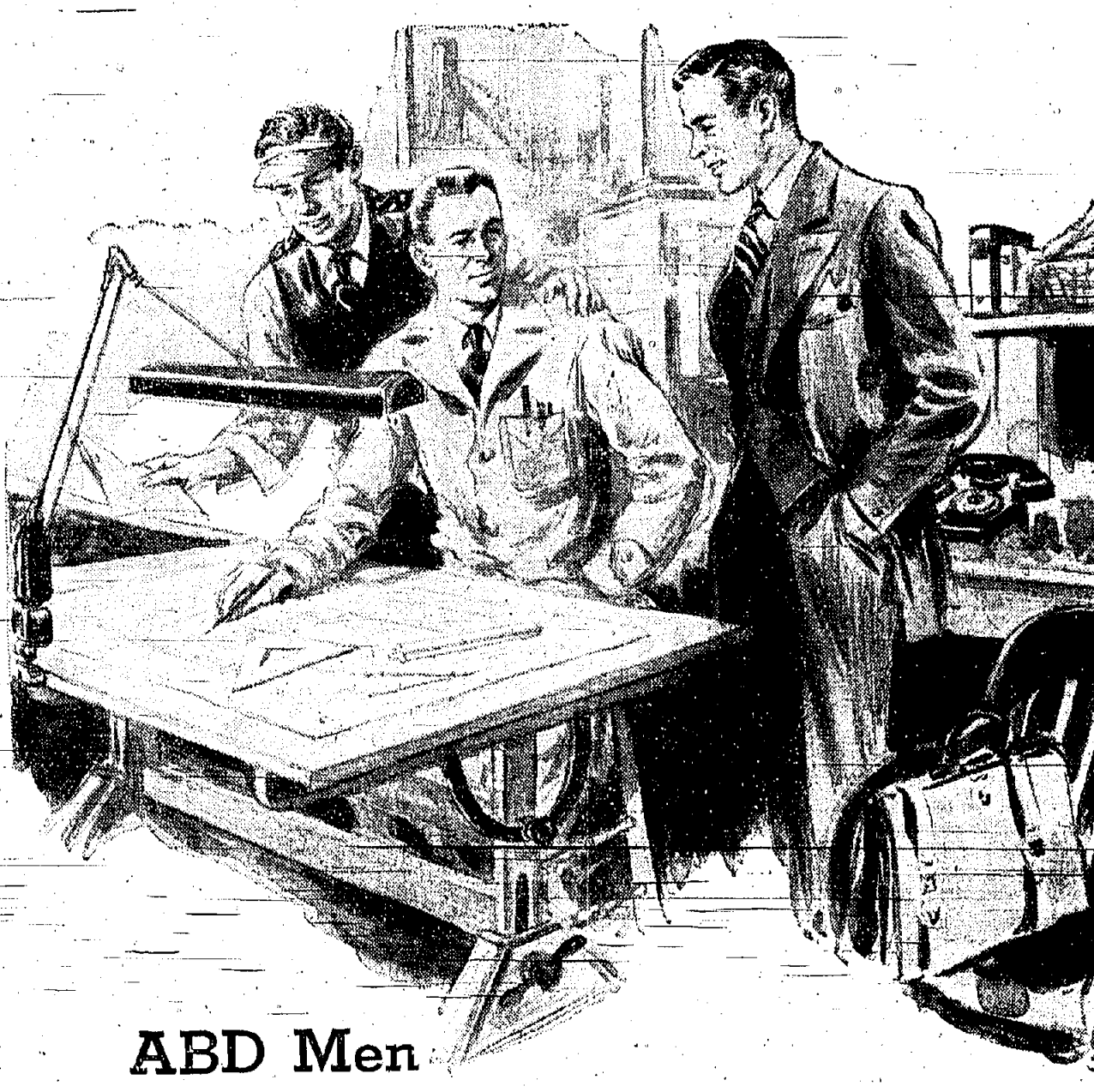

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Springfield Voters Eye County Race With Springfield stripped of its seat on the Board of Chosen Freeholders by the defeat in last year's primary of Lee S. Rigby, township residents are watching with interest developments in the primary.

Ernest Hickok, of Summit, who has declared for one of the freeholder nominations, is expected to get a big vote out of Springfield. William McMane, of Summit, former board director, who recently retired, was always a popular candidate in this area and indications are that Hickok will register well in Springfield.

King will have the full support of the powerful Regular Republican organization of Mayor Edward Biernacki of Union Township, which will stand him in good stead. Both probably will do well here.

Mrs. Cline recently was appointed to the board. If she is bracketed with King and Doolittle, it should help her cause here, but it is not inconceivable that she could trail Hickok. Fred Halcy, another incumbent, is not expected to score impressively in Springfield balloting.
